RESOLUTION GOVERNING THE RELATIONS OF THE  
BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE SCHOOLS OF  
NURSING WITH THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES  
OF BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS

Adopted by the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied  
Hospitals at the Meeting December 31, 1924

*Resolved*, That Schools for Nursing be established by the Board of Trustees in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, City of New York, to be known as the Schools for Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, under the direction and control of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

That the Board of Managers of the Schools for Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals be composed of the present Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School for Nurses.

That the Board of Managers of the Schools for Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals shall consist of the thirty members of the Board of Managers of the present Bellevue Training School for Nurses.

That the members of the Board of Managers of the Schools for Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals shall be appointed for a period of six years, the terms of five to expire each year.

That the present members of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School for Nurses serve the terms for which they have been appointed as Managers of the Bellevue Training School for Nurses, as members of the Board of Managers of the Schools for Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

That the group of five members of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School for Nurses whose terms expire February 1, 1925, be filled by appointment by the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals on or before February 1, 1925, from a list of names to be submitted by the present Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School for Nurses on or before January 15, 1925.

That vacancies that occur in the Board of Managers of the Schools for Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals shall be filled by appointment by the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals on or before February 1st of each year, from a list of names to be submitted by the Board of Managers of the Schools for Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, on or before January 15th of each year.

That in the event of a position in the Board of Managers becoming vacant before the expiration of the term of any member, the vacancy shall be filled by the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals from a list of names submitted by the Board of Managers of the Schools for Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

**BY-LAWS***of***The Schools for Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals**

Adopted by the Board of Trustees at the Meeting of December  
31, 1924

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1. The Schools for Nursing shall be conducted at Bellevue Hospital, and at Harlem Hospital, and at Fordham Hospital, and at Gouverneur Hospital, as soon as conditions at these two latter hospitals will permit.

2. The School at each Hospital shall be under the direction and management of the Board of Managers of the Schools for Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees. These several schools shall be known as the Schools for Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

3. Appointments to the major executive and educational positions in the several schools shall be made by the Board of Managers of the Schools for Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees.

4. Dismissals of those holding major executive and educational positions in the several schools shall be made by the Board of Managers of the Schools for Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees.

5. The conduct and management of the Schools by the Board of Managers of the Schools for Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals may be terminated by either party six months after notice is given to that effect.

# RULES GOVERNING THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE SCHOOLS FOR NURSING

Adopted by the Board of Managers of the Schools for Nursing of  
Bellevue and Allied Hospitals

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## I. MEMBERSHIP

Members shall be appointed for a period of six years, the terms of five to expire each year, as per the Resolution of the Board of Trustees, December 31, 1924, and shall serve without compensation.

## II. OFFICERS AND DUTIES OF OFFICERS

The Officers, and the duties of Officers, shall be the same as those provided for in the By-laws of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School for Nurses, sections V, VII, VIII, IX, X, XI.\*

## III. MEETINGS

The Board of Managers shall hold meetings at the Nurses' Residence on the first and third Fridays of each month, except during June, July, August, and September; and such other meetings as the President may call, or as may be called on the written request of three members of the Board. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

## IV. REPORTS

The Board of Managers shall make an annual report to the Board of Trustees, and shall send the Trustees a copy of the Minutes of their regular meetings.

## V. COMMITTEES

There shall be the following Committees, and such others as shall be created by the Board from time to time:

- Executive Committee,
- Ward Visiting Committee for Bellevue,
- House Committee for Bellevue,
- Committee on Personnel Work for Bellevue,
- Committee on the Mills School,
- Harlem Hospital Committee,
- Fordham Hospital Committee,
- Gouverneur Hospital Committee.

## VI. AMENDMENTS

These Rules may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular meeting, due notice having been given in writing to all members. Any amendment to these Rules must be sent to the Board of Trustees.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

### April 1926—1927

I have the honor of presenting the Second Annual Report of the Schools of Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and the Fifty-Fourth of the Incorporated Society of the Bellevue Training School for Nurses.

Details of the work will be given in the report of the Director of Nursing Service, but the Board wishes especially to note the following improvements brought about by Miss Rottman and her Staff. The course has been increased from two and a half to three years, the eight-hour day is now in effect throughout the Wards, and the system of group nursing has been introduced. Bellevue is the first large public hospital to have group nursing, and we feel it is a great step towards the more efficient care of the patients and training of the nurses; this method has been made possible by the addition of fifty students to the School.

Much additional detail has devolved on the Nursing Staff in the work of moving the old Wards to the new Pavilion "F" and "G"; unforeseen delays have been met, and adjustments made by the most co-operative spirit displayed in all departments. While the opening of the new kitchens only indirectly affects the School, the modern and splendid quarters which they now occupy give much needed relief and make for improved service to the patients, thus facilitating the nursing problem.

The Managers with deep regret accepted the resignation of Miss Wanda Caswell as Social Directress, and in her place were fortunate in the appointment of Mrs. Hill, who is carrying on the work so well begun.

The Health Program as now established gives promise of helpful and valuable development. Miss Hiller, whom Miss Rottman has secured to take charge of this piece of work, is working out an interesting plan, and, with Dr. de la Chapelle's constant interest, there is no doubt that the health average of the School will stand very high.

In so big a place problems of a housekeeping nature have constantly to be met; the re-painting of the whole of Osborn Hall Annex during the past summer was an example of this.

Under the capable direction of Miss Hosken the necessary moving about of nurses was accomplished with the minimum of discomfort.

The Harlem School is maintaining its satisfactory program.

At Fordham the addition to the Nurses' Residence is a great improvement.

We regret to state that conditions at Gouverneur are still very bad and cannot be improved until new quarters are built for the nurses.

We again wish to express a very deep appreciation to Dr. McGrath and the Board of Trustees, as well as to Dr. Fleming and Dr. Thornton for their most helpful and interested co-operation in our many problems.

Miss Wadley's resignation as Director of the Social Service Bureau took effect on November 1st, and on January 1st, Miss Lola G. Yerkes was appointed in her place, and will take up the position on April 1st. The wonderful work begun by Miss Wadley and carried on with untiring zeal for twenty years is a lesson to us all; as a pioneer in this field her influence has spread far and wide.

The excellent work of the volunteers under the direction of Miss Sloan is being continued in the Clinics.

The Committee on Personnel is still running the Club Room for the women employees under the capable supervision of the matron, Mrs. Christine Murphy. The Board feels that this Club Room is of inestimable value in keeping these employees happy and contented by affording them much needed relaxation and rest.

The Board reports with deep regret the resignation of Mrs. J. P. Hoguet and Mrs. Shepard Krech.

## HARLEM HOSPITAL

Harlem Hospital situated as it is in a crowded and growing district finds its capacity much overtaxed. During certain months of the year the wards are overcrowded, making the proper care of the patients almost impossible and the burden on the nursing staff a matter of serious moment. Last year twelve additional rooms were provided for nurses but should the hospital be expanded and more nurses required no further accommodations for them are available.

The graduating exercises were held on May 5th, and twenty-four nurses received their diplomas. The course of training has been increased from 2½ to 3 years and thus students entering the school will be enrolled for this period. The students in the school, however, were given the option of remaining the additional six months or leaving at the end of 2½ years, the time for which they had agreed. With only two or three exceptions the entire class elected to remain.

The Superintendent and the school feel much honored in having one of their number chosen to receive an \$800 scholarship for a year's course in Public Health nursing at Teacher's College, given by the Montclair Chapter of the Red Cross. The student to be so honored is Miss Alida Cooley, a member of this year's graduating class. The school continues to improve each year, applicants constantly increase and show higher educational standards.

In December, 1926 clinics for students on all services were organized and the group nursing plan established. The practical working of this method of teaching the pupil and caring for the patient is still in an experimental stage but is felt to have great possibilities and will ensure better care for the sick.

The Committee have done ward visiting and have besides helped to defray expenses for a number of entertainments for the nurses which were much enjoyed. Tea is served in the Nurses' Residence twice a week and a Ukelele Club has been formed which meets for lessons on two evenings each week.

On the various festivals during the year the wards and the Residence were appropriately decorated, in every instance the nurses doing the work with much spirit and goodwill.

We cannot say too much in praise of our Superintendent, Mrs. S. O'Brien, to whose tireless efforts and disregard of self in spite of many difficulties is due, not only the success of the school, but the health and happiness of all concerned.

#### FORDHAM HOSPITAL

Many of our problems still confront us, but under the efficient management of Miss Maloney and her staff we can see improvement, and the outlook is encouraging.

REPORTS OF DIRECTOR OF NURSING SERVICE  
BELLEVUE HOSPITAL

Presented at Graduation Exercises, March 10, 1927

*To the Board of Managers, the Board of Trustees, Dr. Fleming  
and Friends of the School of Nursing:*

I have the honor to submit to you the 54th Report of the Bellevue School of Nursing, and the 2nd Report of the Schools of Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

In presenting the Report I have tried to confine myself to the important changes and accomplishments of the year. A statistical Report is attached, but will not be read.

To those of you who are in daily contact with the Hospital and the School and know the problems of administration, supervision and education, progress may seem slow. It is only by looking back over the year's work that we can measure our advance and note the changes that have become effective in securing greater efficiency in both administration and the nursing care of the patients.

Just a year ago, we put into effect our plan of decentralizing the authority and responsibility of the School office. With the growth of the Hospital and School, it became increasingly difficult to handle the volume of work in the Office with the number of persons assigned there. The nurse in charge of each Pavilion was given an increased amount of authority with all the responsibility she carried and assigned as the Administrative Supervisor. In reality, she ranks as Assistant Superintendent of Nurses. When one realizes that any one of our Pavilions is comparable to a good sized general hospital, one can see how necessary this step became in the more effective administration of each Unit.

Pavilion A and B, our Medical Unit has a bed capacity of 421, but for the last two months and which is usual at this season of the year, the daily census has exceeded that number by 50 or 75 patients. Miss Blanche Edwards, Class of 1920 has very efficiently administered this Pavilion. After a prolonged illness, it was necessary for Miss Edwards to take an extended leave of absence and she was succeeded by Miss Kathryn Nast, Class of 1920. Two teaching Supervisors are on duty in this Unit and serve as Assistants. They are responsible for the equitable distribution of nurses over the entire service and for the bedside instruction and supervision of the students there.

In this Pavilion our Medical Pediatric Service is located, Miss Maud Kelly is the Teaching Supervisor and has two assistants. In addition to Medical Children, Miss Kelly is responsible for the nursing care of the children's surgical and orthopedic services. This includes a total of 200 beds. The nursing care and the teaching on this Service is so well planned and organized that it does not suffer by comparison with the nursing service of any special children's hospital. Because of the excellency of this service, in addition to the Bellevue students 200 affiliating students, each year, are given experience on this service.

Pavilion L and M, with a bed capacity of 448, houses our Surgical Wards. This is our most difficult Unit to administer and nurse. Because of the great amount of surgical work done at Bellevue and because the time spent on this service is limited, we are dependent in a large measure on graduate nurse service. This group is a constantly changing one and consequently unsatisfactory. The only remedy for this is the dropping of affiliated schools that come for special services only, and the increase in our own student group. This remedy will be adopted as rapidly as is consistent with good organization and the needs of the nursing service of the entire Hospital. In Pavilion L and M is located the Obstetrical Unit. This is a very active service and conducts both a prenatal and a post-natal Clinic. The number of patients admitted to the service during the year was 1625, with 16 deaths, or a mortality of 9/10 of 1%. A large number of the admissions are abnormal cases referred to us by other Clinics or sent into the Hospital by the Bellevue School for Midwives.

Pavilion I and K which houses most of our special Services is filled to capacity constantly. Here is located the Surgical and Orthopedic children; six Operating Rooms, the seventh of which is soon to be opened; the Urological Service; the Ear, Nose and Throat Service; Gynecology; the Eye Service; the X-Ray Department and the X-Ray and Radium Therapy. Miss Elizabeth Gray the former very efficient Supervisor of the Operating Rooms has charge of this Pavilion.

Pavilion F and G, our latest addition is only partly occupied as yet. In spite of the fact that deliveries of equipment were incomplete and the painters were still in the building, it was necessary for us to begin the removal of patients from the Surgical Wing of the old Hospital. On January 25th the Tuberculosis Wards moved their first patients. While it was necessary to take with them much of their old equipment, as the new had not arrived, the wards were so sunny and bright that the lack of facilities and conveniences, even though it contributed to the

nursing problem, was forgotten. The Erysipelas and Neurological patients were moved immediately following the Tuberculosis Service. Instead of abandoning the old Marquand Pavilion where Erysipelas had been located, it became necessary to set up an Isolation Unit. When our Cubicle system is complete this will be discontinued. As soon as deliveries of the new children's equipment are completed the entire Children's Service from Pavilion A and B will be transferred to the four upper floors of F and G.

I cannot leave F and G without taking note of the new Dietary Department. After the struggle for years with the transfer of food and the reheating of it, the problem is solved. The equipment of the new kitchens is modern and ample to care for at least 3000. In close proximity to the main kitchen are the teaching and special Diet Kitchens. Miss Howard, the Supervising Dietitian, has so planned the students' course in the Diet Kitchen that they interview their patients, prepare their menus, weigh, measure and prepare the diet and take it to the ward where it is served by the same student. This is as near the ideal arrangement as we can expect to get in a hospital as large as Bellevue. In this way the theory and practice of diet in disease is correlated with the patient. Miss Howard is entitled to much credit for her interest and co-operation in working out this scheme.

**THE DAY CAMP.** The average daily census of the Bellevue Day Camp on the Boat is 85. The nursing staff consists of four graduate nurses by day and one graduate man nurse at night. Only twelve patients remain here during the night, none of whom are advanced cases. Much good work is accomplished here for the incipient tuberculous patients who spend the day on the Boat and the nights at their homes or at the Bellevue Settlement House. The enforced rest hours, nourishing food, and heliotherapy are given to patients as prescribed and the children who are contact cases only, profit by the care given.

**THE SOCIAL SERVICE.** On November 1st, 1926, after a service of 20 years Miss Mary Wadley, Director of this Service retired. Miss Wadley established Social Service in Bellevue in 1906 when she was the only worker. After her service of 20 years she leaves a department, covering all of our outlying hospitals with 52 workers. Statistics show that 1 out of every 15 patients coming to Bellevue makes contact with the Social Service Department. Our average yearly admissions for the period of Miss Wadley's connection with Bellevue was 138,750. Probably no single individual in New York has rendered more conspicuous

service to the New York City's needy than Miss Wadley. On April 1st, Miss Lola Yerkes, a graduate of this school will take over the duties of this Bureau, as its Director. In the interim Miss Elinor Miller has carried on the work maintaining the excellent record established by Miss Wadley.

The Psychopathic Nursing Service, under the supervision of Miss O'Brien is slowly improving. Housed as it is in the old Medical Wing of the Main Building, it is surprisingly homey and cheery. This year our budget for this Service has been materially increased to permit of reorganization of the Nursing Service. We have been able to give increases in salaries and to place a Teaching Supervisor on the Wards, so that the students might have experience in this important branch of nursing. At present, architects are working on plans which will give Bellevue a modern Psychopathic Building located on the site adjoining Bellevue on the north from 29th to 30th Streets. The appropriation has already been made.

Those of us who knew the old Bellevue regret the demolition of the old grey stone buildings. The razing of the old gate struck a tender spot in many of us. But it must be. We have long needed modern and sanitary buildings, but the passing of Old Bellevue is attended with tender recollections of the great men and women who have gone out from its gates to carry the principles of modern medicine, and nursing to all the world. Of the pioneers in the field of Medicine we can list as Alumni of Bellevue, William Hasty Flint, 1879; William Stuart Halsted, 1878 and later of Johns Hopkins, William C. Gorgas, 1880, Surgeon General and the man who made possible the Canal Zone from a health point of view. And of Nursing, we might say that the history of nursing in America is the history of Bellevue. For every modern movement in nursing has been sponsored and furthered by some graduate of this School. Old Bellevue gave to the nursing profession women like, Florence Hutchinson, Mary Damer, Jane Delano, Diana Kimber, Louise Darche, Lavinia Dock, Isabel Hampton Robb, Georgina Pope and scores of others. These old walls that are soon to be torn away are the same within which these men and women received their training and the inspiration that contributed to their work and fame.

Another great gain in the School this year is the return to the three year course. In returning to the longer course it becomes possible for graduates of this School to register in any State in the Union and in any country of the world. As we draw our students from every State and from many foreign countries it would seem only fair that this should be so. In the three year

course every student will be able to elect four months for a special course. Since Bellevue can offer every service, excepting Public Health and Communicable Disease the electives will amount to special advanced work in the two specified or other services in the Hospital. It is largely because of the varied service and the clinical material that Bellevue offers, that we never lack for students. In the September Class 65% of the students replying to the question, "Why did you take up nursing and why did you come to Bellevue?" said, that Bellevue offered unusual educational advantages. This would tend to show that the young women of today who are entering nursing are acquainting themselves with the facilities of education, the standing of the School and Hospital and the preparation of the teaching staff. If we, as Schools of Nursing, are to compete with other professions in recruiting students, we must maintain an educational basis for our work.

The program of instruction has been modified somewhat this year by the introduction of more ward and bedside teaching. With our Staff of Teaching Supervisors we have been able to hold the students to a higher standard of work. The Attending and Resident Staff have given bedside Clinics stressing the nursing care and the results that are desired. This has given the student a more intelligent understanding of her work and consequently a greater interest, all of which has resulted in better care for the patient.

In September, 1926, we were able to effect an affiliation with Teacher's College whereby students in the College obtained experience in Ward teaching and bedside supervision at Bellevue. College credit is given for this work. We have now our first student for affiliation and both Schools feel it is equally beneficial. For the summer term we are expecting an increased number to register for the course. Students coming to us for the course must have completed a year's work at the College in the principles of supervision.

On September 15, 1926, Miss Mary Marvin came to us as Director of Supervision and Clinical Instruction. Miss Marvin is a graduate of the University and School of Nursing of Minnesota. She obtained her Master's Degree from Columbia University and has been Assistant Professor at Simmons' College, Boston, for the past five years. Under Miss Marvin's Supervision we are developing a new method of assignment, and organization of ward work. Weekly conferences have been held with Supervisors and Head Nurses and the success of the project is due in a large measure to these loyal, faithful women who

have struggled with these problems until a solution has been found.

Many of these Schools are from other States, distributed from Maine to South Carolina. The demand for Affiliating Service for Schools in New York State has brought a request from the State Department of Education that we discontinue our out of State affiliations and give the preference to Schools in our own State.

While planning for these new additions to Bellevue Hospital we must not overlook the fact that we are facing a serious problem in housing the necessary increase in the Nursing Staff. For the Psychopathic Pavilion alone we need an increase of 150 Nurses. The prospect of the New Out Patient Department means the Dispensary Staff must be augmented. The opening of F and G gives us an increased bed capacity of at least 200, which will require 65 nurses additional. The wards to be vacated in A and B will be taken over by other services and will need nurses. We must therefore, plan to house at least 250 more than are cared for under the present arrangement. May I urge the Trustees to consider this problem very seriously before we proceed much further with our building program.

The present Nurses' Residence houses 446 nurses and about 50 maids. Our Dining Room serves about 600 persons at each meal and between 85 and 100 night nurses at midnight dinner. You will appreciate the amount of labor and the supplies used when I tell you it takes 5 barrels of spinach for a meal, 350 pounds of meat for dinner and that at Christmas dinner was served 575 pounds of turkey or 75 fowls. 240 quarts of milk and 25 quarts of cream are consumed in this Dining Room daily. The quality of food served here has contributed largely to our health program. We are commended daily by visitors to this Residence on the excellent housekeeping. Miss Hosken with two nurse assistants and two housekeepers has charge of this Residence and the Annex which cares for 85 nurses. Osborn Hall rents to the School of Nursing, 33 rooms. These rooms do not come under our Supervision.

Just a year ago was turned over to us the two new Wings to this Residence. They were immediately filled and we still had 115 nurses living under another roof. The new Wings contain classrooms which have been a great asset to the School. A large Anatomy Laboratory is located in the North Wing edition. Adjoining it is the Bacteriological Laboratory. These two classrooms are complete with laboratory tables, gas, water, electricity and an ample quantity of laboratory supplies. The Dietetics Laboratory in the Residence, no longer used, is being remodeled and made into an addition to the Chemistry Laboratory; this will enable us to take care of sections of 24 students, instead of 12 as formerly.

With the help and co-operation of Mr. White, Mr. Lempke and the Purchasing Department of the Hospital, replacements, repairs and necessary changes are taking place.

The installation of shower baths in place of the bath tubs in a number of the bath rooms on which work will soon start, is a much needed replacement.

The new Tennis Court and the Swimming Pool are very popular with the students and give recreational and physical exercise so much needed in this type of work. While we have no Gymnasium, we feel this form of exercise is far more beneficial because of the enjoyment obtained through it.

Our Health Service, after a year of intensive work is beginning to see results in a very appreciable decrease in the number of sick days per month. In December, Miss Mary Allerdice, Director of the Health Service resigned and was succeeded by Miss Geraldine Hiller. During Miss Allerdice's year with us she had endeared herself to the entire School and we were sorry to see her go.

Dr. de la Chapelle has given us many hours of his time, both in professional services and in conference on our Health Program.

With the opening of the School year in September, we occupied our new Infirmary of nine beds. It is ideally located on the 6th Floor of the Nurses' Residence. Everything, excepting major surgical work and communicable disease is cared for here. The Old Infirmary is used for isolation purposes when necessary.

I regret to report the death of two students during the year, Elizabeth Duncan Berry of Wangai, New Zealand, died of pneumonia and Marjory Rooney of Missoula, Montana, died of an infection caused by a pin prick in her finger. Mrs. Berry would have been a member of this Class. Miss Rooney was a junior, but during her short stay with us was loved by all who knew her.

In November, Miss Wanda Caswell resigned after a successful service of five years as Social Director. Her place is now filled by Mrs. Anthony Hill. Tea is served daily, excepting Saturday and Sunday and the students themselves act as hostesses with Mrs. Hill's assistance. A Ukelele Club has been organized among the students and has a membership of 92. Many theatre parties have been given and the frequent opportunity of attendance at the best recitals and concerts are much appreciated. At the present time a School Bulletin is being planned. An appropriate name is being sought and time will show how successful it will be.

### FORDHAM HOSPITAL

Great improvement has been made during the year in the physical conditions of Fordham and in the Nursing Service. The nurses on duty here are all affiliating students from other Hospitals, with the exception of the graduate head nurse staff. With no uniformity of method the supervision of this Hospital copes with a difficult problem.

The new Home well under way, but still far from complete, will permit of plans for a better service than at present. Whether or not we establish a separate School of Nursing at Fordham is a problem we must solve. There is a definite feeling in the Borough of the Bronx, I am told, of having a Fordham School of Nursing. Connected with such a project are problems of economics, administrative and educational aspect. To extend the services of the Bellevue Teaching Staff to Fordham would mean a great waste of the time of highly qualified people. The more logical solution would appear to be the transportation of the students.

The plan of a Central School of Nursing, taking in these three Hospitals, giving all of the students the maximum opportunity in nursing education, and all of the hospitals a good nursing service, would appear to be an answer to the problem.

Under such a plan, the entire preliminary course would be given in the well equipped classrooms here at Bellevue. This would save duplication of equipment, but would mean transportation of students.

### GOUVERNEUR HOSPITAL

The prospects are brighter for this Hospital than they have ever been. With the appropriation and plans for the new Nurses' Home, we must consider plans for an improved nursing service. This the Central School would take care of and at the

same time we would feel that we were doing justice to the nurses assigned to this School while bringing the Hospital up to an approved standard.

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In closing this Report, I wish to express to my Associates in the Office my appreciation for their loyal co-operation and support. In addition to the regular Office routine much additional work has been done. Selection and listing of equipment for Pavilion F and G, planning the equipment for the new Dispensary at Harlem, selecting furnishings and submitting lists for the furnishings of the new Nurses' Home at Fordham, has taken almost the entire time of one Assistant.

The opening of F and G meant supervision of the cleaning and placement of equipment and furnishings and working out standards of linen for the wards.

To Miss Bacon for her devotion to the School and her accuracy in all pertaining to her work; to Miss Murray for her management of F and G and the problems incident to its occupancy and to Miss Wooton for her ever willing readiness to go where and when needed, I am especially grateful. I want the student body to know I appreciate their co-operation and loyalty.

I wish to acknowledge to Doctor Fleming my indebtedness for his wise counsel and advice and his fairness and interest in the School; to the Board of Trustees for their interest and effort in securing our increased budget and to the Board of Managers our sincere thanks for innumerable hours of their time spent here, for their financial support of our health and educational programs and for their invariable consideration of the teaching and supervising staff.

REPORT OF DIRECTOR OF NURSING SERVICE  
HARLEM HOSPITAL

Presented at Graduation Exercises, May 5th, 1927

*To the Board of Managers, the Board of Trustees, Dr. Fleming  
and Friends of the Harlem School of Nursing:*

I have the honor to submit to you the Fourth Report of the Harlem School of Nursing and the third graduating class.

The School has had a very successful year. With many more applications for admission than we can accept, we are able to make very careful selections.

During the past year the eight hour day and the three year course have been introduced. The student body has been enlarged and the same method of assignment and supervision used as in the Bellevue School.

A request for increased housing facilities for the nursing staff voiced last year has been fulfilled.

A bridge connecting the Nurses' Home with the Dormitory built for maids' quarters was asked for last April. Today, the bridge is complete, and the Dormitory becomes a part of the Nurses' Home. This enables us to take in larger classes, thus increasing the size of the Nursing Staff. The maids are now housed outside of the Hospital—a much more satisfactory arrangement. Knowing the routine of city construction, I wish to thank the Board of Trustees for their prompt response to our appeal.

An extensive Health Program has been undertaken and the students exhibit much interest in it. We have comparatively little illness in this School.

The nursing care given in Harlem Hospital is of a high quality. The School maintains its connection with Henry Street Visiting Nursing Service and we send six students each year for the Public Health Course. Almost the entire Senior Class has elected to remain for the three year course. This enables them to register in all the southern states where registration is mandatory and where there is an extensive field for their services.

The opening of the new Dispensary will give us an increased Out-Patient Service and we trust a program can be worked out for closer co-operation between the Dispensary and the Social Service with student nurse participation.

In January of this year the graduates of the Harlem School organized the Alumnae Association. In February it was accepted into the District Association of the New York State Nurses' Association. This Association still very much of an infant is making a generous contribution to the Relief Fund of the American Nurses' Association. This is only the beginning of the good works we may look forward to from the Alumnae.

This year for the first time we have accepted affiliating students into the Harlem School of Nursing. Six students were received on March 6th from the Provident School of Nursing in Baltimore, Maryland, for a course covering one year.

Our own student body numbers 92 and we are limited in our growth only by our limited capacity for housing.

The success of the Harlem School, which ranks among the highest, is due almost wholly to Mrs. O'Brien, the Superintendent of Nurses. Her interest and enthusiasm in the School, her untiring efforts to give the best nursing service possible, prompts her to many additional hours of duty.

To Miss Brewer the Instructor in the Theory and Practice of Nursing much credit is due for her finished and thorough instruction. To the other Assistants, Instructors and Supervision, I wish to express my appreciation.

To the students of the School, I wish to say that the Harlem School can only be as good as you wish to make it. Your conscientious devotion to study, your earnest endeavor in maintaining a high standard of efficiency in nursing and scholarship will help us in maintaining the standing of this School. I know I can depend upon you for this support for your School.

I have the pleasure of announcing the award of an \$800 Scholarship to Miss Alida Cooley by the Montclair Red Cross. Miss Cooley is a native of Montclair and the money is to be used for advanced work in Public Health, which field Miss Cooley has elected.

The Honor Student is Miss Estelle Morton. Miss Morton's general average is 92.7%. She too has elected the Public Health Field and Mr. Jones has pointed out ways in which our graduates can co-operate to the greatest good in this great work.

## MILLS' SCHOOL For Men Nurses

Presented at the Graduating Exercises, March, 1927

*To the Board of Managers, the Board of Trustees, Dr. Fleming  
and Friends of the Mills' School:*

I have the honor of presenting to you tonight, the 37th Graduating Class of the Mills' School of Nursing. Since its organization in 1888, 500 young men have received their diploma of the School of Nursing and the Class of 1927 will join the ranks of the Alumni who are doing such splendid work in the fields of specialized Urological, Private Duty, Psychiatric, and Industrial Nursing.

It is not generally known or understood that Mills' School for Male Nurses is the only registered School in the United States connected with a general Hospital.

The history of the School covers a period of 39 years and owes its being to Mr. D. O. Mills. In presenting the idea of men nurses to the Authorities of Bellevue Hospital and to the City of New York, Mr. Mills also presented the School completely equipped to carry on the work. In recalling this gift, permit me to quote the following from Mr. Mills' letter of presentation—

"In the great development of means for caring for the helpless sick which marks the present century, no want has been more felt than that for trained nurses. Medical science made tremendous advances; while the schools furnished physicians and the humane spirit of the age built and endowed hospitals, it was still hard to supply the skilled care which often does more than medicine for the sufferer.

"The Training School for Women Nurses was a great gain. Personal observation of the good it has done led me to believe that an equal service might be rendered by an Institution for the training of male nurses. The humane work of the physicians in charge of Bellevue and other City Hospitals could thus be efficiently supplemented and the suffering of the poor under their care alleviated while the community would gladly employ all the male nurses the hospitals could spare, and so enable the students thus trained to make the vocation of nursing their life work."

This letter was written 39 years ago. Has the School fulfilled the purpose for which it was founded? You who are

familiar with its work, its ideals and its aspirations will answer unhesitatingly "Yes." To you who are new friends of the School let me explain the fields covered today by graduates of the Mills' School. We employ a fairly large number of men nurses in Bellevue Hospital, but we are never able to fill all of our positions because of the demand for our graduates in fields of nursing outside the Hospital. Of the 500 men who have received the diploma of the School, 13% have also completed a course in Medicine and are practicing in that field.

The educational program for the Mills' School is identical to that of the basic course in the Women's School plus Surgery, Medicine, Urology, Ear, Nose and Throat, Eye, Operating Room, Neurology, Psychiatry, Communicable and Tuberculosis and Dispensary. The educational requirements are the same as for the Women's School.

The influence of the Mills' School extends far beyond Bellevue and its graduates. We maintain affiliations with 14 specialized Schools of Nursing for Men. 30 students a year from these Schools spend from 10 to 12 months of a three years' course at Bellevue. Here, they receive both Theory and Practice in Services which their own Hospitals cannot supply.

In addition to a sound professional training the School endeavors to develop in every way the young men who enter. The music tonight is furnished by the Orchestra of the Mills' School. Other classes have had Basketball, Football and Baseball Teams. A thing we have always deplored is the lack of space in our growing Institution for these sports.

The M. T. S. News is published monthly by the students of the School. It is exchanged with 96 other School Bulletins and Papers.

We have been particularly fortunate in having as the Superintendent of this School a man of Mr. Jones' ability and standards. The success of the School is due in a large measure to him.

Miss Ruth Pentland, the Hostess of the Mills' School, presides over the home life of the School and maintains the friendly homey atmosphere found there.

Student Government takes care of all matters referred to it.

As Director of the Nursing Service, I wish to acknowledge the great contribution the students of the School make to the Nursing Service of Bellevue. Their work is of high quality and their spirit always of the finest.

Wylier.

ARTICLE IV. The principal place of business of this society shall be in the City and County of New York.

# CONSTITUTION and BY-LAWS

## *of the*

# BELLEVUE TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES

### ARTICLE I.

The name by which this Society shall be known is The Bellevue Training School for Nurses.

### ARTICLE II.

The object of this Society is the training of nurses for the sick in order that women shall find a school for their education and the public shall reap the advantage of skilled and educated labor.

## BY-LAWS

### I. MEMBERSHIP.

The Society shall consist of Honorary and Active and Supporting Members.

Honorary Members shall be elected by the Board of Managers for valuable aid or important service rendered to the School.

Active Members shall be those who serve on the Board of Managers.

Supporting Members shall be those who make an annual subscription.

### II. BOARD OF MANAGERS.

*The Board of Managers shall be the same persons as those appointed to the Board of Managers of the Schools for Nursing of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, under the Resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees, December 31, 1924.*

*No member of the Board of Managers shall receive any compensation for services rendered.*

### III. REPORTS.

The Board of Managers shall keep Minutes of its meetings and shall make an Annual Report to the Board of Trustees.

### IV. MEETINGS.

The Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School for Nurses shall hold an Annual Meeting in March or April and such other meetings as may be called by the President. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

## V. OFFICERS.

The officers of the Society shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Second Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer and an Assistant Treasurer. They shall be elected annually by a two-thirds vote by ballot of the Board of Managers, from among its members, with the exception of the Treasurer, who need not be a member of the Board of Managers. In case of the death or resignation of an officer, a successor for the remainder of the year may be elected by a two-thirds vote by ballot of the Board of Managers at any regular or special meeting of the Board, two weeks notice in writing having been given by the President or the Secretary.

## VI. NOMINATING COMMITTEE.

There shall be a Nominating Committee for officers, consisting of three members of the Board of Managers, named by the President, who shall prepare and submit a ticket annually to the Board. This ticket must be submitted in writing to each member two weeks before the annual meeting of the Board of Managers.

## VII. PRESIDENT.

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Managers, and shall call special meetings at her discretion, or upon the written request of three members of the Board. The President shall appoint all special and sub-committees.

## VIII. VICE-PRESIDENT.

The Vice-president shall, in the absence of the President, perform the duties of the President.

## IX. SECRETARY.

The Secretary shall perform the duties usually appertaining to this office.

## X. TREASURER.

The Treasurer shall keep all the accounts of the Board of Managers and render a monthly statement. An Assistant Treasurer may be appointed by the Board of Managers when found necessary.

## XI. BY-LAWS.

These By-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote at the annual meeting of the Society, due notice being given in writing.

By-Law V:

OFFICERS.

The officers of the Society shall be a President, a Vice President, a Second Vice President, a Secretary, a Treasurer and an Assistant Treasurer. They shall be elected annually by a two-thirds vote by ballot of the Board of Managers, from among its members, with the exception of the Treasurer, who need not be a member of the Board of Managers. In case of the death or resignation of an officer, a successor for the remainder of the year may be elected by a two-thirds vote by ballot of the Board of Managers at any regular or special meeting of the Board, two weeks notice in writing having been given by the President or the Secretary.

The President announced the resignation of Miss Meade as private secretary of the Board. On motion made by Miss Potter, seconded by Mrs. Hartwell, Miss Meade's resignation was accepted with deep regret and it was decided that the following resolution, be spread on the minutes:

RESOLVED that it is with great regret that we accept the resignation of Miss Elizabeth Meade, who as private secretary of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School for Nurses, has faithfully served them for the past thirty-five years.

Her unfailing interest and integrity, the absolute confidence in her discretion, have made her a comfort and support to the Managers, and to the line of Superintendents of Nurses under whom she has worked.

All of them, Miss Agnes Brennan, Miss Jane A. Delano, Miss Anne Goodrich, Miss Clara Noyes, Miss Amy Hilliard, Miss Carrie J. Brink, Miss Katharine de Long and Miss Marian Rottman, have depended on her steady devotion to duty and ever ready cheerful and willing response to demands on her time.

The Board of Managers will always remember her loyalty during sundry times of vicissitude, and in recognition of the value of her services, and due to the fact that on request she did not take Civil Service-examinations qualifying her for a Pension, they authorize on her retirement, the payment of \$50.00 a month for life, and extend to her their cordial and warm good wishes for many years of happy and well earned leisure.

On motion made by Mrs. Rainsford seconded by Mrs. La Farge, it was voted that the Board should pay Miss Meade an annual pension of \$50.00 a month for life from the funds of the Society.

On motion duly made and seconded the following resolutions were passed :

RESOLVED that the Bank of New York & Trust Company be appointed Assistant Treasurer to receive all moneys and to pay them on order of the Chairman of the Board.

*Osborn Hall*—A six-story building with a frontage of 110 feet on 26th and 125 feet on 25th Street.

The building is used by the Alumnae Association for a Club House. It accommodates approximately 185 guests, besides an Assembly Hall, Reception Rooms, Office, the Alumnae Registry and Osborn Hall Store.

*The Annex*—An eight-story building with a 50 foot frontage on 26th Street, 100 feet deep and a vacant lot in the rear 100 feet deep and 25 feet wide, fronting 25th Street, accommodates 82 guests and is at present rented to the city to house graduate nurses.

The use of the lot for playground purposes is given to the Tuberculosis Division of the Hospital.

# REPORT OF THE ALUMNAE ASSOCIATION OF THE BELLEVUE TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES 1926-1927

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During the year 1926-1927 the membership of the Alumnae Association has grown to 825 members, as a result of the zeal and enthusiasm of our treasurer, Miss Ruth E. Pentland. Through death we have lost ten members.

Owing to the untiring efforts of Miss Paulding, Chairman of the Pension Fund, the Pension Fund continues to grow and reached on January 1st the amount of \$56,000. Eighty-eight members are now receiving interest from the Fund. This year twenty of the members returned their checks to the treasurer to be added to the Fund.

Under the chairmanship of Miss Tashjian the Red Cross Committee collected \$162 for the drive.

The Carrie J. Brink Scholarship was awarded in September to Miss Nora B. Phillips.

Delegates were sent by the Association to Atlantic City to the National Nurses Convention and to Binghamton where the State Nurses Association convened. While in Binghamton several of the Alumnae visited Miss Brink's grave, placing thereon a wreath of flowers—symbol of the love and loyalty of the Alumnae Association.

The gift to the National Relief Fund for Nurses was \$125.

The Entertainment Committee with Miss Finn as Chairman was very active during the year. Among the social events were the reception in honor of Miss Wadley preceding her departure for her residence in Schenectady, the reception for Miss Emily Loveridge of Portland, Oregon, the dinner dance for the graduating class of 1927, and the reception for District Number Thirteen following their December meeting held in the Hospital.

In March the records were given to an auditor and a very detailed report was returned with many suggestions as to ways of facilitating the work of the entire Association. As a result committees are now investigating the advisability of adopting these newer methods.

Under Miss Ryan's management of Osborn Hall many repairs have been made. Painting of the halls and dining room adds greatly to the attractiveness of the home. The dining room finances have been greatly aided by the special nurses on duty in the Hospital having their meals there.

By means of gifts given to Mrs. Joslyn, Chairman of the committee, a picture of Miss Agnes S. Brennan was made and hung in the reception room of Osborn Hall. Those nurses training under Miss Brennan, hope thereby to keep alive her ideals among the younger nurses.

A contribution of ten dollars was sent the League of Nursing Education toward the support of the Field Worker.

To Mrs. Osborn and Mrs. Hess our thanks are given for their interest in the future of the private duty nurse. Through their efforts the Association has joined a co-operative movement which shall link it to Alumnae Associations of the leading hospitals of the city, and which shall make a unity of the private duty nurses. In Mrs. Osborn and the Board of Managers we feel we have friends ever ready to help us, and to them we express our appreciation.

## REGISTRY REPORT

### May 1926 — May 1927

During the year, from May to May, we record 3666 calls.

Notwithstanding the fact that this has been considered a dull year from the viewpoint of Private Nursing, upon comparing figures, we find only a small decline in our calls. Those for night duty far exceed those for day duty, which accounts for 18 calls remaining unfilled. These were referred to other registries, first making sure, that our own field is well tested. We note also a decided increase in calls for hospital care. This trend bears out the prophecy made by Miss Slayton a few years ago that Private Duty Nursing in the home is decreasing.

During the year our personnel has changed somewhat, 28 returned to hospital work, 8 Social Service, 5 clinics and 11 have married. We have had one death. The great majority however have remained in the field which shows Private Duty Nursing has its medium for attraction and service.

The Commercial Registry situation has become such a menace to Professional registries, that drastic measures seem necessary to combat their mushroom growth. Several meetings were called. A group of lay women and those of authority in the nursing profession are now taking steps to solve this problem. In this connection we wish to express our grateful appreciation to Mrs. Osborn and Mrs. Hess for their untiring efforts in our behalf.
