FIFTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
SECRETARY
OF THE
TRAINING-SCHOOL FOR NURSES,
FOR 1887.

IN presenting the Fifteenth Annual Report of the Bellevue Training-School for Nurses, the Managers feel that the work which was begun in such feebleness, and with so many discouragements, has become so fully rounded, and so perfectly matured in its results, that to commend it to the notice of the public seems truly unnecessary.

The demand for trained nursing has become one of the necessities of our age, and in a spirit of deep thankfulness we would rejoice that the Bellevue Training-School was permitted to be the leader in this work, and trust that the record of this year's work will prove interesting to our friends and to the public.

The first Training-School in England was founded in 1860 by St. Thomas' Hospital, in honor of Florence Nightingale.

When our School was organized the Managers were most favored in securing the services of Sister Helen, one of the best nurses in King's College Hospital, who established the School on the best English systems, which, from time to time, have been altered to meet our American ideas.

The course of training is the same as in former years. There are not as many lectures attended or as many class recitations as in smaller hospitals and schools. The care of the large number of medical, surgical, and obstetrical patients, with the training in the Erysipelas and Insane Pavilions, give but little time for theoretical teaching, and are of far more importance than the multiplying of lectures and recitations.

Each year the number of applicants for admission to the School

is so large that an opportunity is given to select those that are best qualified, and who, by their previous training or occupation, can take charge of training-schools or hospitals when they shall have acquired the special knowledge obtained here. The absolute obedience to the physician's orders, and the systematic record kept of each case, prove a most valuable training for future usefulness. The number of applicants this year was 386, not including the many who were refused application papers. Forty-seven of this number were accepted; 9 of them failed to prove satisfactory during the trial month; 2 left on account of death of near relatives; 2, after some months' trial were not considered competent to perform the responsible duties of the second year; 34 remain in the School.

So great is the desire with many to avail themselves of the benefit of the School, that several applicants have offered to pay from twenty-five to one hundred dollars for the privilege of entering the School, or to serve without pay during the two years' course of instruction. These offers were always declined. All the probationers come into the School on an equality, are placed in the lowest ranks in a ward, do the inferior work, and are raised to higher positions when they show themselves capable of filling them.

It is a matter of profound gratitude and satisfaction that the Managers can report that, with few exceptions, the superintendents of all the training-schools in this country are either graduates from Bellevue Training-School, or have been trained by our graduates. Our rules and regulations are adopted in all these schools with modifications to meet the wants of different localities.

Thus the grain of mustard seed planted in faith has become a mighty tree, spreading its branches far and wide for the healing and blessing of the nation.

Our nurses retain the warmest affection for the School, and rejoice with the Superintendent and Managers when cheering tidings come to us of special work done by one of their number.

Last winter, two of our graduates, Miss Matheson and Miss MacKenzie, received silver medals from the British Government in recognition of their valuable services in the Northwestern Hospital, Canada, during the late rebellion. Two more of our nurses sailed for St. Paul's House, in Rome, during the past month. Dr. Nevin, during his late visit, bore testimony to the

untiring zeal and intelligent care of our nurses bestowed upon many of our countrymen and women who were prostrated by illness far from home and friends.

Miss Dutcher, who so admirably filled the position of head nurse at the Emergency Hospital, has been placed in charge of the Sloane Maternity Hospital, and two of our graduates were recently appointed as Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent of the Training-School of Charity Hospital.

During this year we have had an applicant from Persia and one from Japan. Both of these are educated Christian women who wish to take the course of study at the Training-School, and then pursue their medical studies in one of our colleges. These women we hope will return to their native lands and impart the blessings of a trained Christian medical education to their sisters suffering from neglect and ignorance.

An impetus may thus be given to the movement inaugurated by Lady Dufferin, in India, for the establishment of a school for native women to be educated by trained nurses and physicians.

The health of our nurses during the past year has been uniformly good, and a cheerful atmosphere pervades the wards.

Had we time we could tell of many touching incidents connected with the tender loving care that is given by the nurses to the poor friendless sufferers, or to the little ones, to whom kindly acts and words may never have been known until they entered the wards of Bellevue Hospital.

One case must suffice : A little sufferer with heart disease was propped up in her cot ; neatly dressed and following with earnest looks the nurse who was making the rounds with one of our managers. The latter noticed as she drew near the cot that tears were rolling down the little one's cheeks. The Manager asked, "Are you suffering any pain," when the little girl said : "O no, but I was afraid you were going to take my dear kind nurse away."

The graduates now number 296. During 1887, three have married and one has died.

We do not lose sight of our graduates, as the list with alterations and additions is printed in each report.

The list of graduates who register with us includes the names of almost all who are private nurses in the city. Many of the oldest and best known of our graduates do not obtain their cases

through the Registry, but from the physicians and families who send directly to them, but they cheerfully pay the registry fee of ten dollars to show their appreciation of the benefits they have received from the School, and freely admit that their success and prosperity are due to the training and education received there.

The calls for the registered nurses have been 964; 21 of these have been for heads of hospitals and training-schools. It is a matter of great interest to the managers that so many remote places in the country apply for nurses to take charge of small hospitals in mining centres and manufacturing towns in the West and on the Pacific coast. Some of these we have not been able to supply, but hope in time to be able to meet all such calls.

There has been also an increased demand for District Nurses, and with the call has come a ready response from some of our graduates, who are willing to consecrate themselves to the self-denying labors which this work calls for. Five of the Bellevue graduates are district nurses under the City Mission, and three others are employed by churches in the city. Though their work is not pure nursing, as in hospitals, the instruction given to the poor on the care of the sick and the prevention of disease is of the greatest benefit to those whose sickness is so often the result of ignorance and neglect.

The regular lectures delivered to the nurses were :

Dr. Wylie, on Obstetrics.

Dr. Dennis, on Anatomy and Emergencies.

Dr. Carlisle, on Diseases.

Dr. Biggs, on Physiology and Hygiene.

The Managers offer their sincere thanks to the Board of Bellevue Hospital, to the House Staff, and to the Warden of the Hospital for their unfailing courtesy and kind consideration, shown to our nurses and to the officers of the School.

The past year has been eventful in great sorrow to the Managers, who have been called upon to mourn the loss of several of their kindest and best friends—those who contributed not only their means but their hearty sympathy in the foundation of the School through days of great anxiety.

Among these the Managers would specially name Mrs. Hamilton Fish, whose personal sympathy and thoughtful kindness to our nurses, continued from year to year, made her a dear and

loving friend. Mrs. Fish will long be remembered and mourned by the School.

This sad bereavement was soon followed by the death of her daughter, Mrs. Oliver Northcote, who at one time acted as Secretary of the School.

Mrs. John Jacob Astor and Miss Wolfe were among the original contributors to the School.

The Managers desire to acknowledge with gratitude the bequest of six thousand dollars from Mrs. Urania Battell Humphrey, who has been a subscriber to the School for many years, and who had learned to value the services of our nurses through various illnesses in her own family circle.

As such noble women pass away, beloved and mourned in many humble as well as luxurious homes, shall not their mantles fall on others who will remember, as they did, the sick and afflicted, and who will give of their abundant means to extend the work of the Bellevue Training-School for Nurses.

ADDRESS TO THE GRADUATING CLASS.

THE time prescribed by the Managers of this School as necessary for the acquisition of the technical knowledge essential in the discharge of the duties and responsibilities which will fall to your lot as trained nurses, has now reached its limit. No doubt, during the period of your novitiate, you have often looked forward with eager anticipation to this day. At such moments the salutary restraint of discipline has seemed irksome or unduly severe, routine has taken on the form of a ponderous burden, and fancy has overleaped the tardy hours which intervened between you and emancipation.

Here on the threshold of a new life, you may well pause a moment for retrospection. In the time to come you will surely and often regret the orderly, systematic routine, the precise automatic regularity of your days in the Hospital, and not infrequently wish yourselves again protected, guided, advised, and sustained as you have been here. Many things have been done for you, the doing of which will fall upon yourselves, since it is upon you that the responsibility will lie. Now you are to be called on to show by action the ripe results of the lessons you have been taught. This is said with no thought of discouragement, but the rather as an incentive to meet the change of condition with strong resolve and constancy of purpose.

It is hardly seventeen years since the first germ was planted, which to-day is bringing forth such grand results. The country yet little appreciates the great benefit that has come to it from the efforts of those ladies who had the wisdom, courage, and perseverance to carry on the work, the outgrowth of which is this School, the pioneer of training-schools.

The time was when the physician looked on the nurse as his

natural enemy, and only a few years before the establishment of this School, one of the leading professors of a medical college in this city included in his course of lectures one on nurses, in which he taught the students what to expect from their malicious interference, and how to overcome their influence for evil. At the present day, all this is changed, and the physician looks upon the nurse as his right hand, and not only appreciates and values her services, but is willing to share with her the honor that comes from good results. The training-schools have done for nurses what the medical colleges have done for physicians. The standard of education with efficiency has been raised to such a degree that the nurse of to-day ranks as far above the old-time nurse as the accomplished physician does that of the quack.

The career upon which you are now about to enter, could not well be in greater contrast than with the one you are about to leave. From the community, of which you have been members, where all are actuated by the same motives, and having the same objects and results in view, you will become inmates of families to whom you are strangers, whose thoughts, habits, and modes of life, objects, aims, and aspirations are certain to be different from, unfamiliar, and, possibly, in some instances repugnant, and even covertly or openly antagonistic, to your own.

You will doubtless be often placed in awkward and embarrassing situations, which will call for the exercise of the utmost tact.

That you may be able to meet such emergencies, which are full as real, if not so palpable, as those it is your duty to encounter, you must make of human nature—that odd, whimsical, complex problem—a special study. The same faculties of observation which have been exercised in other branches will stand you in good stead, and, though the puzzle be as changeable as a kaleidoscope, each new combination, which presents itself in the disguise of a new personality, will be at least a preparation for the surprise which awaits you in the next. After a time, you will have almost unconsciously arranged in your minds a series of impressions, if not precisely of formulæ, which upon the appearance of certain known manifestations will enable you to reach a fairly accurate conclusion of physiological diagnosis, always taking into account that unknown quantity called temper. Upon the whole, you will find men easier to manage than women, the intuitive perception of your own sex will be of the greatest use, but it is a

faculty which will bear cultivation. Beware of hasty conclusions and specious generalities, and be sure that the more proficient you become in reading character, the easier will be the task of conforming circumstances to duty.

This knowledge of character is essential to success. Your opportunities for its study will be varied and ample, but the way lies through the thicket of human infirmity, the quicksands of passion, across the desert of blighted hopes and disappointed aspirations, to be traversed oftentimes in pain and weariness, with temper tried and patience worn to the limit of forbearance. It is a tree of knowledge whereof the fruit is bitter to the taste, but it has in it the issue of success,—and success is power. When you make your entrance into that jealously guarded circle, the family, your first duty will be to study, quietly and closely as may be, the idiosyncrasies of the patient. Here you will not infrequently be hampered and embarrassed by well-meant, but often injudicious interference and suggestions from relatives and friends. There are few families which do not number among its members some one who has the reputation of profound knowledge in the treatment of all diseases, and who are wont to be considered, and think themselves oracles, fully competent to advise the attending physician, and qualified by an abundant lack of previous experience to assume control of the invalid and the sick-room ; and it will be fortunate if such a one has not also some favorite prescription, efficacious in all circumstances. If such there be, it will be your duty to assert yourself quietly and authoritatively, but with tact and firmness. Always avoid obtruding your personality. Make such changes and regulations as you are directed ; do not insist peremptorily, but do what should be done, as though the doing of it were of course in the natural order of things. Study simplicity of attire, noiseless garments, the feet of silence, “ shod like destiny in wool ” ; cultivate an even, modulated voice ; no loud or harsh tone should pass your lips ; above all things shun the sibilant whisper, indistinct, but penetrating ; nothing is more calculated to irritate an invalid.

The instructions of the attending physician are, under all circumstances to be accurately and implicitly obeyed and followed. Upon him rests the responsibility ; you are his agent to do his will ; he sees and knows many things in every case upon which your training, however perfect, does not qualify you to pass judgment.

There is one weakness to which all humanity is prone,—the love of gossip. Avoid it ; it is potent for evil. You will, of necessity, learn many domestic secrets ; many a family skeleton will be uncovered before you.

You are bound by no Hypocratic oath, yet your calling is one which necessitates the observance of a silence as sacred as that which binds the physician and the priest.

Let a seal as inviolate as that of the confessional be upon your lips. Whatever you may hear in one family, let it be upon your honor as to one bound by a vow. So surely as one among you becomes known as a bearer of gossiping tales, so surely that one's day of usefulness draws to an early and unregretted close.

There is an open field for the exercise of all that is best and noblest in your womanhood. Do justice to yourselves and those who have opened to you the opportunity for your own advancement of usefulness to your kind. It rests with you to honor their provident munificence, and to set an example which shall be an incentive to those who follow you.

REGULATIONS FOR TRAINING-SCHOOL FOR NURSES.

The Committee of the Training-School for Nurses has made arrangements with the authorities of Bellevue Hospital for giving two years' training to women desirous of becoming professional nurses.

Those wishing to obtain this course of instruction must themselves apply to the Superintendent of the Training-School, 426 East 26th Street, New York, either in person or by letter, upon whose approval they will be received into the School for one month on probation. The preferable age for candidates is from twenty-five to thirty-five years. The applicant should send, with answers to the paper of questions, a letter from a clergyman testifying to her good moral character, and from a physician stating that she is in sound health. Applicants are received at any time during the year when there is a vacancy, except in July and August. During the month of trial, and previous to obtaining a position in the School, the applicant must be prepared for an examination in reading, penmanship, simple arithmetic, and English dictation. The examination is to test the applicant's ability to read aloud well, to write legibly and accurately, to keep simple accounts, and to take notes of lectures. This amount of education is *indispensable* for a member of the School, but applicants are reminded that women of superior education and cultivation, when equally qualified as nurses, will be preferred to those who do not possess these advantages.

The superintendent has full power to decide as to their fitness for the work, and the propriety of retaining or dismissing them. She can also, with the approval of the committee, discharge them at any time in case of misconduct or inefficiency. During the month of probation the pupils are boarded and lodged at the expense of the School, but receive no other compensation. They are not expected to wear the uniform of the School, but must come provided with dresses of washing material for use in the Hospital. All clothing must be plainly marked.

Those who prove satisfactory will be accepted as pupil nurses, after agreeing to remain two years in the Training-School for Nurses, and to obey the rules of the School and Hospital.

They will reside in the Home, and serve for the first year as assistants in the wards of Bellevue Hospital; the second year they will be expected to perform any duty assigned them by the superintendent, either to act as nurses in the Hospital, or to be sent to private cases among the rich or poor.

The pay for the first year is \$7.00 a month, for the second year \$12.00 a month. This sum is allowed for the dress, text-books, and other expenses of

the nurse, in connection with her work, and is in no wise intended as wages, it being considered that the education given is a full equivalent for their services. They are required, after the month of probation, when on duty, to wear the dress prescribed by the Institution; which is of blue and white seersucker, simply made, white apron and cap, and linen collar.

The day nurses are on duty from 8 A.M. to 8 P.M., with an hour off for dinner and additional time for exercise or rest. They are also often given an afternoon during the week, and have a right to the half of Sunday. A vacation of two weeks is allowed each year.

As the Institution is unsectarian there are no religious services connected with it, except evening prayers, and all nurses are expected to attend the place of worship they prefer once on Sunday.

COURSE OF TRAINING.

The instruction includes :

1. The dressing of blisters, burns, sores, and wounds; the application of fomentations, poultices, cups, and leeches.
2. The administration of enemata, and use of catheter.
3. The management of appliances for uterine complaints.
4. The best method of friction to the body and extremities.
5. The management of helpless patients; making beds; moving, changing, giving bath in bed; and preventing and dressing bed-sores.
6. Bandaging, making bandages and rollers, lining of splints.
7. The preparing, cooking, and serving of delicacies for the sick.

They will also be given instruction in the best practical methods of supplying fresh air, warming and ventilating sick-rooms in a proper manner; and are taught to take care of rooms and wards; to keep all utensils perfectly clean and disinfected; to make accurate observations and reports to the physician of the state of the secretions, expectoration, pulse, skin, appetite, temperature of the body, intelligence—as delirium or stupor,—breathing, sleep, condition of wounds, eruptions, formation of matter, effect of diet, or of stimulants, or of medicines; and to learn the management of convalescents.

The teaching will be given by visiting and resident physicians and surgeons at the bedside of the patients, and by the superintendent, assistant superintendent, and head nurses. Lectures, recitations, and demonstrations will take place from time to time, and examinations at stated periods.

When the full term of two years is ended, the nurses thus trained can choose their own field of labor, whether in hospitals, in private families, or in district nursing among the poor. On leaving the School they will, after passing the final examination, each receive a diploma signed by the Examining Board and by a Committee of the Board of Managers.

REGULATIONS.

The charge for the services of a nurse is \$3 a day, or if employed one week or more, \$16 per week. Travelling expenses and washing to be paid by the family employing the nurse.

When the nurse's services are no longer required, this sheet of paper is to be returned, sealed up, with a candid statement, on the fly-leaf, of her conduct and efficiency, either from one of the family or the medical attendant, together with information of the amount to be paid, and whether it is enclosed or will be paid at the office of the Society.

The nurse is to be allowed reasonable time for rest in every twenty-four hours ; and when her services are needed for several consecutive nights, at least six hours in the day out of the sick-room must be given her.

Except in cases of extreme illness, the nurse must be allowed opportunity to attend church once every Sunday.

When on duty the nurse is always to wear the dress prescribed for her by the regulations of the Society.

Patients and their friends are invited to contribute to the general funds of the Society, and thus assist in enabling it to afford the advantages of gratuitous nursing to the poor, which is one of the objects the Association hopes to accomplish.

Where it is possible, a few days' notice of the nurse's return to the Home should be sent to the superintendent.

BELLEVUE REGISTRY FOR NURSES.

The Managers of the Training-School have established a registry for their graduates, where medical, surgical, and obstetrical nurses, and those competent to take charge of nervous patients, can be obtained by applying either in person, by letter, or telegram, to the office of the Society, 426 East 26th Street.

The terms of the registered nurses are \$20 per week, for contagious cases \$25 per week, unless special arrangements are made with the nurse for more or less pay.

A list of these nurses will be found on page 44.

1. The fee is \$10 a year, due after January 1st.
2. Nurses are to keep the superintendent informed of their place of residence, and when they are ready for a call, and also when they have accepted a case, either obtained from the office or from any other source.

Postal cards addressed to the office will be furnished for this purpose.

3. Nurses, while in attendance in the sick-room, are to wear a cap, apron, and dress of washing material, unless the patient or family object, or the circumstances of the case render such a dress inappropriate.

4. Nurses are to report to the office when, from sickness or any other cause, they are obliged to leave a patient who still needs the services of a nurse, so that their place can be supplied as soon as possible.

5. It is the duty of a nurse to take the care of the patient's room, if her time is not fully occupied by the patient; and also to make herself generally useful and acceptable to the family.

6. Before making an engagement a nurse should mention her terms, or if that is not practicable, then, as soon after as convenient, and when an engagement is once made, she should consider herself bound to keep it, and not be induced to break her word in order to please a patient or to secure a more advantageous position.

If any graduate of the School in charge of a case has proved unsatisfactory, the employer is requested to report the fact to the superintendent.

The regulations for employers are the same as those generally used in registries for nurses:

1. Travelling expenses and washing are to be paid by the employers of the nurses, unless some different arrangement has been made between them.

2. A meal should be provided for a nurse when she is required to be awake all night.

3. When it is necessary for a nurse to care for a very sick person for several nights in succession, she should be allowed not less than six hours' sleep during the days.

4. When taking entire charge of a nervous patient night and day, though a nurse may not lose her sleep, it is better for both patient and nurse that she have some time for exercise in the open air apart from the patient.

It is not expedient to multiply rules, as they are not all of general application, and many details must be regulated by the circumstances of the case. We only ask for the nurses the consideration and kindness due to those who contribute so much to the comfort and well-being of members of the family.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE SOCIETY.

ARTICLE I.

The Society shall be known by its incorporated name of "THE TRAINING-SCHOOL FOR NURSES." (Incorporated February 5, 1874.)

ARTICLE II.

The object of the Society, as defined by its charter, is "the selection, education, training, and providing of suitable persons as nurses for the sick."

ARTICLE III.

The Society shall report monthly and annually in writing to the "New York County Visiting Committee for Bellevue and Other Public Institutions," a branch of the State Charities Aid Association.

ARTICLE IV.

The Society shall consist of Honorary Members, Benefactors, Patrons, Members, and Associate Members.

ARTICLE V.

The Officers of the Society shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. They shall be elected annually by a two-thirds vote, by ballot, of the Board of Managers, from among its Members. In case of the death or resignation of an Officer, a successor for the remainder of the year may be elected by a two-thirds vote, by ballot, of the Board of Managers, at any Regular or Special Meeting of the Board, two weeks' notice having been given in writing to the Members by the President or Secretary.

ARTICLE VI.

The President shall preside at all Meetings of the Board of Managers, and shall call Special Meetings at discretion, or upon the written request of three Members. The President shall name the Members of Standing and Special Committees, and shall appoint, annually, an Auditing Committee of two gentlemen, Members of the Society, but not Members of the Board of Managers, to examine and report upon the Accounts of the Treasurer.

ARTICLE VII.

The Vice-President shall, in the absence of the President, perform the duties of the President.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Secretary shall perform the duties usually appertaining to this office.

ARTICLE IX.

The Treasurer shall receive, invest, and take charge of the funds of the Society, and shall make written Monthly Reports to the Board of Managers, of the condition of the Treasury, and a written Annual Report to the President, at the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers.

ARTICLE X.

There shall be a Board of Managers, consisting of not less than eleven Members. Five Members of this Board shall be Members of the New York County Visiting Committee for Bellevue and Other Public Institutions. The Board may make its own By-Laws, and fill vacancies in its own body. The Board may, by a two-thirds vote, remove any Member for cause. It shall prepare the Annual Report, and submit it to the Society for approval at the Annual Meeting. It shall hold its Annual Meeting just previous to that of the Society. No Member of the Board of Managers shall receive a salary nor any compensation for services rendered. Five Members of the Board shall constitute a quorum at any Meeting.

The absence of any Member of the Board of Managers from Meetings of Committees of which he or she may be a Member, for a consecutive period of three months, without giving notice to the Secretary, may be considered by the President as equivalent to a resignation.

ARTICLE XI.

The Board of Managers shall control the management of the School, shall have power to appoint and remove the Superintendent of the School, and shall determine the salaries of all nurses and subordinates.

ARTICLE XII.

There shall be a Committee upon Nominations, composed of the President and three Managers. The names of persons eligible for Managers of this Institution shall be presented to this Committee, and in the event of vacancy in the Board, this Committee shall report and recommend the party or parties eligible for election. After such nominations by the Committee, one month shall elapse, when the election shall take place by ballot at any Meeting at which two thirds of the Managers are present.

ARTICLE XIII.

The Finance Committee shall, with the Treasurer, manage the finances of the Society.

ARTICLE XIV.

Honorary Members shall be chosen only for important service and valuable aid rendered to the School. They shall be exempted from the payment of all dues. They shall be nominated by the Board of Managers, and elected by the Society at its Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE XV.

Benefactors.—Any person who shall give One Thousand Dollars at one time to this Society shall be entitled to all the privileges of membership, without the payment of annual dues. A Benefactor shall have the right to nominate *two pupils*, who, upon conforming to the rules for admission, shall have preference over all other applicants to the first two vacancies, and be received and trained in the School.

ARTICLE XVI.

Patrons.—Any person who shall give Five Hundred Dollars at one time to this Society shall be entitled to all the privileges of membership, without the payment of annual dues. A Patron shall have the right to nominate *one pupil*, who, upon conforming to the rules for admission, shall have a preference to the first vacancy, and be received and trained in the School.

ARTICLE XVII.

Members and Associate Members must be nominated in writing by a Member or Associate Member of the Society; the name of the proposed Member and the Proposer being sent to the Secretary, to be submitted for approval to the Board of Managers. If elected, and upon payment of annual dues, he or she shall become a Member or Associate Member of the Society. The annual dues of a Member shall be ten dollars, of an Associate Member five dollars, payable immediately after election, and subsequently in January of each year. Members shall be entitled to two votes at all Regular and Special Meetings of the Society, and Associate Members to one vote.

ARTICLE XVIII.

Members and Associate Members may at any time commute all annual dues for life by the payment of One Hundred Dollars, and Fifty Dollars, respectively.

ARTICLE XIX.

The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday of January. The fiscal year of the Society shall be the calendar year.

ARTICLE XX.

The By-Laws of the Sub-Committees must be in accordance with and subordinate to the By-Laws of the Board of Managers. The By-Laws of the Board of Managers must be in accordance with and subordinate to these By-Laws of the Society. These By-Laws can be amended by a two-thirds vote of Members of the Society, or by a majority of the Board of Managers, at any Regular or Special Meeting, the text of the proposed amendment having been sent to each Member a fortnight previously by the Secretary.
