## HISTORICAL NOTE

---

SEPTEMBER 4, 1904—The late Dr. Henry W. Frauenthal established a clinic at Lexington Avenue and Fiftieth Street, for the study and treatment of orthopedic conditions.

OCTOBER 11, 1905—The Hospital was incorporated and chartered by the State Department of Charities, as the Hospital for Deformities and Joint Diseases.

NOVEMBER 4, 1906—The Hospital was opened. Its first home was at the present site in one remodeled brownstone house. Capacity—7 beds and dispensary facilities.

NOVEMBER 19, 1906—First organization meeting of the Ladies' Auxiliary.

MARCH 1, 1908—Began to share in the funds of the United Hospital Fund, then known as the Hospital Saturday and Sunday Association.

JANUARY 1, 1910—Three brownstone houses internally connected and externally joined by open porches, constituted the Hospital of 56 beds and Dispensary.

NOVEMBER 4, 1913—The cornerstone was laid of a new Out-Patient building at 41 East 123rd Street.

NOVEMBER 3, 1914—The new six-story Out-Patient building was dedicated and occupied. During its first year 4,505 new patients made 50,186 visits. The removal of the dispensary facilities to new quarters immediately permitted the bed capacity to increase to 105 beds.

JANUARY 1, 1917—Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies was organized, and the Hospital was admitted to membership.

NOVEMBER 14, 1921—Name changed to Hospital for Joint Diseases.

JANUARY 1, 1922—Demolition of all old buildings on Madison Avenue front, making way for the new building.

MAY 6, 1923—Cornerstone was laid of the present main Hospital building.

OCTOBER 5, 1924—New Hospital building dedicated and two days later patients admitted.

NOVEMBER 1, 1924—Establishment of Social Service Department.

JANUARY 1, 1925—The Laboratories occupied new quarters, equipped and manned for research and routine procedures.

JANUARY 1, 1925—The Hospital set aside 43 beds for a special semi-private service to patients of moderate means. The Hospital rates were fixed at \$5.00 a day for adults and \$3.57 for children.

DECEMBER 1, 1925—Mr. Alfred M. Heinsheimer established the Natalie and Louis Heinsheimer Memorial by donating to the Hospital his magnificent estate at Far Rockaway, and by creating a trust fund for its maintenance. The buildings were converted for hospital use and on May 16, 1926, they were dedicated. On June 25, 1926, the Country Branch was occupied by patients.

MARCH 11, 1927—Dr. Henry W. Frauenthal, the Founder of the Hospital died. His monument is the Hospital he founded.

JULY 1, 1927—The first award was made of the Henry W. Frauenthal Travel Scholarship, for special study in the leading clinics and laboratories of this country and Europe.

OCTOBER 27, 1929—Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Brown established two Orthopedic Research Fellowships.

OCTOBER 7, 1930—The Walter M. Brickner Memorial Fund was founded for the purpose of deepening interest in the sciences of medicine and surgery.

The Sir Robert Jones Lectureship was established—its object being the diffusing of knowledge in orthopedic surgery.

MAY 16, 1936, and thereafter during the years 1936 and 1937, land was purchased on East 123rd Street and East 124th Street—as the site for the new Out-Patient building.

JUNE 6, 1938—The cornerstone was laid for the new Out-Patient building.

FEBRUARY 7, 1939—The new Out-Patient building was opened for the reception of patients.

NOVEMBER 23, 1939—The new Out-Patient building was officially dedicated as the "Leo L. Doblin Memorial" in grateful recognition of Mr. Doblin's generosity and devotion to the Hospital.

MAY 27, 1940—The Trustees of the Hospital accepted a generous gift from Mr. John Polachek towards the cost of the modernization and equipment of the old Dispensary building, to be dedicated in loving memory of Melanie Faith Polachek Cournand, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Polachek.

TODAY the Hospital consists of the main eight-story building occupying an entire block on Madison Avenue, the Nurses' Residence Building, the old Out-Patient Building, the new Out-Patient Building, one building used as employees' quarters—all in New York City, and the Country Branch on fourteen acres of land in Far Rockaway, N. Y. The Hospital accommodates 355 patients including accommodations for 60 patients in the Hospital's Country Branch. The Out-Patient Department renders an average of 746 treatments a day.

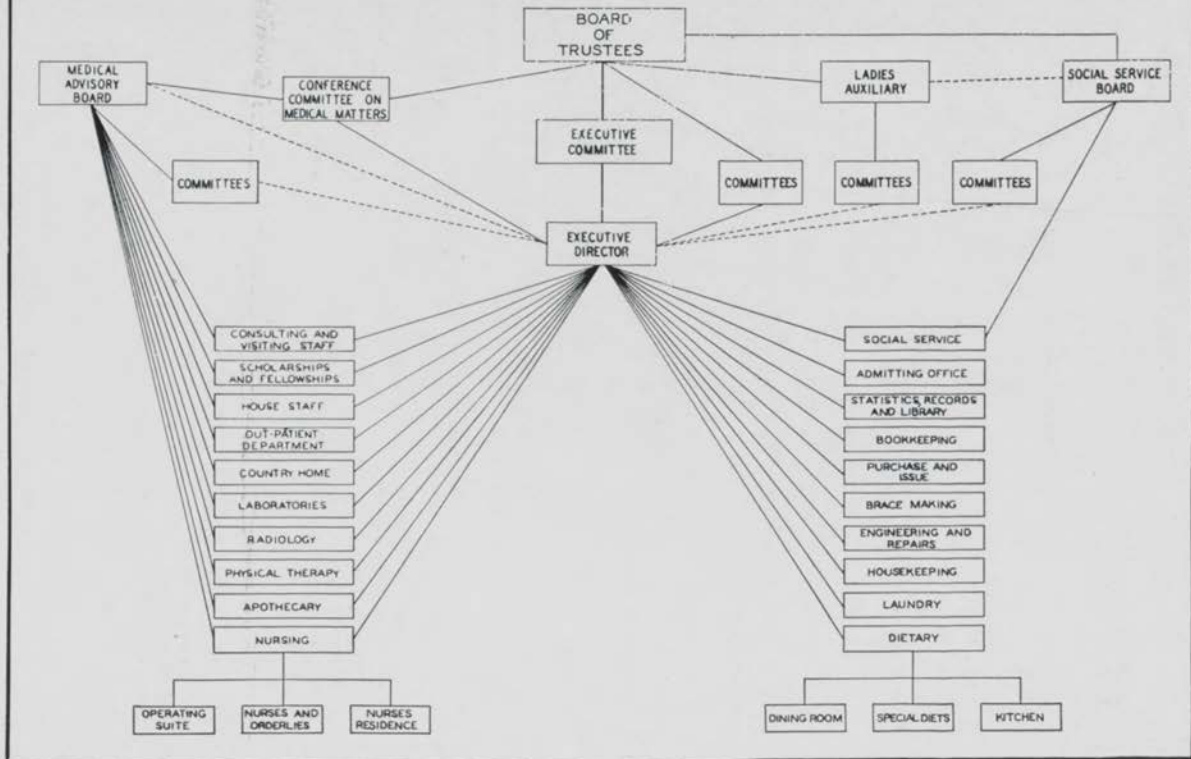

MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-THIRD ANNUAL MEETING

---

Minutes of the Thirty-third Annual Meeting of the Hospital for Joint Diseases, held at the Hotel Plaza at 7:30 P.M., on Monday evening, April 29, 1940.

Fifty members of the Corporation, constituting more than a quorum, were present.

Mr. Max Wilner, Chairman of the Board, was designated to preside at the meeting, and Mr. Louis M. Loeb, the secretary, acted as Secretary.

In view of the fact that the minutes of the Thirty-second Annual Meeting, held on April 24, 1939, had been printed in the Annual Report of the Hospital, which had been circulated among the members of the Corporation, the reading and approval of the minutes of that meeting were dispensed with.

Mr. Frederick Brown, President of the Hospital, read his annual report for the year 1939. The report outlined the major activities of the Hospital and gave statistical information concerning the amount and extent of services rendered by the Hospital during the year.

It was unanimously resolved that the report of the President be accepted, approved and published in the Annual Book.

Mr. Louis F. Rothschild submitted a summary of the Treasurer's report for the year 1939, as follows:

- First:* The property and investments of the Hospital and Country Branch are valued at approximately five million dollars.
- Second:* The Hospital spent, in 1939, over \$862,000 for salaries and commodities to maintain the main Hospital, Country Branch, Ladies' Auxiliary, and Social Service Department.
- Third:* The average cost of running the Hospital was \$2,364.05 a day, or \$98.50 an hour, for every hour of the 365 days of the year 1939.
- Fourth:* To make such an expenditure possible, there was received from patients, from State Aid and from the City of New York over \$556,000.
- Fifth:* The balance of over \$306,000 represents the amount of free service in terms of dollars which the Hospital, in all its activities and departments, rendered to the community during the year 1939.

*Sixth:* This gross deficit of the main Hospital, Country Branch, Ladies' Auxiliary, and Social Service, amounting to about \$305,000, was reduced in the following manner:

\$184,679.33	received from Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies;
47,896.62	received from the United Hospital Fund, for the Hospital and the Country Branch;
21,726.87	received from The Greater New York Fund for the Hospital and Country Branch;
5,000.00	received by the main Hospital from the Country Branch (Natalie and Louis Heinsheimer Memorial) Maintenance Account;
10,785.05	received from Country Branch surplus account;
92.44	miscellaneous receipts;
\$270,180.31	Total.

This leaves a net deficit of \$34,724.31, as follows:

Main Hospital Deficit .....	\$34,399.83
Ladies' Auxiliary Deficit .....	1,623.40
Social Service Surplus .....	(1,298.92)
Total Deficit .....	\$34,724.31

The Treasurer stated that a detailed statement of assets and liabilities, income and expenditures would be submitted to the Board of Trustees and would be published in the Annual Book.

The report of the Treasurer, read to the meeting, was accepted and approved.

Mr. Gustave Veit, on behalf of the Nominating Committee, submitted the report of that Committee, recommending that the following named persons be elected Trustees for a term of three years to expire at the Annual Meeting to be held in the year 1943, and until their successors shall be elected and qualify:

There being no other nominations, and the recommendations of the Nominating Committee being duly seconded, the above named persons were unanimously elected Trustees of the Hospital for the terms indicated and until their successors shall be elected and shall qualify.

The Chairman thereupon announced that the above named Trustees were duly elected.

Mr. Veit, on behalf of the Nominating Committee, then submitted that Committee's report, recommending that the following be elected as the Nominating Committee, to serve until the Annual Meeting in the year 1941:

There being no further business, the Thirty-third Annual Meeting of the Hospital for Joint Diseases thereupon adjourned.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT  
FOR THE YEAR 1939

---

The many and significant activities of our Hospital during the past year will be described in detail in the printed Annual Book which is now being prepared for publication and which will soon reach you. This evening only a few selected items will be mentioned.

It almost seems as if the walls of our Hospital are being pushed apart, from year to year. Last year, it was thought that we reached the highest limit in volume of service. This year, we find that the Hospital's volume of service exceeded that of last year and is the highest in its history. Sixty-eight hundred and one patients received 97,893 hospital days' care in the main Hospital, and 113 patients received 21,390 days' care in the Country Branch—a total of 6,914 patients received 119,283 hospital days' care. In that number, are included 89,822 hospital days' care rendered to ward patients. In other words, 75 per cent. of all patients were in poor circumstances, receiving free care, or care at nominal rates. In the Out-Patient Department, where all patients are poor, 30,544 patients made 214,916 visits. The services patients received included 6,051 surgical operations; 70,021 laboratory examinations; 6,781 braces and orthopedic appliances; 37,249 x-ray examinations, and 225,799 prescriptions filled by the Pharmacy.

The New Out-Patient building was opened on February 7, 1939, and on November 23 of the same year it was officially dedicated as the "Leo L. Doblin Memorial" in the presence of distinguished guests and a large audience. The first year of its operation proved not only the need for these modern facilities, but we also had the satisfaction which came to us from the praise of our large staff of physicians and hospital experts, namely: that the building was intelligently planned and soundly constructed. For this achievement, we are indebted to the Building Committee. The cost of constructing the building was about \$700,000. Many generous donations to the Building Fund have been previously acknowledged. Tonight I shall mention only one of our benefactors—Mr. Henry Kaufmann—who recently made a new and generous contribution.

The old Old-Patient building has been vacated. We have completed plans and specifications for its remodeling. The remodelled building will give the Hospital essential space for Laboratories, X-ray Department, Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Social Service, Admitting Offices, a lecture room and sewing rooms for the Ladies Auxiliary. The cost of remodeling and equipping this building will be about \$155,000. We have available in cash and subscription about \$50,000 and are in need of about \$105,000. It is hoped that this amount of money will be raised during the coming months.

The Board of Trustees consists of 36 members. On June 16, 1939, Mr. Isaac Weill, a member of the Board since 1920, died. In his passing, the Hospital lost a devoted and generous friend. To Mrs. Weill and his brother, Emanuel

Weill, we extend our sincere sympathy. We also wish to record the untimely passing away of the noble and exquisite daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Polachek. The tragedy is beyond words, and the bereaved parents have our heartfelt sympathy.

On October 30, 1939, Mr. John Raiss was elected to membership on the Board, and has since proven a valuable addition.

Last year, the Hospital was honored by a grant of \$21,000 from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, for research. Four separate investigational activities have been undertaken; one has been completed, and three will soon be completed. This year, again, the Hospital received \$7,000 for research, and \$5,094.80 for the care and after treatment of infantile paralysis patients, or a total of \$12,094.80. We appreciate the generous contributions made by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The Trustees of the Natalie and Louis Heinsheimer Trust Funds for the benefit of the Country Branch of the Hospital, have bought the Hospital's mortgage for \$250,000, held by the Harlem Savings Bank. Previously, the Hospital paid four per cent interest. The Hospital now pays  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent., but only 3 per cent. is for interest, and the remainder toward the reduction of the principal. The Heinsheimer Funds held government securities largely, the yield of which was about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. The Country Branch thereby increased its earnings by about one-half per cent., and the Hospital saves one per cent. in interest, although it is paying about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. in amortization of the principal.

The Hospital's Country Branch succeeded in being included under State Aid grants, which allow \$3.00 a day per child cared for, instead of \$1.15 to \$1.40 a day paid by the City of New York for patients who are public charges. This resulted in an income for the year of about \$48,000 as against \$24,000 for the previous year. From this source, we doubled our income in 1939.

During the year, the Hospital received as a gift the unusual and rare pathological collection of Professor Erdheim of Vienna. Professor Erdheim was a most outstanding pathologist for a period of 40 years. His collection of specimens has rare museum value. Upon his death, he bequeathed the entire collection to Dr. Ernst Freund, one of his pupils. Dr. Freund was awarded the Frederick Brown Research Fellowship in 1932. He served that year, and made an excellent contribution to the field of tuberculosis of the bones and joints, as a result of his studies at the Hospital. He died in December, 1938, and he, in turn, bequeathed the Erdheim collection to Dr. Henry L. Jaffe, our Director of Laboratories. Dr. Jaffe presented the collection to the Hospital. We are planning to provide a special museum to display this fine scientific exhibit.

The Medical Advisory Board, consisting of the heads of the clinical and laboratory divisions, has been engaged in the important task of professional standards of service. The Board represents our medical staff of more than 300 carefully selected physicians and surgeons. We are proud of the character of the professional work of our medical staff, and we wish to extend our appreciation of their generous and able service.

Many additions and changes in positions of our medical staff were made. All will appear in the Annual Book. Here we will mention only the appointment of Dr. Samuel Brock as Attending Neurologist, and Dr. I. S. Tunick as Attending in Vascular Diseases.

In keeping with the progress of medicine, we established a new Allergy Clinic. We awarded two Frauenthal Travel Scholarships to two of our own outstanding residents in orthopedic surgery.

This year, we introduced the innovation of exchanging services. Dr. Leo Mayer took over Dr. Samuel Kleinberg's staff, and Dr. Kleinberg took over Dr. Mayer's staff. Thus, the staff members have the opportunity of gaining a more varied experience under both of these proficient heads of the orthopedic divisions.

We note with a great deal of pride that the reputation of Dr. J. J. Golub, our Director, is continually increasing beyond the confines of our own institution. He has been appointed Hospital Consultant in the planning of the new Lebanon Hospital and the new Hillside Hospital.

Under the leadership of an able Editorial Board, the Hospital launched the publication of a scientific Bulletin on orthopedic surgery and research work performed at the Hospital. The first issue was recently mailed to a selected list of physicians and medical libraries throughout the country.

Words are insufficient to express the Hospital's gratitude to our ladies' groups for the splendor they give to the Hospital, and for their daily accomplishments. Some of these ladies are: Mrs. Katzenstein, in charge of surgical dressings; Mrs. Samuel H. Levy, in charge of occupational therapy; Mrs. Plaut, President of Social Service, and Mrs. Brown, President of the Ladies' Auxiliary. They, and scores of other fine women, are indeed an inspiration to us all.

For several years, Mrs. Max Wilner, single handed, conducted a Thrift Shop, and raised considerable sums of money for the Hospital. Recently, she wisely turned over the shop to Federation. Her labors and generous support are matters of record, and we wish to take this opportunity to extend to Mrs. Wilner our deep appreciation.

Our modest members of the Board of Trustees do not look for praise or recognition. Their devotion to the Hospital, and the Hospital's fine record of service are to them satisfying rewards. They deserve the full credit for the Hospital's achievements. The officers and the members of the Board, especially the chairmen of the several committees, have made outstanding contributions toward the progress of the Hospital. To all of them, we extend profound appreciation. You all know who they are, so I need not read off a list of names to you.

A word of appreciation should be said of Mr. A. Rosenberg, the Assistant Director. His many years of loyal and understanding service are a matter of fine record. We are grateful to all our administrative department heads and to the entire Hospital personnel for their devoted services.

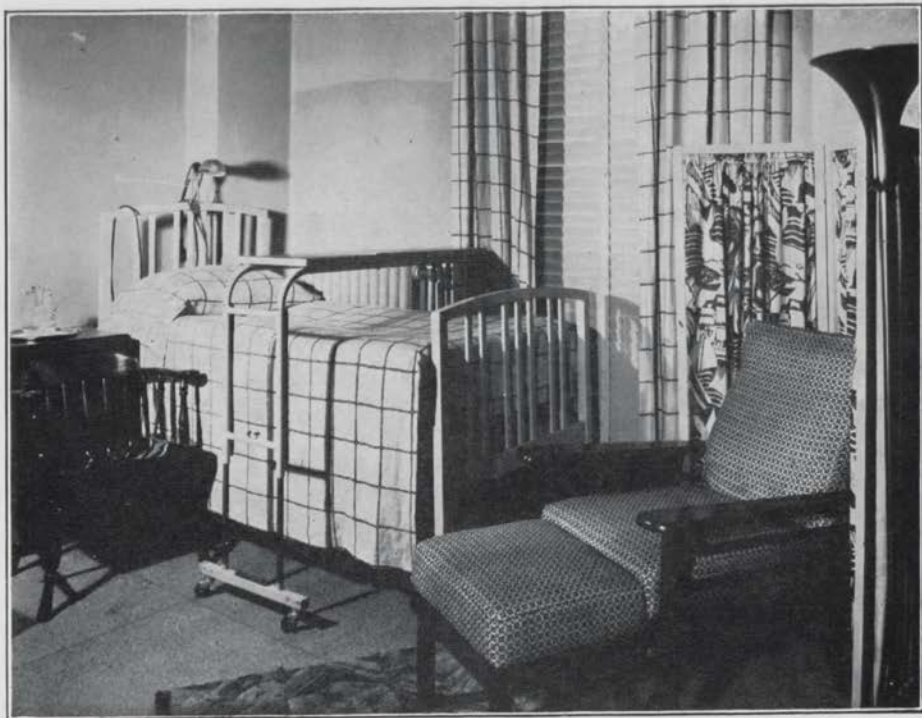

During these two years I considered it my duty to examine more carefully the components of the medical structure of the hospital, from their functional and organizational standpoints with a view toward furthering the co-ordination of the various groups composing the medical staff. I am pleased to say that on the whole the staff is functioning harmoniously and is loyal to the Hospital.

At this time, however, I shall not try to recount past performances or accomplishments of the medical staff, either individually or collectively. Whatever has been accomplished, whether in scientific effort, such as the excellent and stimulating work of the pathological laboratory, or in the improvement in the standards of medical practice, or in the maintenance of cordial relationship between the various departments in the Hospital, or in the enhancement of the good spirit in the daily contacts of the large and varied staff, is part of the record now.

It is the future in which we are mostly interested. The practice of medicine, as we knew it in the past, is undergoing changes. The transformation is subtle and insidious, so that the casual observer is hardly able to notice it. It is difficult to foretell the final outcome. We all, however, should be concerned with our immediate medical family and its needs. More than ever, we must develop a spirit of co-operation which will tend to improve the medical education and reputation as well as the economic status of every physician connected with the Hospital. The more than three hundred physicians connected with our Hospital have at their command a large and well-equipped institution to properly care for their patients. They should further strengthen the spirit of co-operation and loyalty towards the Hospital and one another. This will benefit all those in high as well as in low positions. The younger men on the staff have a difficult struggle to get on: the older and more established must not and cannot ignore that problem. There is a moral responsibility involved. Some method must be found whereby the thorny path of the young doctor can be made easier to travel. To accomplish it would entail little sacrifice here and there on the part of the older men. The younger men, in turn, must realize that their future medical careers are closely bound up with the development of the strongest possible co-operative spirit within the medical staff of the Hospital. This is a common responsibility during such a disturbing period in the history of medical practice.

More recently I have given serious thought to some of the problems confronting the Hospital which are essentially and ultimately of a medical nature. They primarily fall into the following categories:

1. During the next decade, due to the relentlessness of Father Time, a transformation of the Medical Advisory Board will take place. All of us, with

but few exceptions, will be relegated to the last position of refuge in hospital service, reaching the topmost of a successful medical career—that of consultant. From time to time our successors will be named. Serious thoughts must now be given to the problem. The ground must be properly prepared for the changes in sight. Each new appointment must continue to maintain at a high level the reputation of the Hospital and further strengthen it. The Medical Advisory Board of the future must always be a tower of strength in the medical life of the city. As in physics, where the chain is as strong as its weakest link, in the field of learning and in scientific institutions, the strength of a unit, whether it is a medical staff or a faculty, its proficiency, its prestige and its influence are projected by the strongest members. Marble halls and great edifices may add some to the reputation of a hospital, but a few great doctors will give it high and wide recognition.

2. The time is past when a hospital can rest on its laurels merely on the basis of service. It is not enough that good surgery is performed and good medicine is practiced and that patients are treated well. A hospital must keep abreast with and constantly be in the foreground of medical progress; otherwise it becomes stale. To avoid this it must become a teaching institution, either affiliated with a medical school or, if that is not possible, institute post-graduate instruction independently. Our Hospital is especially fitted for post-graduate teaching. We have an abundance of clinical material and a competent staff to deal with it. The new Out-Patient Building affords ample space to conduct small classes in nearly every major branch of medicine. If for the time being it cannot be done in all the departments, at least a start should be made in the orthopedic services. The importance of this cannot be overestimated. This Hospital is too important to be just one more hospital for the treatment of patients. It must help to blaze the way for medical advancement and progress.

3. A new era has begun in connection with specialization. No longer will the apprenticeship method of training specialists meet the requirements of the specialty boards. This problem is now concerning a number of us who are interested in the establishment of proper facilities and opportunities for the development of specialists whose training and experience will meet the requirements of the certifying boards. A change in the method of training interns will have to be instituted to make possible service for residents. Hospitals throughout the country hereafter will be required to evolve a suitable program for those who aspire to become specialists. Therefore, residencies in all important branches of medicine will have to be established. We have fulfilled that need in the Orthopedic Department yet force of circumstances will compel us to establish residencies in many other departments.

4. It is obvious that six orthopedic services functioning throughout the year cannot possibly have a large series of any particular class of cases. The work is too diffuse. No single service is capable of collecting a large number of orthopedic conditions. As a result, contributions to medical literature, emanating from the Hospital, necessarily suffer. The publications are based on too small a number of cases to be impressive. Some way, some method, must be evolved whereby the orthopedic surgeons will develop a system of grouping cases from all the services and correlate them for study and publication. The Hospital will gain by such a collective effort. Furthermore, such a plan would make it possible for all the members of the orthopedic division to be less fragmentary, less circumscribed in their work. It would create a better concept of the procedures utilized and the results obtained. All would benefit by an im-

partial scrutinization of each other's experience and an impersonal crystallization of ideas.

5. *Special Clinics.* The Hospital has not yet established a clear policy in connection with the creation of special clinics. This problem is agitating the minds of some members of the board. There seems to be divergent views on the question. Some are opposed to the further development of superspecialism, while others maintain that such clinics lend themselves to the proper study of special groups of cases and to improved therapeutic measures. No doubt, specialism can be carried too far. Nevertheless, there are some specific medical conditions which lend themselves to special studies. I am of the belief that, for the present at least, in order to round out our medical activities a peripheral-vascular clinic in connection with the orthopedic services, a thyroid clinic allied to the medical and surgical services, a sterility and contraceptive clinic associated with the gynecological clinic, demand our serious consideration and should be established as soon as possible.

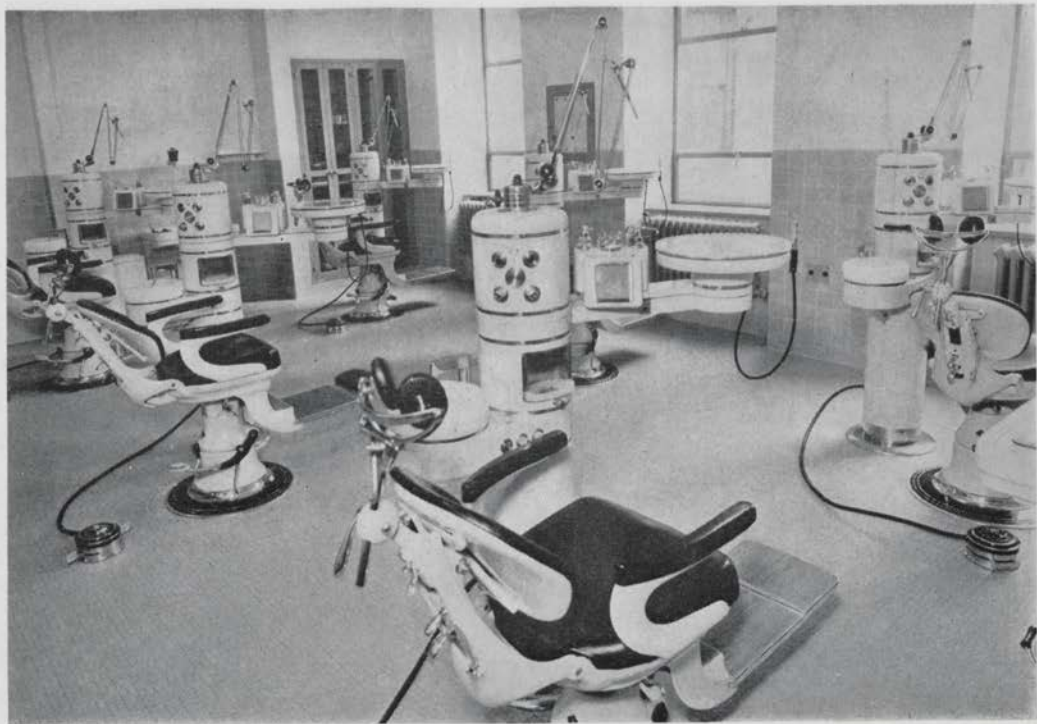
6. A proper foundation must now be laid for the future structure of the medical staff. Especially is this true in the orthopedic department. Orthopedic surgery is a comparatively young specialty. There is room for a great deal of pioneer work. No other specialty is as much concerned with skeletal dynamics. No other branch of medicine requires more knowledge of the physiology and anatomy of locomotion. The results of orthopedic procedures may be dramatic, yet tragic when incorrectly performed. Like in plastic surgery, the results are visible. The training of future orthopedists of the Hospital should commence now. Each year there should be selected from our graduates those who indicate that they possess the necessary qualifications and aptitude, and train and equip them for staff positions.

To solve these problems the Medical Staff and the Board of Trustees must continue to co-operate. I am convinced that with the guidance of the Medical Director, the lay and medical authorities of the Hospital can bring about the necessary changes which will make the hospital a greater instrument for communal service and maintain pace with changing trends in the fields of medical science and education.

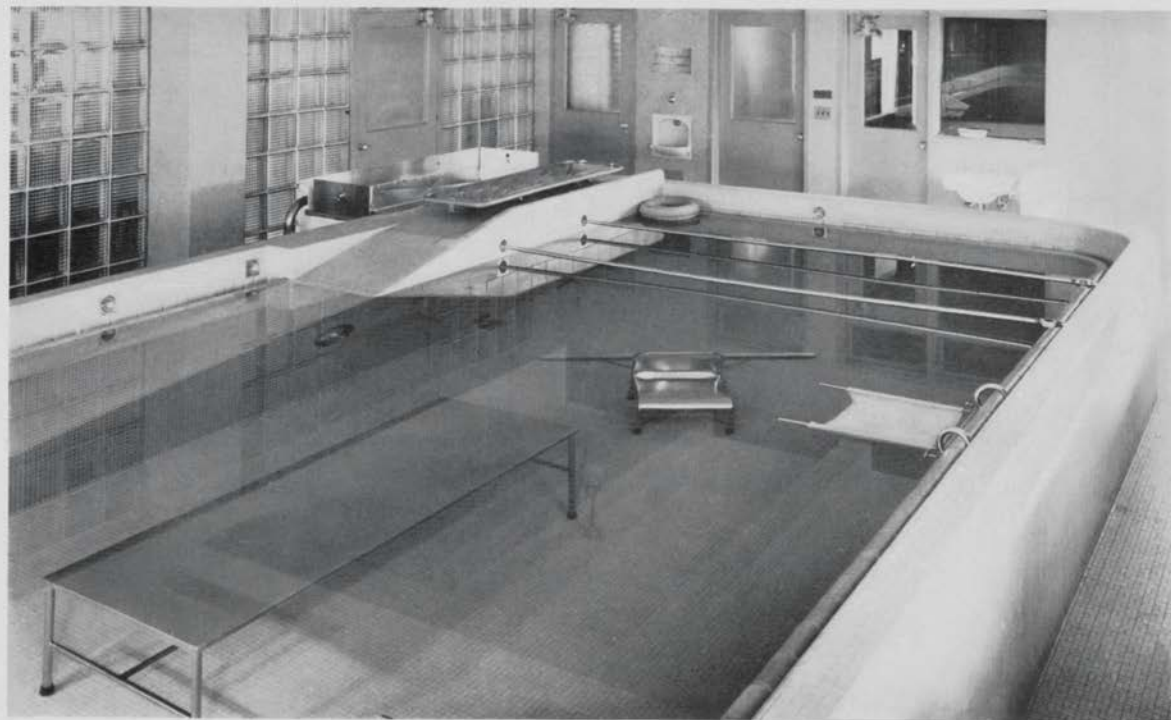

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF LADIES AUXILIARY  
FOR THE YEAR 1939

From the very inception of our hospital thirty-three years ago, the Ladies Auxiliary, under the leadership of the late Minnie Rothschild Frauenthal, has carried on the work of bringing help and comfort to the poor and sick. We are very happy to continue this responsibility of supplying the linens, furnishings for the rooms, and the preparation of the surgical dressings for the Hospital which she so loved and with which we are all so proud to be affiliated.

We do not yet have the enlarged quarters for the Auxiliary which we had hoped to occupy this year, owing to the untimely demise of our beloved trustees, Mr. Sanford Jacobi and his brother, Mr. Harold Jacobi, both of whom were active on the Building Committee. This has temporarily retarded the plans for the remodelling of the old Dispensary building. With better times and under the progressive leadership of our Board of Trustees, we hope in the near future to have these new quarters where we can continue to carry on our work.

As in previous years, the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies has been the principal financial support of our Auxiliary. In 1939, Federation allowed the Auxiliary \$11,475.00, which we gratefully acknowledge. From the United Hospital Fund, the Auxiliary received \$5,000.00. These organizations have supported us most generously and our workers should continue in the future, as they have in the past, to lend their efforts in the annual campaigns of these organizations. We shall also lend our cooperation in the campaign soon to be undertaken by the Greater New York Fund, which organization allocated \$835.00 to us in 1939.

The Ladies Auxiliary spent during the year 1939 the sum of \$18,933.40. After applying the contributions from Federation and the United Hospital Fund, there remains a deficit of \$1,623.40. As in the past, we are confident that we will meet this deficit.

From time to time, we have received donations toward our various funds, such as the Blood Transfusions, Happy Day Fund, furnishings for the new Out-Patient Department Building, and the Minnie Frauenthal Fund. To all donors we wish to express our heartfelt thanks.

Once again we wish to express our thanks to Mrs. Max Wilner, under whose able management the Unusual Thrift Shop thrives. In 1939, the Shop contributed \$1,486.00 towards our deficit. This project deserves the support of all our members.

To Mrs. Martin L. Katzenstein, to whom we owe our everlasting gratitude for her love and devotion to our institution, we express our heartfelt thanks. The Surgical Dressings Unit, which has now completed its fifteenth year of service reports that for the season just ended, these faithful workers made a total of 546,886 dressings. The Hospital is very grateful and very proud of each and every member belonging to this splendid unit. We also wish to express our thanks to Mrs. Leo Krigsmann, Honorary Chairman of the Surgical Dressings Unit for her helpfulness and cooperation.

A group of ardent workers from Central Synagogue, under the leadership of Mrs. Schrier made 1,426 garments for our hospital. This fine work carried on by these ladies is most commendable and we wish to convey to them our sincerest thanks.

Our thanks are due to Mrs. Charles Kaye and Mrs. Herman Plaut, Vice-Presidents, to Mrs. Ignac Neumann, Treasurer, to Mrs. Estelle F. Loeb, Secretary, and to Mrs. Morton Ollendorff, Corresponding Secretary, as well as to all the officers and chairmen of the various standing committees of the Ladies Auxiliary.

In the name of the Ladies Auxiliary, we wish to express our gratitude to the Social Service Department whose cooperation we highly appreciate. We also wish to thank the Gray Ladies, headed by Mrs. Eugene J. Bozsan, all of the chairmen of the various committees of Social Service, Miss Lillian M. Moore, Director of Social Service, and Miss Delia G. Dowling, Supervisor of Nurses, to Miss Mary K. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF SOCIAL SERVICE  
FOR THE YEAR 1939

---

During the year 1939 Social Service followed the pattern of organization and service of the several previous years. Demands for service increased but financial resources did not permit essential expansion of program to the extent desired. Only one new social worker was added and was assigned to the psychiatric clinic. We are yet to reach the goal of having a social worker in each clinical division. Several of our workers are assigned to more than one clinical division. Twelve social workers cover twenty-one clinics.

The year's work, as outlined in the adjoining statistical table, was accomplished with an expenditure of \$48,886.29. The large volume of work was carried on by a staff of twenty-two workers, consisting of a director, four secretaries, twelve social workers, three clerks, one head and one assistant occupational therapist. One of the traditional qualifications of our social workers is that they have not only adequate training in social service, but they are also registered nurses. The combined qualifications properly fit the workers to understand patients' needs, to interpret doctors' orders and aid in their fulfillment. The social worker's task begins as soon as the patient applies for treatment and continues for days, months, and even years, including his return for follow-up examination to insure permanent cure, until he is finally discharged as relieved of his ailment.

Through the medium of periodic joint meetings of a special committee of lay members of the Board of Social Service and the social workers the Board members become acquainted with the professional work of the department and the problems facing patients. In addition, the social workers hold weekly meetings and semi-monthly study sessions for the purpose of keeping abreast of the growing field of social service and of changing methods of diagnosis and therapy.

Social Service experienced almost a full year's work in the new clinic building, which provides individual Social Service rooms for each clinic division. Private and individual quarters for social workers of each clinic resulted in greater convenience, privacy and improved social service. The patients' problems can now be more carefully studied as the workers have the opportunity of coming closer to their patients.

Social Service concerns itself with providing patients with orthopedic shoes, braces, corsets, artificial limbs, other surgical appliances, and eye glasses. Most of the appliances are made in the Hospital's brace shop. Social Service pays for many of these items, for many others the Association for the Aid of Crippled Children pays, and for some the State pays out of State Aid funds. With reference to eye glasses, arrangements exist between a private optometrist who furnishes eye glasses to patients, for which Social Service pays. For some years Social Service has instituted a periodic payment plan, intended for patients who can afford to pay small amounts a week or month for costly braces, shoes or eye glasses. Under this plan Social Service collected \$2,699.17 in 1939. The payment plan, however, applies only to a small number of patients who are economically able to pay for appliances. The largest number of patients receive free appliances.

The orthopedic service continues to be the most active and the largest of all services. The patients are followed through this division to physical therapy, hydrotherapy and corrective exercise clinics. The number of intense cases in this clinic is large and keeps the four social workers very busy.

The new facilities have been particularly helpful to the social hygiene service. In this kind of work the privacy of a personal interview is important and requires the kind of facilities we now have. During the year seven hundred patients received treatment in this clinic, and this large number represents a very heavy assignment for one social worker. Fortunately, lately we succeeded in obtaining the services of three workers assigned by the National Youth Administration who assist with the clerical and follow-up work. The scientific approach of the work performed in this clinic is readily demonstrated by a recent publication in the November, 1939, issue of the *Journal of Social Hygiene*, entitled "Sociological Study of a Syphilis Clinic in a Voluntary Hospital," written by Dr. D. Edward Frank, a member of the medical staff and Miss Nettie Crosswhite, R.N., of the Social Service staff.

The rearrangement of the social workers' staff permitted the assignment of one worker to the services of proctology, oto-laryngology and gynecology. The identity of the problems of these clinics makes possible their combination under one social worker.

The value of social work cannot be better demonstrated in any clinic than in the cardiac clinic, which now numbers five hundred and eighty patients. This clinic, with the dual responsibility of research and medical care permits closer understanding of patients' medical and social requirements and affords an opportunity to the social worker to be of help in the program.

Many of the patients treated in other clinics concomitantly require mental hygiene. Conditions of unemployment, inability to provide adequately for self and family, fear of the future, and other psychological and economic causes create real problems with many of our patients. The psychiatrists in the Hospital's mental hygiene clinic ably assisted by a social worker, are scientifically approaching the mental problems of patients with satisfactory results. The work in the clinic helps these patients to obtain a firmer foundation upon which to carry their burdens and to adjust themselves.

The social worker in the pediatric clinic has the opportunity of seeing the family as a whole in relation to the child brought for medical care. Perhaps in no other field is the need for understanding so important as it is in matters of child-parent relationship and in the problems growing out of maladjustment and misunderstanding. The application of scientific social service in this clinic applies not only to the child but also the parent. The problems of malnutrition and poor housing play an important role in the health of the children who come to the pediatric clinic as well as their parents. The extent of medical social service must, of course, be limited to the immediate needs of the existing illness. Beyond that, contacts with other agencies are established as an aid to general problems, such as providing lunches in school for needy children and supplementary budgets to make possible the minimum requirements of the family.

It is generally known that the assurance of lasting cure cannot be always had at the time when the patient is ready for discharge from the Hospital. A large number of patients require convalescent care before their return to their

daily home activities or to work or to school. Furnishing convalescent care for the Hospital's patients is increasingly becoming a significant phase of Social Service. The department established close contact with convalescent homes and hospitals of a large variety, such as for orthopedic care, for cardiac conditions, for malnourished children, and for the post-operative and post-medical conditions. Thus, during the year sixty-six children with orthopedic conditions received convalescence in the following institutions: The Wave Crest Convalescent Home, The Convalescent Home for Hebrew Children, Bylthedale Home, St. Agnes' Hospital and Convalescent Home, and the Country Branch of the Hospital. Fifty children with cardiac conditions received convalescence at various convalescent homes including Irvington House and Reid Farm. The adult patients who required convalescent care were referred to the Solomon and Betty Loeb Memorial Home, Burke Foundation, the Jewish Home for Convalescents, The Jacob Posner Home, and St. Eleanora's Home for Convalescents.

Placing children in convalescent homes was not difficult, but placing adults and older children between the ages of sixteen and eighteen, particularly those with orthopedic conditions who require short convalescence, has been difficult. Places for them in suitable convalescent homes are scarce. The need is particularly unmet for adult colored and Porto Rican patients.

Besides convalescent care after illness of the kind which requires residence of the patient in a home, Social Service arranges each summer, as it has this year, three to four weeks of rest for fifty children, the cost of which is met by Social Service at the rate of between \$8.00 and \$10.00 a week for each child.

In a hospital like ours, where the patients' average days' stay in the Hospital is larger than in the average hospital, occupational therapy occupies an important place. Patients must be kept busy in work which interests them. The variety of activities in the Occupational Therapy Department is large enough to meet the usual aptitudes of patients. It consists of painting, weaving, carpentry, pewter and metal work, mat and rug making, sewing and knitting. This work is supervised and guided by two trained occupational therapists. Many of the articles made have not only art value but also that of utility. They are on exhibit in the department and are offered for sale to the public.

This department is now realizing the fruits of its labor. Two former patients who received their original experience and training in the Hospital's Occupational Therapy Department, are now employed on a Works Progress Administration Project in which they teach arts and crafts in playground centers.

A related activity of the department has been, during the past year, the six summer outings held during the months of July, August and September, in which three hundred and one patients participated, enjoying four days at Playland, Rye Beach and two days at Bear Mountain.

The efficiency and usefulness of this department is made possible by the able leadership, generosity and devoted services of Mrs. Samuel H. Levy.

To assure the future growth and service of Occupational Therapy the plans for the remodeling of the old Out-Patient Department Building call for a reconstruction of an entire half floor to be suitably equipped for this purpose. We are happy to acknowledge again a generous contribution on the part of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel H. Levy towards the cost of construction of the department in its future new quarters.

The Volunteer Service consists of Gray Ladies and other volunteers numbering one hundred and ninety-eight, who have given to the Hospital more than thirteen thousand hours of service during the past year. This represents the largest number of hours of service given since the creation of the Volunteer Service.

In the training of the Gray Ladies the Hospital works in close cooperation with the New York County Chapter of the American Red Cross, and we are particularly grateful to Mrs. Everett E. Risley, Mrs. William A. Rotholz, Mrs. Melissa Rowe and Miss Fredericka Farley, who have been helpful in this work.

For the success of the work profound appreciation is due Mrs. Eugene J. Bozsán, Chairman of the Volunteer Service, and the large corps of efficient volunteers for devoted service.

A word must also be said for the Surgical Dressing Group for their very kind cooperation with Social Service. Mrs. Martin Katzenstein, Chairman of Surgical Dressings, is also a diligent and valued associate in the United Hospital Fund Campaign.

The value of reading during prolonged illness has been long established and the value of establishing the habit of reading for those who do not have it is even more important. These have become two important objectives of the patients' library in the Hospital. To meet them the Hospital's circulating library consists of fifteen hundred books selected to meet the varied requirements of patients. During the past year three thousand requests for books were met. The library attempts to furnish books on business and professions for skilled and unskilled interests, for art and science, as well as for general reading purposes.

The Hospital's patients' library cooperates with the Harlem Branch of the New York Public Library, and we are particularly grateful to Miss Carolyn G. Thorne, in charge of the library, and to Miss Dorothy D. Klein, her assistant, whose guidance and sympathetic understanding have improved the service of the library. Of course, our gratitude goes to Mrs. S. L. Rothafel and the members of her Committee for their able supervision of this important work.

Of particular importance to patients whose stay in the Hospital is long is suitable entertainment. For years such entertainment has been provided by artists who volunteered their services and who entertained our patients through well organized programs held on the first Friday of each month. We are thankful to Miss Eva La Pierre of the New York Music Committee for her help in arranging the entertainment programs. Many outstanding artists, including the Junior League Glee Club have frequently participated in this work.

The highly entertaining programs are largely due to the tireless efforts of Mrs. Estelle F. Loeb, Chairman of the Entertainment Committee, her Associate Chairman, Mrs. James Barkhouse, and the members of the Committee, to whom we extend our appreciation.

The Holiday Committee has again performed a splendid piece of work. Christmas gifts to patients, especially to children, have been generous and have brought great joy. The children who received the stockings loaded with gifts in the Hospital and Country Branch appreciated that they were not forgotten by "Santa Claus". For the joy brought to the patients we are indebted to the tireless efforts of Mrs. Frederick Bender, Chairman of the Holiday Committee; to Mrs. Frederick Brown and the members of the Ladies Auxiliary for making

the Christmas stockings; and to the members of this Committee and those of Social Service in general for their generous assistance.

The work of furnishing clothing to our patients has been strengthened. The clothing received by Social Service as gifts, as well as the new clothing purchased to meet the modest needs of patients, numbered thirteen hundred and sixty-two articles.

We all feel that this work could be more vitally extended and could be of service to a larger number of patients in poor circumstances if we received from friends more gifts of wearing apparel.

To the able Chairman of the Committee, Mrs. Carl Sherman, grateful thanks is due for her devoted services.

As in previous years, the largest source of financial support Social Service received was from Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies. In the past year, including \$2,282.00 from the Greater New York Fund, it amounted to \$31,581.00 out of a total budget of \$48,886.29. The second largest amount, \$11,000.00, was received from the United Hospital Fund. These two organizations have the confidence of the community, and have demonstrated their ability to raise and furnish large sums of money to member-agencies for the continuance of service to the sick and poor. They deserve generous support. We, of Social Service, have always participated in the campaign for raising funds for these two organizations. We should like at this time to emphasize the importance of continuing our cooperation. We appeal to all of the ladies connected with our Hospital to become active workers in the campaign for funds.

We extend deepest appreciation to the captains and teams who have participated in the yearly fund raising campaigns of the United Hospital Fund and Federation. Theirs is a most important contribution to Social Service.

Social Service received a legacy of \$1,500.00 from the estate of Abraham L. Danziger under the terms of the will, which read as follows: "The balance of said net income shall be paid for the purposes hereinafter more fully set forth through the social service boards of such charitable public hospitals, from time to time mentioned in whole or in part by the City of New York under the same or a similar system as that under which the hospitals now known as 'Bellevue and Allied Hospitals' are at present maintained".

We have also been informed of a legacy from the estate of Edward A. Weiss under the terms of his will, which read as follows: "\$1,000.00 to the Social Service Department of the Hospital for Joint Diseases; \$500.00 of which is left in memory of deceased's dead sister, Carrie Weiss; \$250.00 in memory of Charles Kaye; and \$250.00 in memory of deceased's parents, Sarah and Jacob Weiss".

For several years now the Lillian Bloch Schwarz Happiness Group has been contributing \$108.00 towards the Shoe and Brace Fund.

Contributions of various other amounts have been received by the Social Service Department amounting to \$1,459.27. We wish to express to all these generous donors and friends the appreciation of Social Service for their interest and gifts.

Thus, Social Service completes another year of service. It finds itself in the happy position of having had the full cooperation of all divisions and departments of the Hospital. We are particularly grateful to the medical staff for its profound appreciation of the value of Social Service; to Mrs. Frederick Brown, President of the Ladies Auxiliary, and the members of her Committee for their assistance; to the executive staff of the Hospital, which has been a source of great encouragement in our work; to the Board of Trustees, which had become increasingly more acquainted with the activities of Social Service through periodic reports which the President of Social Service has read at meetings of the Trustees; and to the workers in the department for their devotion and progressiveness.

We are particularly grateful to the Association for the Aid of Crippled Children for having given, in addition to the generous payment of \$2,108.75 for orthopedic appliances and shoes for patients, the assignment of a full time public health nurse to the orthopedic service. The work of this nurse has strengthened the ties between the Hospital and the Association and has been of considerable value in service to patients.

Appreciation is also due to Mr. Arthur Friedman, Mrs. Samuel H. Levy's brother, who so generously contributes towards the summer outings.

A hospital like ours whose services are spread over wide areas of this city and which deals with a variety of conditions establishes contacts with a great many cooperating agencies who, in their respective fields, participate in the program not only of medical social service, but also of general health and relief. We owe a debt of gratitude to the following agencies for their cooperation with Social Service: The Jewish Social Service Association, The Department of Welfare, The Board of Child Welfare, The Community Service Society, The Works Progress Administration, The Catholic Charities, The Children's Aid Society, and the Henry Street Visiting Nurse Service.

Changing conditions affecting the economic and social aspects of the people of our community call for constant alertness on the part of Social Service to so adjust itself and to so alter its programs to meet newer requirements. From the standpoint of professional service we are happy to report that the department succeeded in keeping abreast of the march of time. The only major problem that faces Social Service is its inability to meet the ever-growing demands. We look forward to the time when financial support will be more readily forthcoming to enable us to meet the increasing demands for service.

The success of the year's constructive work is due to the officers and committee members of Social Service. Their selfless service and tireless efforts have contributed to the achievement of plan and program of Social Service.

## WHAT VOLUNTARY HOSPITALS MEAN TO THE CITIZENS OF NEW YORK

This Annual Report of the Hospital for Joint Diseases shows that over 37,000 persons were treated in the main Hospital, Country Branch, and Out-Patient Department. The Hospital patients spent 119,283 days in our care. The Out-Patient Department patients paid 214,916 visits.

We operated at a deficit of \$312,915. If hospitals employed commercial methods of accounting, there would be added to this: Depreciation at 3% on \$3,750,000 of buildings and \$400,000 of equipment—an annual charge of \$124,500; which would mean \$437,415 of free service in one year.

There should be added to this the value of the free services of over 350 physicians, surgeons, and specialists, many of them outstanding men in their professions, who receive no compensation except the satisfaction of work well done.

Beyond all this, the community benefits in better health, prevention of illness, advances in medical science and teaching, and the knowledge that such service is available when needed.

Voluntary hospitals need the support of every citizen.
