THEY ALSO SERVE?

At the recent meeting of the board of governors of the Medical Alumni Association, one of the three bright and well-spoken medical students present for the first time asked a little group of alumni standing by the bar what is the purpose of the board of governors. At that point, before the meeting had begun, it looked like nothing more than an eating and drinking club. But the student was told that the group had a number of purposes: mobilizing support for the School in the community, helping raise funds, advising the dean about student clerkship opportunities in the offices of private physicians, helping the School acquaint legislators with problems in medical education. And, most important, helping keep alumni in contact with their alma mater, its faculty and students, able to make suggestions and give support in a personal way. All these rather nebulous (except the fundraising) functions became crystallized in my mind later that evening when, after the dining was done and the routine business attended to, we listened to Dean Bennett report on the immediate concerns of the School of Medicine. Increasing the class size, persuading Congress to continue funding basic research, developing new methods of bringing the best of health care to the New York University and Bellevue community; these were what the dean wanted us to know about, to help him with.

For many alumni, the School is the institution which started them on a meaningful career, among them many who have contributed money over the years. For others, it is a place they want to know about through articles in the newspapers and in the *Medical Quarterly*. And perhaps for a smaller number, it is a place which offers a real chance to help influence the course of medical education and medical

practice in the future.

Time and distance are no bars to involvement: a letter to the dean offering support, the organization of a little group of alumni in your own community to discuss problems and offer suggestions. Anything is possible. We put ourselves in the category we imagine we ought to belong to. There may be better ways of serving than standing and waiting.

BASIC SCIENCES EMPHASIZED AT FIRST DAY EXERCISES

The 171 members of the Class of 1977—chosen from 4,200 applicants—came together on September 6 and 7 for First Day Exercises. They were assured by upper classmen and faculty members and deans that they possessed the necessary attributes to become good physicians. But they were also given strong advice on how to achieve that goal.

Dr. Ivan L. Bennett, Jr., provost and dean of the Medical Center, said: "Medicine is really a jealous mistress, and the purpose of your being here in medical school is to become a good physician, not a sociologist or an economist. That doesn't mean that you can't take an interest in the sociology or the economics of medicine . . . (but) it's our hope that you will concentrate a majority of your attention on getting through the curriculum and preparing yourself to become a physician. . . . The purpose of teaching you these basic sciences is to make sure not that you know all the facts, but that you understand the principles that underlie them and that you are acquiring an ability to apply these principles to the solution of the problems."

Dr. Saul J. Farber, Nathan Friedman Professor and chairman of the department of medicine, also discussed the process of studying the basic sciences, noting that: "rapidly one acquires the necessary information on which to build an immense structure of old that is good and not so good, and new that is good and not so good. There is a constant equilibrium of acquisition and discarding. But the arrow should always be heavily directed toward acquisition." The goal, Dr. Farber said, is healing and relieving by understanding.

Erythroblastosis Fetalis

Then, the class members were treated to a detailed presentation of the nature and clinical history of erythroblastosis fetalis. Starting with the first description of the disease by Hippocrates in 400 B.C., it dealt with the gradual unveiling of the causes of neonatal jaundice and with the current search for improved methods of precisely identifying unborn children at risk and therefore candidates for intrauterine transfusions. The composite basic and clinical science description was offered by Dr. Gordon W. Douglas, professor and chairman of the department of obstetrics and gynecology, who himself has made important scientific contributions to the therapy of the disease, Dr. Sanford Cohen, associate professor of pediatrics and pharmacology, and Dr. Bruce Young, assistant professor of obstetrics and gynecology.

Upper class students presented their views on how to get along at medical school during an afternoon program on September 6.



Cushing's Syndrome

A second presentation dealt with Cushing's syndrome, with Dr. Manfred Blum, assistant professor of clinical medicine. Dr. Robert W. Chambers, professor of biochemistry and Dr. S. Arthur Localio, professor of surgery, presenting aspects of the disease. The three men emphasized the importance of a knowledge of the complex metabolic pathways and sites of origin of the adrenal hormones and their physiological effects for a differential diagnosis of pituitary tumors, tumors of the adrenal cortex and adrenal hyperplasia. This presentation, as did the first, stimulated a number of challenging questions from the students.

Upper Classmen Participate

While the formal program was devoted to a heavy foretaste of the intellectual challenges to come, the portion of the program which was given over to the upper classmen offered an equally concentrated dose of information about life at NYU School of Medicine. Among the obviously deeply appreciated speakers was Mark D. Grebenau, M.D.-Ph.D. student, who advised the firstyear class members to set aside the competitive spirit of undergraduate school and work to help each other succeed. At a welcoming luncheon, a structure for sharing was immediately established when the students were assigned to clinical correlation groups of five or six led by one or two fourth-year men and women and one or two faculty members. Several of the upper classmen noted that these groups had formed for them strong bonds which are continuing throughout medical school.

Elliot E. Abbey, of the Class of 1975, president of the Student Council, addressed the class on September 13. He urged the new students to attend Student Council meetings and he outlined the procedures for electing class officers and the class representative on the Council. Mr. Abbey also detailed the provisions of the New York State drug abuse law. Other students described the plans for a lecture transcript service which is intended to facilitate assimilation of the basic medical science information which, as the students were repeatedly reminded, is generally regarded as the foundation of medical education.

AMERICAN GRADUATES OF FOREIGN MEDICAL SCHOOLS GET CLINICAL TRAINING IN NYU-BROOKDALE PROGRAM

American college graduates with premed majors, unable to find places in medical schools in this country, are attending foreign medical schools in increasing numbers. Most go either to the University of Guadalajara in Mexico, or the University of Bologna in Italy. The hurdles are many: they must become fluent in a new language, they must accept a long period of separation from family and friends. For all but a few, getting back into the mainstream of American medical practice has been extremely difficult. Although the foreign schools give them a strong technical background in basic medical subjects, they offer little in the way of practical experience.

Most of the young men and women who have gone abroad for their medical education wish ultimately to return and practice in this country. The great shortage of physicians here has generated increasing pressure for improving the system of bringing American-born foreign medical school graduates into approved internship and residency programs in this country.

Fifth Pathway

A program established in 1971 by the American Medical Association called the "Fifth Pathway" has the approval of the Association of American Medical Colleges, the American Hospital Association and of a number of the states and the Federal Government. It gives an American college graduate who goes to a foreign medical school the opportunity to return home and complete his education in a major teaching facility. The returning student must take an examination covering basic material such as the Federal Licensing Exam (FLEX) or the National Boards or the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates (ECFMG) exam, and he must spend a year in supervised clinical training.

For New York University Medical Center, the opportunity to help increase the number of well-trained physicians has dovetailed perfectly with its wish to give new dimensions to its ties with the Brookdale Hospital Medical Center in Brooklyn. Whereas the School has extended itself to its fullest reach by ex-

panding its entering class from 135 to 150 to a current 173 over the space of five years, it did find it possible to also encourage clinical training of foreign medical graduates at Brookdale. From Brookdale's point of view, there was an opportunity to train future house staff members, who, once they have completed a well-supervised academic and practical training program, would be ready for internships at the hospital. In fact, nine of the ten members of the last group of students elected to serve their internship at Brookdale.

Dr. Kahn Is Director

Under the guidance of Dr. Alvin Kahn, associate professor of clinical medicine and assistant dean, a program was set up at Brookdale which is similar to the third year of medical school. Ten foreign-trained physicians have entered the program over each of the past two years. They pay no tuition-but receive no salary or stipend. Their year of clinical clerkship includes rotations through each of the five key clinical departments: medicine, surgery, pediatrics, psychiatry and obstetrics and gynecology. But before they begin seeing patients they spend six weeks in a didactic learning experience in which they learn to take a history of the patient's illness and do proficient physical diag-

When they begin to assist with the management of the patients, as is true for any group of third-year medical students, many are all thumbs. They are generally not quite as fast to learn as the usual early-blooming NYU medical student who has gotten consistently high marks in high school and college and on the Medical College Admissions Test. Nonetheless, the same strong drive that got them through Guadalajara or Bologna, serves them well in ultimately developing experience and clinical excellence. With the help of some very dedicated work on the part of the attending physicians and residents who supervise them, they learn their medical science and they become good physi-


Dr. Kahn notes that "medicine is difficult, but not so difficult that it requires a straight 'A' student to master it. 'B' or even 'C' students can become top notch physicians, once they overcome their learning difficulties and begin to apply themselves efficiently to work assignments."

Considerable Responsibility

According to Dr. Kahn: "Universities and hospitals considering the establishment of a Fifth Pathway program are cautioned that the responsibility is considerable. The students must never be used to bolster a weak intern staff since this would defeat the basic concept behind return to the United States—to get good supervision. The house staff and teaching faculty in most instances must increase in number to handle a situation that literally converts a community hospital into a medical school annex."

Through its Fifth Pathway program in association with Brookdale, NYU School of Medicine is providing young physicians who have graduated from foreign medical schools the chance to get the strong clinical training they need to become fine physicians.

OF SEX EDUCATION IN MEDICAL SCHOOLS

Harold I. Lief '42

As director of the Center for the Study of Sex Education in Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania, I have been asked by the editor of *Medical Quarterly* to prepare a brief account of the development of sex education in medical schools during the last decade. At the same time, since I am also a graduate of NYU, he has asked me to make it into a sort of personal or semi-autobiographical statement.

To place the current status of sex education in medicine in an historical perspective, in 1960 when I first became aware of the deficiencies in medical sex education, only three medical schools had any sort of formal course material in human sexuality for medical students. These were The University of Pennsylvania, where in 1952 Dr. Emily Mudd had started an elective for senior medical students (which most of them took), Washington University in St. Louis, where Dr. William Masters gave six lectures to second-year medical students, and the Bowman-Gray School of Medicine in Winston-Salem, where Dr. Frank Lock, professor of obstetrics and gynecology, had not only pioneered courses for students, but had established a weekly seminar for OBS/ GYN residents and their wives. At NYU, only the courage of the late Sophia Kleegman in the department of obstetrics and gynecology prevented the almost complete neglect of the subject. Every year she gave a highly popular lecture on sexual function and dysfunction. In the early 1930's, because of her open advocacy of birth control, she almost lost her status as attending physician at Bellevue Hospital. (You may recall that it was not until 1937 that the American Medical Association officially endorsed contraception.)

Emotional Adjustment of Students

How did I become interested in this area of medical education? Beginning in 1957, under a grant from the Commonwealth Fund while I was still at Tulane University, I had been investigating the psychological and emotional adjustments and adaptations of medical students. A team of researchers under my direction had been studying a host of variables, among which was included sexual attitudes and behavior of medical students. Knowing of this, Dr. Mary Calderone, now executive director of SIECUS, but at that time medical director of Planned Parenthood, who was preparing a new textbook, "Manual of Contraceptive Practice," asked me in 1960 to prepare a chapter on "Sexual Attitudes and Behavior of Medical Students and their Implications for Family Planning." When I also presented this material at some national meetings, it attracted a great deal of interest and, to my astonishment, I became a "sex expert" overnight. It took me the better part of the next decade to begin to live up to the reputation which had suddenly descended upon me. The professional response to my pub-



SEX EDUCATION AT NEW YORK UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF MEDICINE

"How is your appetite? Are you sleeping well? Do you have any sexual problems?" This type of review of systems is undoubtedly heard very infrequently. Only a minute fraction of physicians take any sort of a sexual history. Others do not even provide the proper climate so that spontaneous presentation of sexual problems appears to be welcome. In some cases, this is due to the fact that the elicitation and evaluation of these problems, not to mention the therapy, represents a time-consuming process which does not fit in well with a busy office schedule. More frequently, however, it is probably because the physician does not wish to open the Pandora's Box of problems, questions, and answers for which he has had no training. This is often an area in which he must rely upon his own experience, which may be quite limited, and which may provide little insight into the patient's difficulty.

Dr. Kleegman Began Series


Medical schools have only recently become aware of this need and have undertaken to include training in human sexuality in their curricula. New York University was fortunate to have on its faculty the late Sophia J. Kleegman, who, for many years, delivered a lecture in the area of human sexuality to the third-year class. This lecture was always a highlight in the year's events and provided some background for the information then available.

When Dr. Kleegman first began this lecture series many years ago, she relied on her long clinical experience and the teachings of her mentor, Dr. Dickenson, who was one of the pioneers in the investigation of human sexuality. More recently, through the work of Kinsey, and Masters and Johnson, human sexuality has become a "respectable" area for scientific research and a body of knowledge is now being developed which has behind it objective laboratory data. The changing role of women in our society has also been an important factor. Along with the drive toward economic and social equality has come an increase in sexual expectations and a need for re-evaluating many traditional concepts that were primarily put forth by male teachers and investigators.

Five years ago, the department of obstetrics and gynecology offered, for the first time, an elective entitled, "Psychological and Sexual Problems of Women." This elective offered to 25 students in the second year, with the full cooperation of the department of psychiatry, had two purposes: to increase knowledge of human sexuality, and to augment the psychopathology-focused teachings of the department of psychiatry, to include the way that "normal" people reacted to various stressful situations occurring

lications was such that it pushed me more and more in the direction of specializing in sexual education in medicine and in sex therapy and research. I quickly became convinced that sexual therapy had to be conducted in the context of marital therapy, so that my interest in marital therapy or marriage counseling was a natural development.

At the suggestion of Frank Lock, whose interests paralleled mine, the two of us together with Clark Vincent, a sociologist at Bowman-Gray, applied to the Commonwealth Fund for support of a national committee dealing with human sexuality, marriage, and the family. With this eventually accomplished, we set up a committee with representatives from the Association of American Medical Colleges and the AMA, which also included some of the leading medical educators in the country. This committee met a number of times in the mid-60's and recommended the establishment of a center, the aim of which would be to develop or augment courses in human sexuality in American medical schools. This is how the Center for the Study of Sex Education in Medicine became established under my direction at The University of Pennsylvania in 1968. Having been offered, in 1967, the directorship of the division of family study which included the Marriage Council of Philadelphia, I had eagerly accepted because I saw this as a structure through which these various facets of medical education and practice could be substantially augmented.

In the meantime I had become a member of the first board of SIECUS (The Sex Information and Education Council of the United States) and eventually became its president. This led to a broadening interest in sex education in schools and the community, as well as for the medical profession.

Need Now Recognized

Almost every physician now recognizes the need for training in this area for three reasons: (1) the frequency of sexual problems in medical practice; (2) their importance to the patient and his family; and (3) the demand by patients that their doctors be competent in managing these problems.

Since the role of the sex and marriage counselor is inevitable for most physicians and since most physicians are not well equipped to carry out these functions, the Center sought as its main activities the following: (1) to provide a clearinghouse for the exchange of information about existing curricula or those being planned in medical schools; (2) to implement research and evaluation of training in this field, particularly in reference to the impact upon students' judgment in recognizing and managing sexual or marital problems; (3) to offer consultation to medical schools concerning curricula designs and the development of teaching techniques.

The Center has held seven regional workshops attended by representatives from more than 90 medical schools. A national conference for invited participants reviewing the entire field of sex education in medicine is planned for April 1974.

The staff of the Center has developed the Sex Knowledge and Attitude Test (SKAT) which has been given to over

14,000 people including more than 8,000 medical students from more than 50 medical schools. This has provided us with a body of information about sexual attitudes, knowledge, and personal experience as well as demographic data we are now analyzing and collating for publication. In addition, the Center has developed a training film dealing with the teaching of sex education to medical students and three films concerned with counseling.

The staff has consulted with dozens of medical schools around the country and has, in addition, participated in seminars with a variety of professional organizations in almost every field of medicine. We have also helped the American Medical Association prepare its recent book, "Human Sexuality."

We are delighted that the World Health Organization has now seen fit to move into this area and, after a planning conference in 1972, a more formal conference on the sex education of the health professional is planned for February 1974, in Geneva.

Affective Learning

An interesting facet of education in this area is the need for "affective" learning. Like other people, almost every medical student has strong feelings about human sexuality; unlike other people, he has to help patients with sexual problems. Often these strong feelings-anxiety, guilt, curiosity, anger, and the like-prevent him from taking an adequate sexual history or carrying on an effective interview. or doing a pelvic, genital, or rectal examination. Studies by Mudd and Siegel, Woods and Natterson, and our own studies at Tulane made it clear that such anxieties are ubiquitous among students and that these interfere with appropriate and effective counseling. To help students manage these feelings, new techniques of affective learning have to exist side by side with cognitive learning. Techniques involve "consensual validation," "confrontation," and "implosion." A more detailed discussion of these teachings of affective learning is contained in a recent paper (Lief, 1973). It is clear that the medical student must become more aware of his own sexual attitudes and feelings, and that, after first having been "sensitized" to them, he then has to become "desensitized." Desensitization will serve to create the comfort with human sexuality that is the most significant factor in becoming an effective interviewer and counselor of patients with sexual problems. Comfort in this area also allows one to more effectively integrate new information about human sexuality. The tie-in between affective and cognitive learning is an area for educational research, in which we are deeply interested. Affective learning also has significant implications in other areas of medical education.

In addition, studies of the outcome of specific programs of education must be carried out so that we know which programs are effective and, indeed, how they affect the management of patients. We know that sexual attitudes and knowledge can be influenced by teaching and that these persist for some months, but at this time we have no real assurance that our educational programs are modifying the way in which medical students and physicians actually deal with their patients. These are the areas of research to which the Center is committed.

Recognizing the need for coordinating their activities, medical schools along the eastern seaboard have recently formed a coordinating group so that information on resources and experiences can be shared. At NYU for example, one of the key elements is the need to integrate training in human sexuality with family planning—a need which, actually, is manifest throughout the country. In my opinion, to have these two areas of medical education separated is absurd. All aspects of family planning, including contraceptive counseling, are dependent on the recognition of the interrelations among family planning and sexual and marital relationships.

The appropriate training of medical students and physicians in the identification and management of sexual problems in medical practice has been a satisfying aspect of my own career. I recognize that these problems are, in the words of Quigg Newton, president of the Commonwealth Fund, "among the most sensitive and anguishing that patients bring to their physicians, and at the same time represent an area in which medical counseling impinges deeply on individual and family behavior and values. Thus, medical intervention is often critical to the patient's entire well-being, and to that of the patient's family."

throughout life. These situations are often related to events in the sexual and reproductive areas.

A brief look at the topics included in the original elective will provide an idea as to the kinds of problems we hoped to touch upon. An initial lecture was given in sexual and reproductive physiology and might have been entitled, "The Ages of Women." It gave an overall approach to the kinds of problems which are most often encountered at various stages of life. This was followed by a session on the premarital interview and was conducted by a gynecologist, a psychologist, and a minister. The following week, psychological factors in the choice of contraceptive method were discussed. This included a review of the physiology of contraception as well as an approach to the various non-physiologic factors that played a role in contraceptive choice, especially those involved in the interaction within the couple and the role that the choice of contraceptive technique might play in the give and take of their sexual relationship.

Next, the problems of the unwed mother were studied. At this time abortions were not yet legal and the problem of out-of-wedlock pregnancy was far more important than it is today. A visit was made to the Home for Unwed Mothers at Booth Memorial Hospital and several of the women as well as the staff were interviewed by our group.

This was followed by a session on medical, legal and psychological aspects of abortion. This was before abortions became legal in New York State and, therefore, abortions were done only therapeutically or under less than the best medical circumstances. The problem was discussed by a panel including a physician, a lawyer, and members of the clergy.

Menstruation and its physiology were next discussed, especially its impact on the teenager, who may have been poorly prepared for this major event in her development. The physiologic and psychologic factors in menstrual pain were also discussed.

Pregnancy and childbirth were approached from the point of view of the couple's interaction as well as the problems that the woman faced as she began the responsibilities of motherhood. Techniques of obstetrical analgesia were discussed and compared with concepts of psychoprophylaxis in childbirth. The panel for this program included teachers in the Lamaze technique, an obstetrician, and several women who had recently given birth, relating their experiences in childbirth and adaptation to motherhood.

At the next session, pelvic pain was discussed. Some of the disease processes associated with pelvic pain were described but stress was placed on the fact that pelvic pain might be psychologic in origin. It might provide the woman with a respectable entré to the physician's office where she might hope to discuss her sexual problems. It might be a manifestation of some sexual anxiety, frustration, or guilt perhaps providing a means by which she could withdraw from sexual contact.

We next looked at amenorrhea, the cessation of menstruation, and discussed this problem from the endocrinologic as well as the psychologic point of view.

The broken marriage as a stress situation was taken up

under the guidance of a divorce lawyer, a marriage counselor, a clergyman, and a psychologist who presented their

viewpoints on the overall problem.

Infertility can be a devastating problem. Fertility plays a major role in one's sense of worth. An infertility problem can have disastrous effects on the couple's sexual interaction. The ways in which this can be solved in terms of diagnostic and therapeutic infertility as well as the alternatives of adoption and artificial insemination were discussed and the problems involved for each were evaluated.

Sex outside of marriage was the next topic and it included a discussion of the reasons for and reactions to sex before

marriage and outside of marriage.

Psychological Trauma

A woman requiring a hysterectomy often undergoes a major psychological trauma. The importance of the uterus and menstruation varies with the culture. An attempt was made to gain an understanding of the problems a woman faces in this area as she attempts to maintain her identity as a woman in the face of what she may consider to be mutilating or "desexing" surgery.

The logical extension of this discussion was in the area of menopause and the psychological and endocrine events that were associated with it. Here again, the team approach was used with faculty members representing gynecology,

endocrinology, and psychiatry present.

The elective closed with two sessions on female and then male sexual dysfunction. An attempt was made to impart the principles of sexual history taking, as well as information about the kinds of problems one would encounter, and an understanding of the therapeutic approach to them.

Because the numbers in the group were small, it allowed each of these sessions to be in the form of a seminar and informality and exchange of ideas was encouraged. After completing the first elective series, we had the feeling that it took several sessions for the students to lose their self-consciousness to the point where they could freely ask those questions that were really on their mind. Therefore, when we repeated the series in the following year, we preceded it with an all-night "encounter" session which was arranged for us by Dr. Marion Hamburg, professor of education, who was teaching a pre-doctoral program in sex education at the NYU Graduate School of Health Sciences. Though the staging of this event presented some logistic problems, it was our feeling that it was worthwhile in that the group did seem to open up earlier and participate more freely in the give and take of opinions.

Concurrently, the department of urology was also offering an elective in the area of male infertility and reproductive physiology. Both of these electives were well re-

ceived and over-subscribed.

Student Pressure

As we had hoped, pressure came from within the student body to provide the opportunity for the entire medical school class to receive training in human sexuality. Representatives of the departments of psychiatry, urology, and obstetrics and gynecology were requested by the second-year curriculum committee to present a proposal for a course in human sexuality. This proposal was made and accepted but it was decided that the first-year curriculum

provided a greater latitude for its inclusion. The goals of this course were to provide the students with a body of information in the area of human sexuality and, in addition, to break down some of the barriers which might inhibit their discussing these emotionally charged areas with patients, fellow students, and faculty.

From the onset it was obvious that there were two major problems. The first was the problem of scheduling, which made it necessary to work with the class as a whole. This meant that the material would be presented to 135 students at a time which would greatly limit informal discussion. And, secondly, there did not exist, within the confines of the School of Medicine, a faculty with the expertise for dealing with the wide range of topics that we wished to present. The format decided upon was to have a two-hour session with a panel or individual presenting the material for one hour with interruptions encouraged, and then a second hour for as much of a question-and-answer session as possible. We decided to choose the individual who we felt was most expert in each area even if he were not from within the School so that a "home grown" faculty could be developed for the following year—faculty members who had had the benefit of participating in the expert presentation.

Wide Range of Prior Experience

Because our students brought to us a wide range of previous experience, it was felt necessary to begin the program with a group of rather explicit films which were designed to serve two purposes: to produce a certain degree of desensitization as well as to provide at least visual knowledge of the range of sexual practices. Though these films were no more explicit and decidedly less titillating than those that were easily available on 42nd Street, they did represent an innovation in the usual medical school audiovisual bill of fare. Though they were first greeted with a certain amount of nervous giggling and commenting, they were soon accepted in the spirit in which they were presented and appeared to have accomplished their purpose.

To partially solve the problem of the large class size, this material was also reviewed in small discussion groups as part of the teaching in the department of psychiatry. The lectures were given on a weekly basis over 14 weeks in the second half of the first year. The subject matter covered was: physiology of sexual behavior; variations in sexual techniques; cultural conditions and sexual attitudes and practices; ontogeny of sexual behavior, developmental aspects-sexual learning and sexual behavior from infancy to adulthood; psychosexual differentiation, gender role (what we learn from human intersexes); contraception, pregnancy, and abortion; sexual inadequacy; treatment of sexual inadequacy; homosexuality, transvestism, transexualism; our mammalian heritage, a comparative approach to human sexual behavior; fertility, adoption, insemination; sex and aging; religion, the law, and sexual behavior; erotic art and pornography.

We went to California for our lecturer on "our mammalian heritage." It was delivered by Dr. Beech from the faculty of the University of California. We went to New Haven for our speakers on the subject of human sexual inadequacy as Philip Sarrel '62, and his wife, Lorna, an associate in research, also at Yale University School of Medicine, joined

our panel. It was appropriate that Dr. Sarrel return to his alma mater for this purpose. We utilized representatives of the legal profession and adoption agencies, and in our panel on religion, the law, and sexual behavior, we had representatives of the three major religions participating.

At the end of the course, we requested that the students fill out a critique for us and, in general, this proved to be quite helpful in evaluating those points of the course that appeared to be most effective and those subjects which missed their mark in either presentation or material. The course was repeated in basically the same format in the following year. The course had been streamlined to 11 sessions with the elimination of those subjects which experience had shown to be either unnecessary or capable of being incorporated into another session. We went less far afield for our faculty in the second year, as our own staff became more capable of presenting material effectively. In this year, with major Supreme Court decisions in the area of abortion and pornography, we devoted more time to the law and eliminated the role of religion in sexuality. We again invited representatives from the male and female homosexual community to appear in the panel discussion chaired by Arthur Zitrin '45, professor of psychiatry. The Sarrel's were again invited to join us, basically, because their interaction in their teaching program so exemplifies the way in which male and female co-therapists can function together in a Masters and Johnson therapeutic session.

Sexual Knowledge Test

This past year, the students were requested to take a standardized sexual knowledge and attitude test [Ed. Note. The SKAT, described by Dr. Lief on page 6.] prior to the first course session and then to take the same examination after the last session. Though we have not yet completed evaluation of these examinations, we hope to come up with some information as to the effectiveness of our course in modifying either knowledge or attitudes in the area of sexuality.

This academic year, the third-year class will be the first to enter obstetrics and gynecology having had a course in human sexuality. Currently, there are two lectures in the third year on sexual physiology and sexual dysfunction. These lectures will probably no longer be necessary since the students have been given a far broader preparation than just the two lectures. We would hope to use these two sessions for a further development of this material and to have the advantage of a small group session to involve ourselves in role playing, sexual history taking, refinement in attitudes and correlation of the material with the other course work in obstetrics and gynecology.

It has been decided by the administration that the course in human sexuality will be moved into the second year. This means that no such course will be taught in the current academic year, since the current second-year class will have had it and the current first-year class will have it next year. This will, perhaps, give us an opportunity to experiment on an elective basis with the teaching of the material to small groups as compared to the large lecture sessions. After two years of teaching the course, it is apparent that the large lecture series, even supplemented by small group sessions in psychiatry, and later a small group session in the third year on obstetrics and gynecology, has definite limitations.

Our students are married and single, male and female, experienced and inexperienced. It would be far more effective to have the opportunity for an immediate feedback with each student to see how they are interpreting and accepting the material and to give them a more active role in the teaching process.

With almost every medical school now becoming involved in teaching human sexuality, New York University is in serious danger of falling behind unless it can develop a faculty whose full-time responsibility is in this area. At the present time the course is being taught by clinical faculty who have other responsibilities. If the course is to be taught in small group sessions, then a much greater teaching time will be necessary and a faculty must be available for this purpose.

The department of obstetrics and gynecology may soon be establishing a chair in the medical aspects of gynecology in memory of Dr. Kleegman, who was a pioneer in this area. This faculty member will have primary teaching responsibilities in the areas of infertility, family planning, and human sexuality. It is our hope that this individual will provide the nucleus for a group of faculty members trained in this material and with the time available for the teaching effort necessary to present it in the most effective way.

NEWS FROM THE SCHOOL

Alumni Receive 25-Year Faculty Citations

Twenty-five-year citations were presented on June 26 to 75 members of the faculty of the School of Medicine and Post-Graduate Medical School by Dr. Ivan L. Bennett, Jr., provost and dean of the Medical Center.

This was the 25th anniversary of the merging of the New York Post-Graduate Medical School and Hospital with New York University. Thus, all of the surviving active members of the old Post-Graduate Medical School who had joined the NYU faculty at that time were given citations.

Alumni receiving citations were: George Anopol '20, professor of clinical orthopedic surgery; Nathan Cabot '37, clinical assistant professor of pediatrics: Harold D. Dundy '33, clinical instructor in pediatrics; Saul J. Farber '42, Nathan Friedman Professor of medicine and chairman of the department; Andrew G. Franks '32, professor of clinical dermatology; William Mackler '40, associate professor of clinical surgery; Myra R. Palmer '40, clinical associate professor of psychiatry; George M. Saypol '35, associate professor of clinical surgery; and Marvin Stern '39, professor of psychiatry.

Breast Cancer Research

The Medical Center has been granted a contract for \$100,000 from the Breast Task Force of the National Cancer Institute for the study of the "Cell Cycle Kinetics of Human Breast Cancer." The principal investigators are Drs. Joseph Post, professor of clinical medicine, and Joseph Hoffman, associate professor of clinical medicine.

Under study will be the proliferative patterns of human breast cancer cells in vivo and in vitro. Techniques of cell cycle analysis will be adapted to obtain data which may correlate not only with the clinical course of primary and metastatic disease, but also with clinical response to non-surgical therapeutic programs.

The goal is to achieve more effective antitumor therapy. The laboratory studies will be done at the NYU research service at Goldwater Memorial Hospital, Roosevelt Island. Collaborating institutions include Lenox Hill Hospital and the Long Island Jewish-Hillside Medical Center and its Queens Hospital Center Affiliation as well as Bellevue Hospital Center and University Hospital.

Concerts at the School

The School of Medicine is embarking on its ninth consecutive season of concerts supported by an anonymous benefactor, for medical students, faculty, alumni, staff and their friends. Mellon Foundation Grant

Cited as one of 15 American medical schools with "especially distinguished records in preparing teachers and research scientists for service in medical schools," the School of Medicine has been awarded \$275,000 by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. The grant will assist the career development of selected young teachers and investigators in the basic medical sciences.

Mellon Foundation President Nathan Pusey, in announcing the grants, said: "The funds are designed to enable the deans of these schools, in face of threatened cutbacks in their budgets, to encourage a significant number of the ablest of the emerging generation of young scientists to advance their careers in medical education and research. It is our aim in making these awards to do what we can to prevent or minimize a threatened break in the forward movement of medical education and research."

Milbank Named to Board

Jeremiah Milbank, who is active in the private investment management business, has been elected to the board of the Medical Center. Mr. Milbank is president of the ICD Rehabilitation and Research Center which has a close association with the Medical Center. The Milbank Research Laboratories at the ICD are a joint effort of the two institutions.

A native New Yorker, Mr. Milbank is chairman of the board of directors of the Commercial Solvents Corporation. He is a graduate of Yale University and earned the Master of Business Administration degree at Harvard. From 1943 to 1946 he served in the United States Navy as a lieutenant in the Reserves.

Mr. Milbank is a director of the Chase Manhattan Bank, a trustee of George Washington University, president of the J. M. Foundation and a director of the Herbert Hoover Foundation. He is also treasurer and trustee of the Robert A. Taft Institute of Government and a treasurer of the Boys Club of America.

Horticultural Therapy

"Horticulture as a Therapeutic Aid" is the title of a monograph written by Howard D. Brooks, horticulturist at the Institute of Rehabilitation Medicine. Mr. Brooks, widely recognized as an authority on horticultural therapy, has lectured to occupational therapists, groups of horticultural students, horticultural societies and garden clubs throughout the country. His co-author is Charles J. Oppenheim, a full-time volunteer at the Enid A. Haupt Therapeutic Greenhouse at IRM.

In the foreword to the monograph, Dr. Howard A. Rusk, Howard A. Rusk Professor of rehabilitation medicine and vice president of the Medical Center for IRM, notes that the Therapeutic Greenhouse was established in 1959 under a grant from Mrs. Haupt. Since that time, Dr. Rusk notes, "patients have not only found joy and solace in the program, but many have gone on to follow careers in horticulture or as florists." Dr. Rusk calls the new monograph "unique and excellent."

Jerry Lewis MDAA Center

The Jerry Lewis Neuromuscular Disease Center has been established at the Institute of Rehabilitation Medicine of the Medical Center.

An initial grant of \$146,776 from Muscular Dystrophy Associations of America will enable the MDAA clinic now functioning at the Institute to provide more comprehensive diagnostic and clinical services for children and adults with muscular dystrophy and allied muscular diseases. The Center also will provide genetic counseling, training for medical and paramedical personnel, and other services. In addition, the new unit will conduct clinical research, as well as workshops and educational projects for physicians, nurses, patients and their families.

Co-directors of the Center are Dr. Joseph Goodgold, professor of rehabilitation medicine at the School of Medicine, director of research and education of the department of rehabilitation medicine and director of the electrodiagnostic service of IRM, and Dr. Leon Greenspan, professor of clinical rehabilitation medicine and director of clinical services of the George G. Deaver Children's Division of IRM.
