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HISTORICAL NOTE

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SEPTEMBER 4, 1904—The late Dr. Henry W. Frauenthal established a clinic at Lexington Avenue and Fiftieth Street, for the study and treatment of orthopedic conditions. This clinic marked the beginning of the hospital idea.

OCTOBER 11, 1905—The Hospital was incorporated and chartered by the State Department of Charities, now the Department of Social Welfare, as The Jewish Hospital for Deformities and Joint Diseases.

NOVEMBER 4, 1906—The Hospital was opened. Its first home was at the present site in one remodeled brownstone house, 1917 Madison Avenue. Capacity—7 beds and dispensary facilities.

NOVEMBER 19, 1906—First organization meeting of the Ladies' Auxiliary.

APRIL 7, 1907—Name changed by Board of Directors to Hospital for Deformities and Joint Diseases. Approved by an order of Supreme Court of State of New York on October 30, 1908.

MARCH 1, 1908—Began to share in the funds of the United Hospital Fund, then known as the Hospital Saturday and Sunday Association.

JANUARY 1, 1910—Three brownstone houses on Madison Avenue internally connected and externally joined by open porches constituted the Hospital of 56 beds and Dispensary.

NOVEMBER 4, 1913—The cornerstone was laid of an Out-Patient building at 41 East 123rd Street.

NOVEMBER 3, 1914—The six-story Out-Patient building was dedicated and occupied. During its first year 4,505 new patients made 50,186 visits. The removal of the dispensary facilities to new quarters immediately permitted the bed capacity to increase to 105 beds.

JANUARY 1, 1917—Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies was organized, and the Hospital was admitted to membership.

NOVEMBER 14, 1920—Name changed to Hospital for Joint Diseases. Filed and recorded on November 23, 1920.

JANUARY 1, 1922—Demolition of all old buildings on Madison Avenue front, making way for the new main Hospital building.

MAY 6, 1923—Cornerstone was laid of the present main Hospital and Nurses' Residence buildings.

OCTOBER 5, 1924—New Hospital building dedicated and two days later patients admitted.

NOVEMBER 1, 1924—Establishment of Social Service Department.

JANUARY 1, 1925—The Laboratories occupied new quarters in the main Hospital building, equipped and manned for research and clinical procedures.

JANUARY 1, 1925—The Hospital set aside 43 beds for special semi-private service to patients of moderate means. The Hospital rates were fixed at \$5.00 a day for adults and \$3.57 for children.

DECEMBER 1, 1925—Mr. Alfred M. Heinsheimer established the Natalie and Louis Heinsheimer Memorial by donating to the Hospital his magnificent estate at Far Rockaway, and by creating a trust fund for its maintenance. The buildings were converted for hospital use and on May 16, 1926, they were dedicated. On June 25, 1926, the Country Branch was occupied by patients.

MARCH 11, 1927—Dr. Henry W. Frauenthal, the Founder of the Hospital, died. His monument is the Hospital he founded.

JULY 1, 1927—The first award was made of the Henry W. Frauenthal Travel Scholarship for special study in the leading clinics and laboratories of this country and Europe.

OCTOBER 7, 1930—The Walter M. Brickner Memorial Fund was founded for the purpose of deepening interest in the sciences of medicine and surgery.

The Sir Robert Jones Lectureship was established—its object being the diffusing of knowledge in orthopedic surgery.

MAY 16, 1936, and thereafter during the years 1936 and 1937, land was purchased on East 123rd Street and East 124th Street—as the site for the new Out-Patient building.

JUNE 6, 1938—The cornerstone was laid for the new Out-Patient building—45 to 55 East 123rd Street.

FEBRUARY 7, 1939—The new Out-Patient building was opened for the reception of patients.

NOVEMBER 23, 1939—The new Out-Patient building was officially dedicated as the "Leo L. Doblin Memorial" in grateful recognition of Mr. Doblin's generosity and devotion to the Hospital.

OCTOBER 9, 1941—The Social Service Board and the Ladies Auxiliary Board were merged into one Women's Division, consisting of one group of officers, and the following Committees: Executive, Finance, Nominating, Social Service, Supply, Patients' Library, Diversional Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Volunteer Aides, and Country Branch.

FEBRUARY 7, 1942—The Melanie Faith Polachek Cournand Memorial (Professional Service Building) was dedicated and occupied in loving memory of the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Polachek. The modernization and equipment of the old Out-Patient building was made possible by a generous gift from Mr. John Polachek, and by contributions from Trustees and friends of the Hospital. The building contains the following services: Brace Department, Social Service offices, Admitting offices, Emergency Rooms, Physical Therapy Department, Radiology Department, Occupational Therapy, Sewing Rooms, Women's Division offices, Patients' Library, Blood Bank, Bacteriology Laboratory, Lecture Hall, Pathology Laboratory, Clinical Laboratory, Research Laboratory, and Animal operating rooms.

TODAY the Hospital consists of the main eight-story building occupying an entire block on Madison Avenue, the Nurses' Residence Building, the Professional Service Building, the Out-Patient Building, one brownstone house at 61 East 123rd Street—all in New York City, and the Country Branch on fourteen acres of land in Far Rockaway, N. Y. The Hospital accommodates 362 patients including accommodations for 60 patients in the Hospital's Country Branch. The Out-Patient Department rendered an average of 535 treatments a day during the year 1943.

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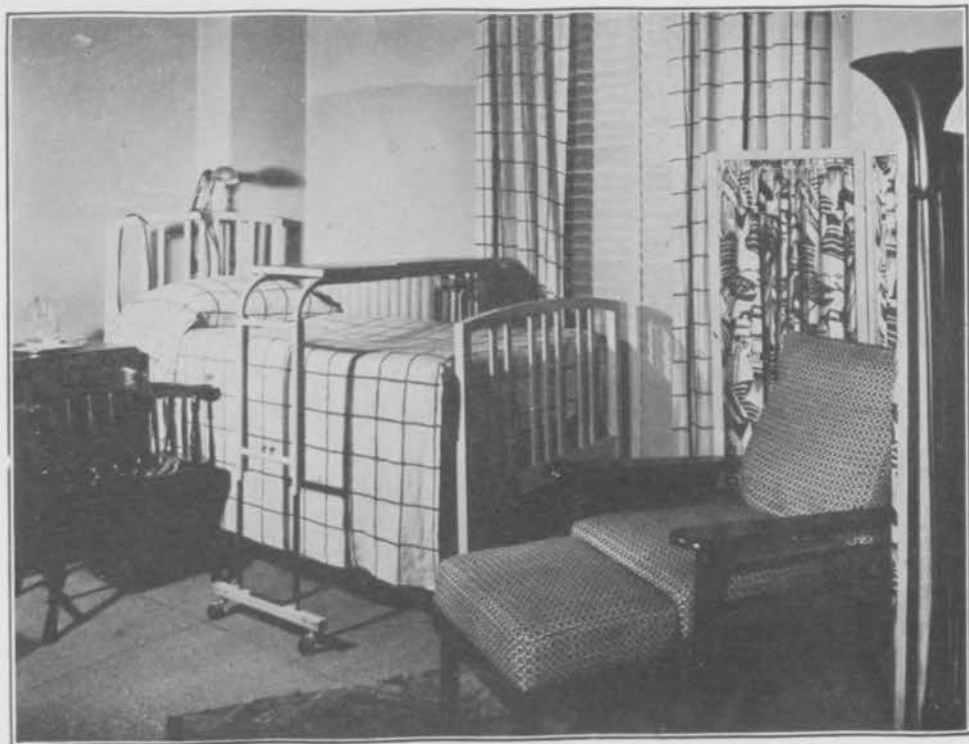

MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING

The Thirty-seventh Annual Meeting of the Hospital for Joint Diseases was held at the Hospital on Monday evening, April 24, 1944, at 8:30 p.m. Twenty-six members of the Corporation, constituting more than a quorum, were present.

Mr. Max Wilner, Chairman of the Board, presided at the meeting and Mr. Louis M. Loeb acted as Secretary.

The Chairman announced that the minutes of the last Annual Meeting held on April 26, 1943 had been printed in the Annual Report of the Hospital and had been circulated among the members of the Corporation. It was therefore resolved that the reading of the minutes of that meeting be dispensed with, and the minutes were deemed approved.

The President of the Hospital, Mr. Frederick Brown, read his annual report for the year 1943. The report reviewed the activities of the Hospital during the past year.

On motion duly seconded, it was unanimously resolved that the report of the President be, and it hereby is, accepted.

The President of the Medical Advisory Board, Dr. Maurice M. Pomeranz, reported on the professional activities of the Medical Staff and the Medical Board for the year 1943.

On motion duly seconded, it was unanimously resolved that the report of the President of the Medical Advisory Board be, and it hereby is, accepted.

The Chairman of the Women's Division, Mrs. Phyllis B. Koehler, read the report for the Women's Division, summarizing the several reports submitted to her by the chairmen of the committees of the Women's Division.

On motion duly seconded, it was unanimously resolved that the report of the Chairman of the Women's Division be, and it hereby is, accepted.

In the absence of Mr. Louis F. Rothschild, the Treasurer, Mr. Willard E. Loeb, Associate Treasurer, submitted a summary of the Treasurer's report for the year 1943, as follows:

First: This year the Hospital created a Reserve Fund to be set aside for purposes as determined by the Board of Trustees. The Fund is largely intended to meet the maintenance deficits which might occur in years to come.

Second: Out of the appropriations amounting to \$233,802.65 received from Federation and Greater New York Fund, the Women's Division was given \$49,577.85, thus meeting their entire deficit; \$156,028.38 was applied towards the Hospital's budget; and a deferred income from Federation was set aside amounting to \$28,196.42 applicable to the first six months of 1944.

Third: The property and securities of the Hospital and Country Branch represent an investment of more than \$5,000,000.

- Fourth:* In 1943, the Hospital spent \$966,562.72 for salaries and supplies to maintain the main Hospital, Out-Patient Department, Women's Division, and Country Branch.
- Fifth:* The average cost of operating the Hospital, Out-Patient Department, Women's Division, and Country Branch was \$2,648.11 a day, or \$110.34 an hour for every hour of the 365 days of the year 1943.
- Sixth:* To make such an expenditure possible, there was received from patients, from State Aid, and from the City of New York amounts aggregating \$715,811.66.
- Seventh:* The balance of \$250,751.06 represents the amount of free service in terms of dollars which the Hospital, in all its activities and departments, rendered to the community during the year 1943.
- Eighth:* This gross deficit of the main Hospital, Country Branch, and Women's Division amounting to \$250,751.06 was reduced in the following manner:
- \$205,606.23 received from Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies and the Greater New York Fund;
 - 40,832.21 received from the United Hospital Fund for the main Hospital and the Country Branch;
 - 5,000.00 received by the main Hospital from the Country Branch (Natalie and Louis Heinsheimer Memorial) Maintenance Account;
 - 357.00 Received from Income from Legacy;
 - 2,632.62 miscellaneous receipts of the Women's Division;
 - 6,806.43 applied to Country Branch Deficit from its Maintenance Fund.
- Ninth:* The Hospital's mortgage carried by the Heinsheimer Funds of the Country Branch was originally \$250,000. After paying the annual amortization, it now amounts to only \$233,179.27.
- Tenth:* The special funds of the Hospital amount to \$373,533.32 at cost, or \$341,939.34 at market value, the Reserve Fund amounts to \$17,661.96, and the maintenance surplus amounts to \$22,613.97.
- Eleventh:* The special funds of the Country Branch, namely the Natalie and Louis Heinsheimer Memorial Funds, in cash and securities have a total value of \$685,189.12.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT
For the Year 1943

The global dimensions of the war are affecting the life of people of all countries. In the United States the war generated special forces which influence social and economic life in general and institutions in particular. While the earnings of most people have been higher under war conditions, it is not possible to forecast at this time that conditions will remain so after the war ends. Then, also, the war stimulated advances in medical science and our hospitals, even while operating under strain and pressure caused by the war, had to be alert and ready to make full use of these advances and apply them to the care of the civilian sick.

Our Hospital in the past was never satisfied with watching the scene from the sidelines with the hope that its comfortable position will always continue. During the years of its existence it adjusted its aims and character of service to keep in step and to meet adequately the changing demands made upon it for service. It must continue that course in the future. Unless its policy and service constantly conform to the ever-changing pattern, the hospital may be left behind and may be unable to retain its place in a progressive community which assumes the responsibility of adequate and scientific service to the sick at a cost which people can afford to pay.

During the past three years we noticed three significant changes at our Hospital. They began in 1941:

One was a reduction in the number of ward patients served. In former years, about seventy per cent of our patients occupied ward beds and only thirty per cent occupied private and semi-private beds. Gradually this ratio changed, and today about forty per cent of our beds are occupied by private and semi-private patients, and the trend during the past few months is toward an even higher figure; and sixty per cent by ward patients, and the trend is toward a lower figure. This resulted in an increase in income from patients, and in spite of a sharp rise in maintenance expenditures caused by higher salaries paid to our employees, and by higher costs of commodities, the usual deficit the Hospital experienced in former years has been considerably reduced for the year 1943.

The second change relates to the reduction in the number of out-patients who come to our clinics. In 1941, for example, we treated 25,390 patients who made 210,798 visits. For the year 1943 the corresponding figures are 21,517 patients who made 156,081 visits, a reduction of about 15 per cent in individual patients and 25 per cent in visits.

The third change is concerned with the difficulty of filling positions on our nursing, technical and domestic staffs. Out of 115 nurses, attendants and orderlies which represent the normal personnel, the Hospital has on the average forty vacancies. Some of these vacancies are filled by engaging special nurses by the day for general floor service. The turnover of personnel in all departments has been high and a number of vacancies remain unfilled despite the fact that

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wages have been substantially increased. For example, in 1939 the total payroll of the Hospital, Women's Division, and Country Home was \$494,000. In 1943 it has risen to \$567,000, an increase of about 15 per cent.

With the shortage of personnel, those remaining at work have been called upon and willingly gave extra service, not only to cover the usual work required, but they assumed additional burdens which the Hospital was called upon to carry as its part of the war effort. The Hospital retained, in good organization, the Emergency Medical Field Unit; it continued to be set up as a casualty station; it strengthened the blood bank; it conducted courses for Nurse's Aides; it gave first aid courses to personnel; and it engaged in the salvage of paper, rubber, tin, and fats. In addition, the Hospital and its personnel (excluding the medical staff) purchased \$76,000 worth of United States bonds.

In recognition of some of these war activities, the Hospital received a certificate of merit from the Civilian Defense Volunteer Office, and an award from the National War Fund for gallantry in giving.

The greatest sacrifice and the most significant contribution toward the coming victory is being made by the men and women with the armed forces scattered on all battlefronts. Several of our staff have been torpedoed, and one is missing in action. In honor of the heroic service they render we erected an illuminated plaque in the main lobby in the Hospital listing their names. The number includes 129 medical staff members, 60 nurses and other workers, and three Trustees. In addition, 37 house staff members who completed their service at the Hospital and four house staff members who were about to begin their service are in military service.

The Hospital's tasks were indeed made lighter and were materially aided by the splendid assistance of the Women's Division through its large number of volunteers and Nurse's Aides, through the tireless efforts of the production and surgical dressing units, the reorganized occupational therapy department, the progressive social service and a large number of other essential activities carried on by our women. We are indebted to the officers, chairmen of committees, and members for unusual devotion and leadership. The Chairman of the Women's Division will soon give you more detailed information on the manifold activities of the women.

During the past year there were nine meetings of the Board of Trustees and two meetings of the Executive Committee. All of our meetings were well attended. We added three new Trustees, namely: Ralph F. Colin, Martin L. Katzenstein and Ernest Katz. Our Board of Trustees now numbers thirty-eight, the largest number in the Hospital's history. The corporation now consists of 73 paid members.

It is my sad duty to report the death of two persons who had given unusual service to the Hospital. On May 24, 1943, Mrs. Martin L. Katzenstein passed away. She had been associated with the Hospital for many years. She was Chairman of the Surgical Dressing Group from 1931 to 1943. Her leadership and devotion to service is an everlasting inspiration to us all. Her cheerful and

understanding disposition, and her genuineness in everything she did will be sadly missed by everybody associated with the Hospital.

On May 31, 1943, Dr. Samuel A. Jahss died. He had been on the staff of the Hospital since 1914, and had grown in proficiency and rank until he reached the position of Attending Orthopedic Surgeon, which position he held at the time of his death. Dr. Jahss was also Secretary of the Medical Advisory Board. We shall miss him and his devoted service to the patients.

In response to the suggestion made by Federation, representatives of our Board of Trustees met with representatives of Lebanon Hospital and Federation and discussed the possibility of merging the two hospitals. During these discussions the new building of Lebanon Hospital was taken over by the Medical Corps of the United States Army, and our discussions were terminated.

Some years ago we acquired a brownstone house at 1859 Madison Avenue which we used for housing domestic personnel. Because of its distance from the Hospital we sold it. During the year we purchased 61 East 123rd Street, another brownstone house which adjoins the Hospital's property.

While many of our committees have been actively engaged in the tasks assigned to them, special mention should be made of the Executive Committee which met whenever the Board could not be convened; the activities of the Out-Patient Department Committee which closely observed the trend and character of service of that department; the Laboratory Committee which has given special attention to matters related to routine laboratory examinations and to the research program; the Purchase Committee which has again this year replenished the Hospital's reserve of supplies at considerable saving, has watched over the Hospital's stores and perpetual inventory, and has purchased important equipment, the outstanding of which was a deep therapy machine for the x-ray department; the Budget and Office Committee which has carefully analyzed expenditures and has from time to time adjusted salaries of personnel; the Conference Committee on Medical Matters which concerned itself with the professional aspects of the Hospital and medical staff positions; the Finance Committee which periodically reviewed the finances of the Hospital, the securities and investments of the Hospital's funds; the Building Committee which gave special attention to physical requirements; the Law Committee which dealt with several important legal matters; the Insurance Committee which analyzed the Hospital's coverage; the Country Home Administration Committee which concerned itself with problems of that Branch; and finally the Trustees of the Heinsheimer Funds who devoted themselves to the administration of these funds.

You will soon hear from the President of the Medical Advisory Board who will report on the professional activities of our Medical Staff. That Board meets often and its meetings are unusually well attended by our attending physicians and surgeons. They deliberate over important professional aspects of hospital service and supervise the activities of the Medical Staff. We are indebted to our medical staff for the devoted services they rendered to our patients and the Hospital.

As in years past, Federation was the largest source of income towards the

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Hospital's maintenance deficit. During the year, the Federations of New York and Brooklyn were merged. This was a constructive step and one which was wholeheartedly approved by the community. The merged Federations have become a strong unit and an important central financing body for a large number of well administered service agencies in the welfare, health and educational fields. The second source of income towards the maintenance deficit was the United Hospital Fund; the third the Greater New York Fund; the fourth the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis; and the fifth the Crippled Children's After Care. To all of these organizations we are indebted for their generous support of the Hospital. This year again the State Department of Social Welfare inspected the main Hospital, the Out-Patient Department and the Country Branch. The reports of the inspections were commendable of the physical plants and the service rendered.

The Hospital again had the full cooperation of the Finance Department and the Department of Hospitals of the City of New York, and of the State Department of Health for payments made for indigent patients admitted to the Hospital and Country Branch. The Hospital continues to enjoy the approval of the American College of Surgeons and the Council on Medical Education and Hospitals of the American Medical Association.

The Hospital's beds were extensively utilized during the year. In the main hospital and Country Branch, 5,808 patients received 112,516 hospital days' care. Of that number 66,644, or about 60 per cent, were for ward patients and the balance of 45,872 were for private, semi-private and compensation patients. In the Out-Patient Department 21,517 patients made 156,081 visits. The number of surgical operations performed was 4,605; the number of laboratory examinations was 62,099; the number of patients x-rayed 15,468; the number of blood transfusions 799; and the number of prescriptions filled 90,238.

These services were made possible by the intelligent deliberation and active participation in all of our work by the officers and Board of Trustees, the devotion and untiring efforts of our executives and department heads and the more than 400 employees who constitute the Hospital's personnel, by the women with their large corps of volunteers and Nurse's Aides, by the medical staff who rendered proficient service, who together constitute one large team serving the sick of all economic strata in our community who seek out our Hospital for their medical care.

In conclusion, may I add that pleased as we are with past achievements, we do not intend to stand still. In order to go progressively and soundly forward to meet the changing community conditions and advances in medical sciences, our able Director, Dr. Golub, is now preparing an exhaustive report on past performance with recommendations on the future course of the Hospital. The aim being to ever adjust and improve our physical facilities and our program as to make the Hospital dynamic in its future service to the community as it has been in the past.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE MEDICAL ADVISORY BOARD For the Year 1943

A survey of the professional activities of our Hospital, the standards and volume of service rendered during the year 1943 at the very outset reveals the difficult conditions attributable to the war which affected the Hospital. The difficult problems encountered in a sense served as a severe teacher and in that way stimulated the efforts of the medical staff.

One of the outstanding problems was the maintenance of adequate and scientific service with the reduced staff of physicians, nurses, technicians, and other essential workers, many of whom are in the armed forces of our country. Those remaining at their hospital posts performed their tasks with devotion and thus made possible a highly satisfactory year's service. We are indebted to the members of the staff who are privileged to participate directly in this war and thus contribute towards victory, and to those who serve on the home front, thus insuring a continuation of hospital service to the civilian population and helping prepare the Hospital for service in the years to come after the war.

A second problem was that created by changes in the resident and intern service in all hospitals. Procurement and Assignment introduced an allocation plan which reduced the number of interns and residents in hospitals to about two-thirds of their normal number, and reduced the length of service of interns to a nine-month period, permitting, however, one-half of the allowed number of interns to continue for another nine months as junior residents, and thereafter one-half of the allowed number of junior residents to serve an additional nine months as senior residents. This plan necessitated rearrangement of the Hospital's schedule of service and required a more intense orientation program for the new interns to acquaint them with the basic principles underlying the care of the sick at our Hospital.

The Hospital continued the arrangement with the Jersey City Medical Center whereby residents of our Hospital are assigned to that institution for three month's service in orthopedic surgery and residents of that institution are assigned to our Hospital for periods of two months' service in orthopedic surgery.

The Hospital applied to the Council on Medical Education and Hospitals of the American Medical Association for the approval by that body of a residency in radiology. In the near future it is planned to make similar applications for residencies in anesthesia, physical therapy, pathology, and if possible, in general surgery and ophthalmology.

The third problem was related to rearrangement of staff schedules for Out-Patient and ward service. Since about 33 per cent of the regular medical staff is on leave of absence serving in the armed forces, those remaining willingly assumed and carried additional responsibility and gave additional time to the Hospital and the Clinic. Rearrangement of schedules and redesignation of staff members to additional tasks, we hope had not reminded anyone of the allusion that "every horse thinks his load is the heaviest."

On May 31, 1943 we suffered the loss of one of our outstanding orthopedic surgeons. Dr. Samuel A. Jahss had been associated with our Hospital from his very early days in the practice of orthopedic surgery. He made several substantial contributions to scientific medicine, and his loss is deeply felt by his colleagues. It is a source of considerable gratification to record that Dr. Jahss' son, Marvin H. Jahss, who is expected to graduate from New York University College of Medicine in September, 1944, will come to our Hospital on October 1, 1944 as an intern. The Medical Board recommended and the Board of Trustees approved the award of the Frauenthal Travel Scholarship to his son when he becomes eligible for it.

With the passing away of Dr. Jahss, the five then existing orthopedic services were reconstituted into four services—two services taking the morning hours and two services taking the afternoon hours in the Out-Patient Department; and the orthopedic ward beds were distributed among four services.

The decline in the attendance in the Out-Patient Department of the Hospital during the past year as reported by the President of the Hospital was about 17 per cent. This corresponds to similar reductions in the volume of service of most out-patient departments in New York City and other parts of the country.

The Medical Advisory Board appointed a committee to advise and guide the Women's Division in two of its important services; namely, social service and occupational therapy. This committee has been active and frequently met with the heads of these two departments and from time to time made recommendations leading to the improvement of the professional activities of these services. The professional workers of the Social Service Department are now closer to the patients, are better acquainted with the programs of medical care of staff physicians; and staff physicians, in turn, are gaining increasing knowledge of the objectives and character of Social Service and Occupational Therapy. The Hospital's Women's Division deserves great credit for the indefatigable labors of the scores of women who volunteer their services and give so much of their time and energy.

The Committee on Dietetics recommended to the Hospital's Dietary Department revision of certain diets, especially those given to out-patients. This work was especially helpful because of the rationing of certain foodstuffs.

Another change occurred with reference to the furnishing of braces and other orthopedic and surgical appliances to the Hospital's in and out-patients. Owing to the shortage of skilled labor in the Brace Department, arrangements were made with an outside manufacturer for the manufacture of such braces and appliances at a fixed schedule of rates.

The Hospital's Laboratory in its three major divisions, namely: pathology, bacteriology, and bio-chemistry, made 62,099 routine examinations, a decline of about 11 per cent as compared with the previous year. The laboratory also continued its research activities. It received a special grant of \$5,000 from the United Hospital Fund for a study on complement fixation tests with lymphogranuloma venereum and etiologic studies in virus pneumonia. The staff of the

Department of Laboratories published nine papers and members of the medical staff of other services published twenty-five papers during the year.

The Blood Bank continued its normal operations keeping a reserve of blood and plasma not only for the needs of our Hospital patients, but as a supplying hospital it furnishes blood and plasma to patients in neighboring hospitals.

In the Department of Radiology 15,468 patients were examined and 29,213 plates made. This represents about a 16 per cent reduction in the number of patients examined and about a 25 per cent reduction in the number of plates made over 1942, brought about largely by a reduction in the number of patients served in the Out-Patient Department. The new deep therapy x-ray machine has been in full operation, and from October to December, a total of 1,423 deep therapy treatments were administered. The addition of the deep therapy machine completes the Department with the most modern equipment and appurtenances.

The Hospital suffered a great loss in the deaths of Dr. James Ewing, who for many years was consulting pathologist to the Hospital, and Dr. William Branower, who for some years was Anesthetist to the Hospital and during the past two years was on the Hospital's Courtesy Staff.

These, in brief, represent a few highlights of the numerous activities carried on at the Hospital during a busy year, especially made difficult by conditions created by the war, but so ably carried out by our devoted medical staff and all other professional, technical, clerical, and domestic workers of the Hospital. It is not amiss, however, to ask the question as to the future of the Hospital. We know the road it traveled since 1906, and we know its growth and development and the service it rendered during the past thirty-seven years. We are satisfied with its past record, but at the same time are alert to national and local changes and developments which influence the field of medical care in general and hospitals in particular. A progressive hospital must always be alert to these changes. It must always be progressive and it must always be ready to introduce newer and more scientific methods of service, all aiming towards the speeding and complete recovery of patients and towards making a substantial contribution to medical science and medical education.

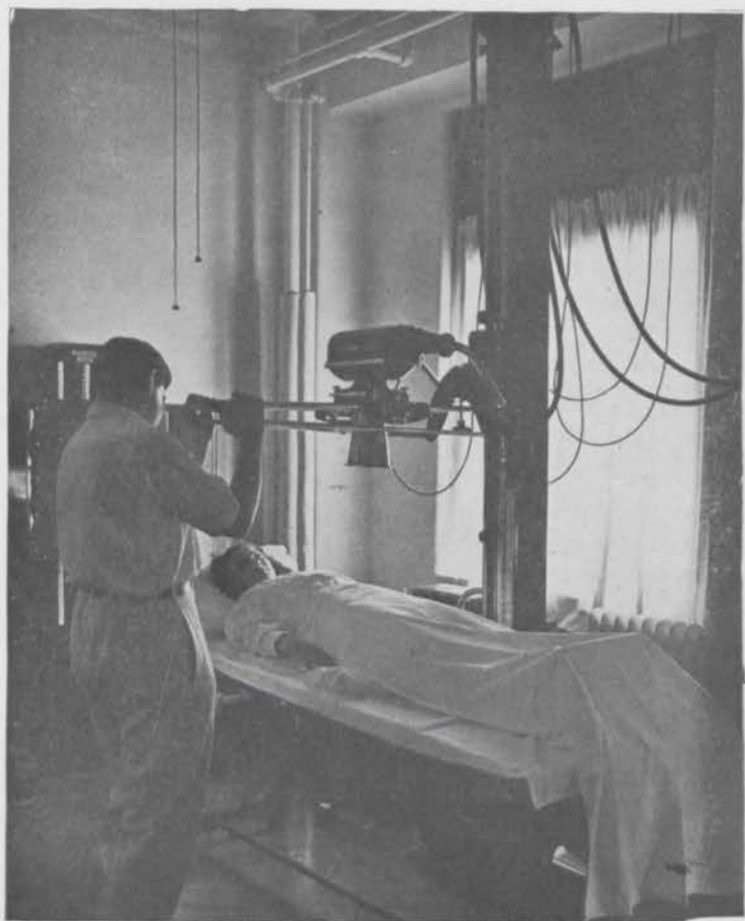

It was the spirit of understanding and mutual assistance which made possible during the past year as it has during former years service at high standards.

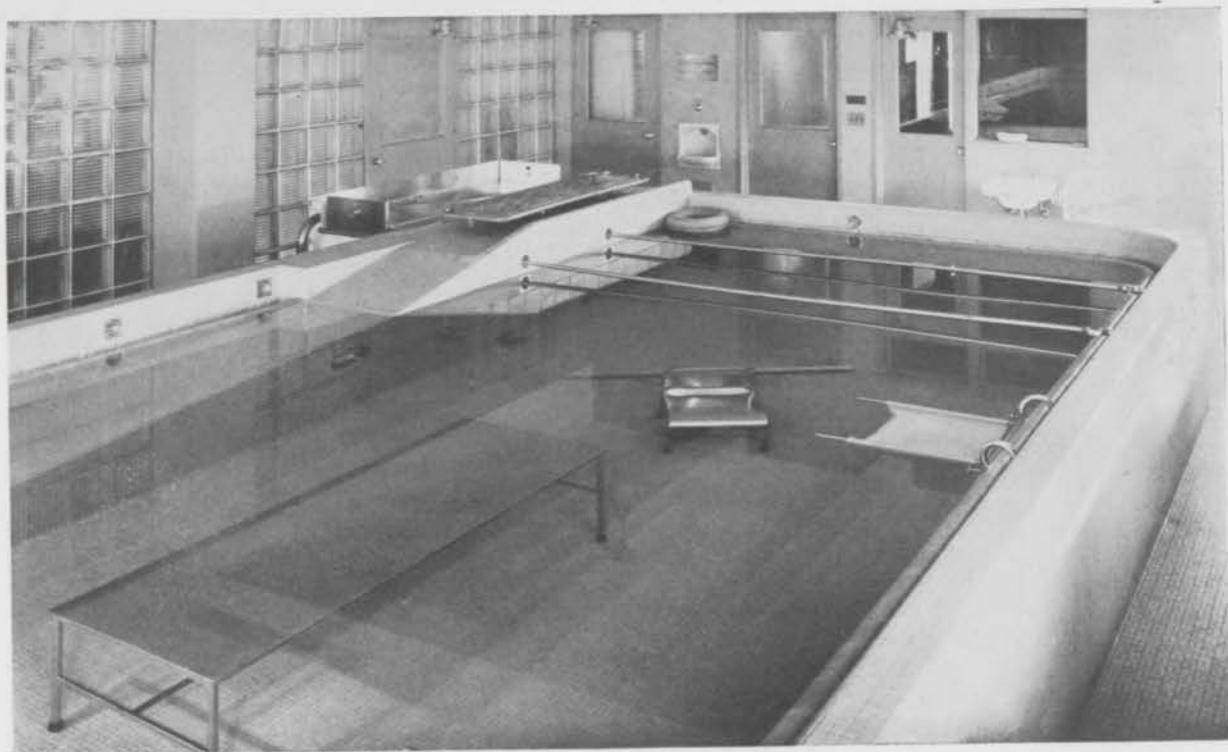

REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE WOMEN'S DIVISION FOR THE YEAR 1943

Seven is a traditionally lucky number.

The experience of the Women's Division reaffirms it. We concluded 1943 with our seven Standing Committees set up and ready to carry forward their own positive programs, staffed by trained personnel—volunteer as well as professional. Although each committee has its separate work, they all have labored together in exemplary harmony, and the accomplishments of one have served as an incentive to the others. Briefly, the slogan of the Women's Division might be "One for all and all for one."

Time is short and permits recording only headlines culled from the annual reports of our various committees. But before so doing it should be stressed that the achievements of the Women's Division continue to be, in a great measure, the result of the understanding cooperation afforded us by the Trustees of the Hospital, the Hospital Administration, the Medical Advisory Board, and the department heads.

Stimulated by this encouragement and with eagerness to foster this esprit de corps, the Women's Division held monthly "open houses" at which Trustees, volunteers and hospital personnel met informally. These afternoon teas which were enlivened by an occasional musical program or motion picture were tastefully arranged by Mrs. James Barkhouse, chairman of the Hospitality Committee.

Particularly helpful was the counsel which the Medical Advisory Committee to the Women's Division gave both the Social Service and Occupational Therapy Departments. The members of this committee, under the chairmanship of Dr. Harry Goldman, gave amply of their already overburdened time to discuss new plans and to solve such problems as affected medical care. Moreover, these physicians served as our interpreters to their medical colleagues.

Our thanks for generous financial support are extended to Federation, the United Hospital Fund, and the Greater New York Fund, and for the advice and guidance of our good friends at the American Red Cross and the United Hospital Fund. We are also deeply grateful to the many friends who contributed towards the Hattie N. Katzenstein Memorial Fund for year round convalescent care and to those who sent us a variety of other donations.

Continuity implies steadiness, but not a static condition. Continuity must include constant advance, and in the case of the Women's Division such progress is being propelled gradually as experience is acquired and knowledge gained. At the monthly meetings of the Executive Committee considerable time was devoted to the individual committees for the purpose of explaining their respective activities in greater detail. On occasions this entailed inviting guest speakers who were helpful to the committees in their respective programs.

The Occupational Therapy Department has been recently reorganized. Recognition of the special value of occupational therapy to orthopedic patients led

to the selection of Miss Theresa Burmeister, a trained and registered therapist and a graduate from the St. Louis School of Occupational Therapy, to head the Department. She is assisted by Miss Mary Doucett, a recent graduate from the Philadelphia School. At the request of the American Association of Occupational Therapy, the department now provides clinical training for volunteer aides enrolled in the Association's Occupational Therapy Aides course. Several members of the Occupational Therapy Committee under Mrs. Milton Steiner's Chairmanship have also taken this special training. This committee is hard-working and doing a splendid job.

The Occupational Therapy department is concerned with therapy or treatment to aid in completing the patient's recovery. This therapy may be divided into two categories, diversional and functional. Diversional therapy, as its name denotes, diverts the patient's mind from his illness. Its psychological and morale building value is obvious. It helps the patient adjust himself to hospital life and serves as an outlet for pent-up energies. This type of therapy is usually given on the wards and may be preparatory to functional therapy.

Functional therapy aims to restore physical function impaired by disease or injury. The therapist skilled in different handicrafts selects those suitable for a given impaired function. Patients are treated only when referred by a staff physician and when accompanied by a card giving the patient's diagnosis and describing his needs.

Occupational Therapy is also helpful in prevocational guidance when a patient can be retrained for new work and Occupational Therapy endeavors to detect or test out skills and work tolerance. The close tie-up of the Occupational Therapy with the Social Service and Physical Therapy departments is self evident, and a plan to correlate their work in this area is being developed.

The second professional department under the aegis of the Women's Division is Social Service headed by Miss Sadie Shapiro. Its comprehensive program of service to the patients not only permeates the entire hospital but has wide community ramifications. The staff is currently comprised of fourteen social workers, including the director and her assistant, Miss Berenice Goldman. Eleven workers are graduates of schools of Social Work, and two more are taking courses toward that end. Staff education is a continuous and live process. Regular staff meetings afford "a medium for discussion of departmental activities, participation in community programs and trends affecting the field of social service generally and medical social service particularly." The case work supervisor regularly reviews case work practices with each worker. A series of lectures was given to the Social Service Staff by members of the Medical Staff on medical and social problems. There has also been introduced a social inquiry sheet, now included in the patients' history charts.

Other phases of the department's activities included: improvement of the statistical and accounting system, accomplished under the auspices of the United Hospital Fund with the aid of the Director of Research of the Russell Sage Foundation; a basic Manual of Personnel Practices and Departmental Policies

for staff members of Social Service—progressive steps which led to considerable decrease in the distribution of medical relief.

The Clothes Cupboard is an important adjunct to the Social Service Department. Clothing distributed upon written request of the social worker is a form of relief. Mrs. James W. Smith, chairman of the committee, is grateful to various outside groups who have supplied clothing. They include ladies of the West End Synagogue, the Needlework Guild, the Rodeph Sholem Sisterhood Sewing Circle, Mrs. Cowen and her Sewing Group from the Home of Hebrew Infants, and Mrs. Frederick Brown.

The summer camp program made possible for forty-three children in addition to the orthopedic patients who were handled separately, to be sent to nineteen camps. The children were selected on the basis of their own physical and emotional health needs as well as those of their families. The physical and psychological benefits of this selective service have been checked by the social workers who have seen each child since his return from camp.

Our relationship with the Association for Aid of Crippled Children, which cares for the nursing needs of orthopedic children following hospitalization, has been simplified. Methods of referral, treatment and follow-up have been re-arranged to establish a more individualized service for our patients.

Procedure aimed to avoid duplication of responsibility and effort and yet to assure continuity of care for the crippled child was developed with the Blythedale Home. The experience thus derived may serve as a model for suitable relationship between a convalescent home and a social service department of a hospital.

The Hospital is granted funds through State Aid as approved by the Children's Court for the treatment of handicapped children. While receiving adequate medical care it appeared the children did not get the necessary assistance in meeting their social and personal problems. The Social Service Department met the problem. The medical social work consultant to the Division of Physically Handicapped, in a report referring to our Hospital, stated "that an outstanding example of what has happened when a Department of Social Service had the opportunity to know the patient in each instance before he was sent to the Court showed that whereas previous to such an arrangement 36 cases in 34 weeks appeared for help with social problems, that currently this situation does not exist and that those patients that now appear in the Court do so to fulfill requirements solely."

Social Service initiated a special project sponsored by the United Hospital Fund, New York Academy of Medicine, Commissioners of Hospitals and Health to determine who are and what are the problems of patients continuing on relief when the labor market is so improved. Thirty-four municipal and voluntary hospitals, the Department of Welfare, the United States Employment Service, the Bureau of Rehabilitation and the Institute for the Crippled and Disabled all participated in this investigation.

The New York School of Social Work selected our Social Service Department as a training center. It assigned to our hospital two students for field work. The School also invited the hospital to participate in a Columbia University Course in "International Administration." Two groups of nine men and women visited the Hospital as part of their preparation for relief work abroad. The United Hospital Fund chose our Hospital, with four others in greater New York, to give the in-training portion of a course for Volunteer Case Aides. The arrangement was accompanied by a grant to help meet the salary of a special worker to supervise these volunteers. This course is being repeated three times a year for groups of about nine students. In the past, five of our own volunteers were similarly trained by Miss Shapiro. These women have been invaluable in relieving the social workers of some basic duties. Three aides, among them Miss Rosalind Fried, chairman of the Social Service Committee, served regularly five full days each week in the Orthopedic Clinic.

In its plans for future work Social Service will include "further concentration and organization to increase its efficiency, further integration with other departments and services in the hospital, educational and vocational planning for disabled children and a rehabilitation conference." The last mentioned is based on the physical restoration and social adjustment of the patient and, when required, retraining and placement in a new job. Regular conferences will be held with staff physicians, social workers and the vocational counsellor, assigned by the New York City Rehabilitation Bureau, and such hospital personnel as can contribute information concerning the patient.

To carry the current large case load and to extend the program of Social Service, a larger staff will be needed. The ultimate number of social workers may reach twenty-four. In her annual report Miss Shapiro writes: "We are convinced that we can perform a job of prevention as well as one socially curative. Ours, too, is the conviction that sufficient knowledge and skill have been developed to make it possible to produce positive and effective results. It is necessary to have sufficient instruments for the application of this knowledge and skill."

During the past year our monthly average of volunteers was approximately 147, including 70 Nurse's Aides, 16 Gray Ladies, 51 regular hospital volunteers, as well as about 10 women at the Country Branch. The total hours worked were 44,378. Our reliable and conscientious volunteers gave many added hours, and every post in the Out-Patient Department was filled. Within the past twelve months 64 volunteers, nearly one-half of the entire group, worked more than 200 hours, the number required for our annual service award. This fall several men volunteers joined our ranks. Two worked in the X-Ray Department, others as ward orderlies. The latter were trained by Miss Dowling, who also conducted three Nurse's Aide classes. Words cannot sufficiently thank these men and women who make it possible for the Women's Division to help the Hospital in the care of the sick.

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At the Country Branch, in spite of increased transportation difficulties, many volunteers bicycled or walked great distances just to be with the children. Mrs. Schloss, Chairman of the Country Branch Committee, reports that Monday through Friday mornings these women helped the older children with their school work, aided nurses in feeding the babies, and offered new ideas in games, stories and entertainment for the young patients. Another year it is hoped the services of the other Standing Committees may infiltrate into the Country Branch, and especially those of the Social Service.

The Library and Diversional Therapy Committees both made the patients' stay in the Hospital pleasant. One patient wrote:

"I want to thank you all for enabling me to pass the time I spent here in the hospital. You have supplied me with the means of keeping abreast of the literary works of the past six months. Also I want to extend my appreciation for obtaining reading matter which was not available in the hospital library. Being so obliging is the way I shall always remember you."

For the second year the Library served as a training center for volunteer students enrolled in the United Hospital Library course. Because of her exceptional ability, Mrs. Leopold Friedman, Chairman of the Library Committee, was invited to be a member of the United Hospital Fund Committee on Hospital Libraries.

About 12,000 books and magazines were circulated among ward and private patients and hospital personnel. This year-round service is a tribute to the committee of six trained and responsible volunteers. Today the library shelves hold 900 books. Many current books have been acquired through the generous gifts of several trustees.

Special services of the Library Committee include the repair and binding of books worn by constant handling, monthly distribution of magazines from the American Red Cross, distribution of copies of the Holy Scriptures through the courtesy of the New York Bible Society, and the filling of 1198 special requests by the Harlem Public Library.

Juvenile books were loaned by the Library to the Diversional Therapy Committee which read or variously amused the children on the wards Monday mornings. On Friday afternoons, committee members helped incapacitated adult patients by reading to them, writing letters, or just chatting casually. Very special programs for which many talented artists donated their services, were toured through the wards and provided a happy change for patients. Mrs. Jack Mann, Chairman of the Diversional Therapy Committee, has been unusually successful in maintaining a steady flow of entertainment and enlisting such a faithful and capable unit.

The Christmas celebration, effectively directed by Mrs. Simon Ottinger, entailed the wrapping of 305 gifts, filling 35 stockings, and the trimming of Christmas trees throughout the Hospital. On Christmas morning Mr. Harold Vorzimer, impersonating Santa Claus, brought cheer to the ward patients.

The Women's Division suffered a sad loss in the death of its Vice-President, Mrs. Hattie N. Katzenstein who, through the years, was an understanding friend and a dauntless guide. Her tireless energies and selfless efforts on behalf of the Hospital will continue to be an inspiration and incentive to us all. Subsequent to Mrs. Katzenstein's untimely death, the Surgical Dressing group was reconstituted. We were particularly fortunate in that Mrs. Leo P. Krigsman came to our rescue and stood by for several months and set up our present committee headed by Mrs. Norman Laskey, who with her efficient aides, is doing splendidly. Four new outside groups have been enlisted so that twelve groups are now making dressings for the Hospital, and we hope on Monday afternoons to have our own ladies again working at the Hospital. The Surgical Dressing Committee, which now makes every dressing used in the Hospital (254,650 from September 1943 through March 31st, 1944), is eager to build up a reserve to cover any emergency.

Mrs. Brown's unparalleled devotion to the Hospital continues to inspire our Production Unit to greater activity. The Production Unit, meeting each Tuesday at the Hospital, made or mended 32,692 articles, of which 9,273 were new articles. Another 580 were made by women of the Central Synagogue. We are indeed thankful to all the women for their devoted service.

The result of our participation in the 1943 United Hospital Fund Campaign under the tireless leadership of our treasurer, Mrs. Edgar L. Rossin, represented the most conscientious effort by the thirty team members who raised \$15,800 through 400 gifts. The achievement of this volunteer group deserves the highest commendation and our grateful thanks, with especial recognition to Mrs. Morton Ollendorf, for her last minute "mobilization" of workers.

Mrs. Roland I. Grausman served as Vice-Chairman for the Fourth War Loan Drive and Mrs. Herbert Rothschild as Chairman of the Red Cross War Fund. They are to be congratulated on their successful achievements in raising considerable amounts of money for these organizations.

And so our Women's Division ended another year, with emphasis on maintaining high standards of service. The close of one year marks but a moment's pause in which we can take stock of our past work with a view to improvement and expansion.
