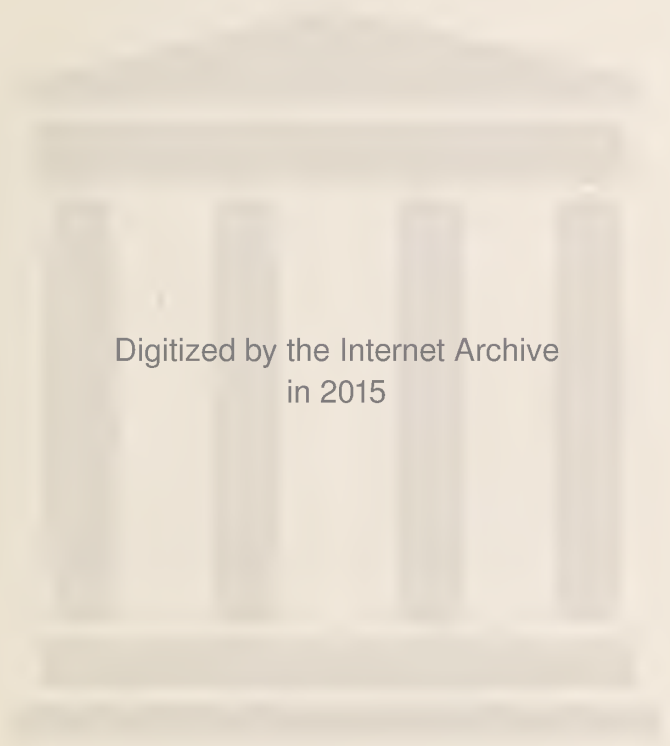

REPORT OF THE BABIES' WARDS

POST-GRADUATE HOSPITAL

303 EAST 20TH STREET, NEW YORK

THIRTY years ago almost to a day this Ladies' Auxiliary was organized "to assist in every possible way in the building up of the Babies' Wards of the Post-Graduate Hospital, and to interest their friends and the general public in the support of this new work for the sick babies and young children of the poor of our great city." I offer to you today the 30th Annual Report which the same chairman has presented. Let us recall the fact that the "Babies' Wards" was the first separate Division of a General Hospital opened in this city for the special medical and surgical treatment of babies, while the first attempt at real Social Service work connected with a hospital in New York was made when thirty years ago a Sub-Committee of this Auxiliary was appointed "to visit the homes, to investigate the surroundings of each patient, to provide suitable places for discharged convalescents, to prepare leaflets for the instruction of the mothers," etc. Beginning with six members (of whom two still remain on our committee) with one small ward, in a house adjoining the old hospital, containing ten sick babies and very little else, we have grown to a Board of Sixty Active and Associate Members supervising a separate Babies' Wards Division of the

great Post-Graduate Hospital—containing sixty-one beds with twenty-four rooms and a fine Roof Garden. *During these years the Wards have sheltered over 31,805 little children.*

While the domestic supervision of the Wards, the oversight of the nursing and the raising of the large and constantly increasing sums of money needed for their support, were placed, by the Post-Graduate Directors from the beginning in the hands of this Auxiliary, their medical and surgical charge was, of course, entrusted to skillful physicians and surgeons who have freely given their valuable service for the alleviation and cure of the sufferings of young children, accomplishing good results which at times have seemed almost miraculous. It is pleasant to record that in all these years there has never been the least friction with them, while their uniform kindness and courtesy to us have been beyond praise considering our rather trying expectations "that every patient should be cured." The Wards have been served by a changing series of House Doctors and Nurses in training, who have done much good work, while our five or six able Head Nurses have shown a conscientious devotion which has really been wonderful.

It is impossible to estimate accurately just what the work accomplished by the Babies' Wards, not only for the city but for the country at large has been. Methods of keeping "vital statistics" have been repeatedly changed, so that comparisons cannot be safely made, but the infant mortality of New York has been greatly reduced in a generation and the Babies' Wards have certainly had a large part in this good work. Then also we cannot measure the beautiful possibilities which lie in every child's existence. Some of the great men of the world

were born in a gutter, and a little waif whose life has been given back to it in our Wards may accomplish a work in the world which shall last long after those sceptical souls who discuss whether "it had not better be left to die"—shall have died themselves and been forgotten. Of the thousands cured during these long years many have grown up to robust manhood and womanhood able to take their part in the work of the world. Some joined the great armies which our country sent forth for the help of the nations, and we need not draw on our imagination to see among the white crosses so thickly planted in the fields of France and Belgium—some which mark the resting places of "our boys" who laid down a life saved by the Babies' Wards—for the redemption of the world.

Many agencies have combined to render possible the great work which has been accomplished during these thirty years. The *Sunbeam League*, now the Junior Auxiliary, was organized only a few months after the Ladies' Auxiliary by a member of our Board—Mrs. Valentine G. Hall, whose recent lamented death has deprived us of one of our earliest and most valued helpers, whose efforts contributed largely to the erection of our New Wards—and whose interest in them never flagged even in the midst of her last years of suffering. A full report of the most valuable work of the Junior Auxiliary appears elsewhere. More than twenty years ago the *Babies' Wards Guild* was started under the able chairmanship of Mrs. Lloyd, who still holds that position. The aid this Guild has given in the furnishing of bed linen for the Wards—sheets, pillow-slips, screen covers, pads, towels, etc., has been inestimable. Next came the *Girls' Visiting Committee* started by Mrs. Robb eighteen years ago. The smiles and cheer which accompanied the

frequent visits of these bright young girls often did our little sufferers more good than any medicine. For the past five years, changed into the *Social Service Committee*, it has taken the entire support and supervision of the most important work of the *Visiting Nurse*. For twenty-five summers the Country Home for Convalescent Babies at Sea Cliff has received numbers of our convalescents and through the excellent care given them has undoubtedly saved many lives. Founded by Managers of the Babies' Wards it is now carried on by a large, able and entirely independent board, taking convalescents from many institutions. The Speedwell Society at Morristown has continued through the whole of many years its invaluable aid to our tiny ones, caring in separate homes for those too young or too ill to be taken by any other agency—and in so doing has accomplished a good difficult to estimate.

Countless societies and individuals in New York and throughout the country have assisted each year in furnishing the innumerable articles both of necessity and comfort needed in a Babies' Hospital. Back of all these, gratitude, which I can with difficulty express here, is due to that great body of generous friends, of sympathizers with suffering infancy and childhood—on whose pecuniary gifts the support of the Wards has rested. Through subscriptions, donations, special gifts, support or endowment of beds and contributions for the erection and furnishing of the new Wards, they have given us *during the past thirty years nearly six hundred thousand dollars*. Special mention should be made of an annual gift for the past three years of \$4,000 from Mrs. Raymond Baker as the interest of a proposed "Memorial Fund" to Mr. Alfred Vanderbilt. This gift has provided for the entire support of one

of our wards and has been of untold benefit. It is true that during a generation of work there have been some discouragements, many struggles and a few hard times so that we have often been obliged to remind each other of Gladstone's famous saying that the "best work of the world had always been accomplished by humble ones who simply *kept at it*"—or of the saying of a greater one than Gladstone about "*patient continuance*."

In an effort to give even the faintest idea of a thirty years' work for an army of 32,000 little ones, there is scant space for a glimpse of the fascinating individual stories of our patients, but I must at least turn for you one leaf from the interesting note book of our Head Nurse.

"Ralph D.—When Ralph came to us he was a poor emaciated baby of seven months, with a bad eczema and pneumonia, weighing only ten pounds, but with the most wonderful big soft brown eyes. For days it seemed as though we would lose him but at last he began to take an interest in his bottle and his hands. His mother was a young girl of only seventeen and did not want him, so one day she signed papers giving him to our Head Nurse for disposal. After long anxious weeks of nursing Ralph became plump and cunning, and was sent to Sea Cliff Convalescent Home till his new mother could take him. While there he contracted measles from another child and was sent to Willard Parker Hospital, where he stayed for some weeks. Now he is almost cured of his eczema and we have a wonderful home for him where he will be cared for, educated and given a good start in business when he grows up."

"Gertude S.—Gertude was placed in my arms one day by the doctor with these words, "Put her in a mustard

bath quick. I am afraid she'll die before you can get it ready." Our nurses worked swiftly and well, and in an hour Gertrude, weak and exhausted but comparatively safe, was lying in her little white bassinette, with her young mother weeping over her for joy. No—she didn't die. She improved steadily from that time and had no more convulsions. We sent her home rosy and well, and to show her appreciation of our care of her baby, the mother came every day for the two weeks her little one was here and helped with the cleaning in the Wards."

"Frank C.—Frank came to us in the early spring with empyema following influenza. He was a dear little Italian boy of two years, with big brown eyes, soft black curls and an almost angelic smile. We operated and just as he was beginning to improve his mother and father both died of influenza, leaving him a little orphan. Baby though he was, he seemed to know and miss them and for many weeks he just lingered with us. One of the neighbors came to see him every Sunday and one day she decided to take him for her own, and in spite of the doctors telling her that he would probably have tuberculosis, she legally adopted him. When the Convalescent Home at Sea Cliff was reopened we sent Frank there for four weeks and he improved wonderfully. Last week out visiting nurse went to see him and told me that from a frail little waif he had become a plump, pink-cheeked, healthy looking boy."

"Josie W.—Every morning when I make my rounds, Josie is waiting for me with a sweet smile on her winsome little face. She is one of a family of five little Polish children, and although she is only two years old she will, if she has an opportunity, feed the other children or hold their cups for them to drink. In October,

Josie, with all her little brothers and sisters, had the measles, and although she apparently became as well as the others at the time, in November she developed nephritis and her poor mother, not being able to care for her, brought her to us. She was very ill for awhile, but is now so much improved that she can run around most of the day, but she will have to stay with us and be kept on a very strict diet sometime before we can let her go home."

The most pressing need of the Babies' Wards at present is a *greatly increased number of annual subscriptions and donations*, large and small, to meet the enormously increased cost of food, clothing, service, surgical and medical supplies, etc. Our auxiliary employs no collector or salaried officers. Every dollar given goes directly to the most immediate needs of the patient, and we earnestly appeal to you all for additional gifts in these emergency times. Even the tiniest sum may help to save a baby's life. The sum of \$200 toward the annually supported beds, which allows the giver to name the bed, is, of course, now utterly inadequate for its whole support. Until some changes now in contemplation can be made in the necessary amounts to be given for beds, we should be very glad to receive—as some givers of beds have always sent—special gifts toward meeting the deficiency. We hope that some "*Soldiers' Beds*" may be supported or endowed permanently as beautiful "*Memorials*" of young lives just entering into noble manhood—which have been so freely poured out for the salvation of the world.

Gifts of *clothing*, new and old, will be most acceptable and full particulars of these needs are given in the Appendix following. *Toys, rag dolls and rattles, fruit and home made jellies* are much needed. Also the personal

help of visitors to amuse little ones recovering from severe operations and to sing to the babies will be of great value. Most of all, however, we need women, young or old, to join our various working committees who are willing to give a few hours of their time regularly each week, to help with their hearts and brains to solve the great problems before us.

The Babies' Wards are standing just now at the entrance of magnificent avenues of work and usefulness, which are opening out before them. It rests entirely with you women of our various committees as workers, and on the pecuniary gifts of generous friends of suffering infancy whether or not we shall enter them. For the past three years we have been as it were at a stand still, with many of our physicians and nurses serving on the field, with painful lack of visitors, with numbers of our managers and helpers giving, as was right they should, their whole hearts and strength to War Relief, with a great falling off of students in the School, and hampered by limitations of leadership—we have struggled on, trying to keep the Wards open as widely as possible for the sick children of the poor who are always with us—and looking forward to the time when “the war was

over." Now that blessed time has come, and we trust that all will realize that the most important work now before us is that for the young children of our great country, the citizens of tomorrow. To start them in life with deformities straightened, with inherited weaknesses overcome, with the strong bodies which alone will enable them to succeed in the struggle for existence which is before them, is the most pressing need and duty of the day. The destinies of our country thirty years hence lie with the babies of today and I implore you most earnestly not to withhold your help at this vital moment.

The closing of great medical opportunities in Berlin and Vienna to student doctors is sending them by the hundreds to New York for Post-Graduate Instruction, while the fact that for the past three years work has been so urgently needed for the adult soldiers, has rendered close study of infantile diseases and injuries very difficult. Now from the most remote districts physicians are coming to the Post-Graduate Medical School and the great teaching hospital connected with it, to study up how to save the little ones—this throws upon the Babies' Wards the grave responsibility of raising their standard of work in every direction to the very highest point possible, that cures accomplished here may mean the cure of suffering and dying children from Alaska to Honolulu, from California to the Philippines. The recent advances in medical and surgical treatment which have made the impossible possible must be utilized by the attending doctors at any cost for new remedies or appliances. Exhaustive studies in the better control of hospital contagion must be started at once, while such a special training of our pupil nurses should be provided as will render the phrase, "trained in the Babies' Wards"—a guarantee that

if the life of an infant can be saved by the best of nursing it may be expected.

The recent demand of a large number of trained nurses for the "day-laborers' eight-hour day" instead of their present day of "professional workers"—almost of necessity, as with doctors, lawyers, etc., a longer one—will, if yielded to, necessitate three changes of nurses daily, and inevitably be disastrous to all teaching hospitals for young children, unless the number of nurses supplied and its consequent cost be very greatly increased. Most thorough study of this vital question should be given by all interested in hospital work before any decision is arrived at. The proper care and nursing of helpless baby sufferers demands a much larger (proportionately) number of nurses than needed for most adults—and the welfare of the patients should be the first consideration.

During the past three years conditions of life have changed everywhere, so wonderfully that the most careful study and investigation on the part of our committee is needed to show us how to meet them. This can not be adequately given in an occasional monthly meeting, but requires frequent and conscientious following up of great problems in our own and other hospitals. It demands hard work from you all, such painstaking and valuable work as you have cheerfully given to meet great war emergencies. Money also must be more liberally contributed, as is needed to keep up with the greatly increased cost of hospital living, while scores of new helpers must be enlisted to carry out great improvements which can be made in every direction. The program may be a difficult one, yet I would beseech you not to let these little ones perish for lack of the help which we might have given them. It is not a light task which I set before

you, and we must all be filled with a real longing to serve these patient sufferers even at the cost of weariness, of relinquishment of many pleasures, of much self-sacrifice, remembering for ourselves the wonderful motto of the trenches, "We must pay with our bodies for our souls' desires."

Let the "other babies" voice their own plea.

"From the fringes of Manhattan
"Where the crowded quarters lie
"And no one sees a bit of grass
"And just a strip of sky,
"From the slums—soft there comes
"In the air a plaintive wailing,
"Faint and feeble yet prevailing
"Pleading, 'Help us or we die,'
"Hard the heart untouched with pity
"By the babies' cry."

Do not let us rest satisfied with our "pretty wards"—and the smug feeling, "Oh, we are doing as well as any other hospital," but let us all, Doctors, Nurses and Managers—*work, work, work*, until we achieve the very best results possible for the help of sick babies.

"He that careth for the sick and wounded
"Watcheth not alone
"There are three in the darkness together
"And the third is the Lord
"Blessed is the way of the helpers
"The companions of the Christ."

APPENDIX

ARTICLES OF CLOTHING NOW URGENTLY NEEDED AT THE BABIES' WARDS

Patterns for clothing will be furnished on application to Chairman of Clothing Committee, MRS. HENRY STEERS, Portchester, New York.

BABIES' WHITE MUSLIN SLIPS, simply made. SOCKS, COTTON DIAPERS, FLANNEL BANDS.

SHORT DRESSES of either pink or blue gingham. SHORT WHITE FLANNEL SKIRTS, made with cotton waists.

MUSLIN DRAWERS, all for children from one to six years old. NIGHT GOWNS, muslin or flannel.

FLANNEL SHIRTS, for children from ten months to six years old. These *must* have high necks and long sleeves. SHOES, STOCKINGS, CROCHETED BED SLIPPERS, pink or blue. HANDKERCHIEFS.

WARM CLOAKS for babies, and OUTSIDE JACKETS and HATS for children for Roof Garden.

PADS, 27 by 36 inches, of unbleached muslin, with interlining of cotton batting firmly quilted in.

COVERLETS, 1 yard by 1½ yards, white, cheesecloth, with double interlining of cotton batting; button-holed round the edges and caught down in tufts with pink or blue washing crewel.

HALF WORN CLOTHING and OLD BLANKETS for children convalescents discharged from the Wards. An old overcoat or shawl is sometimes the only article brought to cover a discharged child recovering from pneumonia.

REPORT OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY COMMITTEE FOR 1919

The Junior Auxiliary Committee supports a bed in the Babies' Wards with its Annual dues, four other beds are supported by individuals, one in perpetuity. Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners of turkey, cranberry jelly, ice cream and fruit were supplied and the Christmas stockings filled with toys and simple candy.

A friend of the Babies sent a check for fifty dollars in memory of her mother, to be spent on some special need. It was found that a suction pump for use in empyema and tracheotomy cases, also in tonsil operations, was greatly needed as the old one was worn out from much use. This we were able to supply.

The contribution from the Needlework Guild this year was 325 new and useful garments, an increase of 225 over the contribution of 1916, and 53 more than last year. This increase was partly due to the fact that the Junior Auxiliary Committee decided in 1917 to have a representative of the Committee as a Director of Section 69 of the Guild, through which the garments have always come, and a number of members became contributors through her, thus obtaining added votes and garments for the Wards, this was also done unofficially in the Ladies' Auxiliary Committee.

The Committee tries to keep the toy boxes in order and filled with new toys, they have also sent in contributions of jelly, but our sick babies are as destructive of toys and sweets as your well ones, and the cupboards are never full enough, though both the playthings and the goodies

are as necessary for our small invalids as fresh air and sunshine and the devoted care of our nurses. We can buy toys at wholesale and would most gratefully receive any contributions for that purpose sent to our Treasurer, Mrs. Charles E. Brugler, Lakewood, New Jersey. Toys and jelly can be sent to the Wards, care of Miss Worth, the Head Nurse.

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REPORT OF SOCIAL SERVICE COMMITTEE OF THE BABIES' WARDS

During the past year the work of this committee has been carried on under difficulties owing to the absence of many of our members.

The children in the Wards were given their customary drives during the summer as well as holiday treats, and a tree and toys at Christmas.

We gave up the support of two beds in the Babies' Wards and undertook, in conjunction with the Church Mission of Help and the Children's Aid Society, to support the Yonkers unit of the Speedwell Society for six months. Twenty children were sent there during the summer. We have renewed this agreement for another six months from January 1st, 1920, hoping at the end of that period to be able to continue it.

Our nurse, who began her work with us on April 1st, reports 1,018 calls made, out of which 306 were new cases. During the summer she sent 59 children to country or convalescent homes; 9 mothers to the country or Floating Hospital, as well as 7 babies with the other children of their families; 46 mothers and children were given day outings. This does not include the large number of children regularly taken by the Convalescent Home at Sea Cliff and those sent to Speedwell.

Christmas, through friends of the committee, a toy or article of clothing was provided for every child in nineteen families, and a large number of others were

sent to Christmas entertainments. Dinners were given to three families, as a Christmas gift, milk daily for one month to two families.
